AT OPEN P. E. O. MEETING IN SOCIAL ROOMS TUES

At the open meeting of Chapter T. of the P. E. O. Sisterhood in the social room of the Teachers College Tuesday evening, Mrs. E. J. Gifford of St. Paul, former president of the Minnesota state chapter, reviewed on the educational work of the organization.

According to Mrs. Gifford, P. E. O. has an educational fund of half a million dollars, the interest of which is loaned in sums of not over \$400 a year or \$800 for two years to college girls alı over the country.

"The only requirement is that the girl be a high school graduate and sponsored by one of the chapters," she said. Even Indian maidens have bee helped by the fund. Over 2,000 girls have so far recieved aid. The fund is annually augmented by gifts and bequests, the 45000 members each giving a dollar a year, and, and members and now-members often leaving large sums.

"P. E. O. is unique, I believe," said Mrs. Gifford," in having been given a college. After investigating all organizations as to the worthiness of carrying on her ideals, the founder of Catty Junior College, Nevada, Missouri, pressented it to the Supreme chapter of P. E. O. ## Menomonie Cops First in Fast "Hi" Tournament

# Clayton Wins 2nd; River Falls Places Third; Games Good

Clayton Proves Dark Horse by Taking Second

The tournament was a huge success from every point of view The games were all close and exciting with the probable exception of two games, great crowds of fans attended from various parts of the district, and last but not least a good many of the high school athletes were favorably impressed by River Falls and its student body.

Spring Valley, rated as the weakest team in the tournament, came through with two victories and fourth place. The crowd liked the manner in which the little team played. Better basketball ha frequently been seen than that displayed by Spring Valley but seldom such hard concientious playing.

River Falls was probably a stronger team than its final standing in the tournament would indicate. Out side of its game with Menomonie it won all its victories in a very decisive fashion. Captain Dawson and Hagestad were the best pair of guards playing in the tournament while the front line was dangerous in scoring, especially Kuss.

Clayton failed to impress many of the fans even though they got to the finals and were vanquished by only three points by Menomonie still due justice must be given to the fellows from the north. They had sufficient power to win up to the finals and even then they threatened for a while to upset Menomonie. They were a crude

Menomonie was undoubtedly the best team in the tournament and justly deserved the title of district champions. The common impression was far from the case. THIRD GRADE TRAIN-ING SCHOOL ON HEALTH CRUSADE

The children of the third grade in the Training School are having a health campaign. They are using the outlines and directions for a modern Health Crusade put out by the National Tuberculosis Association whose headquarters is in New York City.

Many stories have been told of the knights of old and the dragons they slew, so the modern crusaders have started out to kill the gaint Error and Carelessness. Not only are these modern crusaders stressing health rules, but are also seeking to do away with carelessness in reaching school on time and in misspelling words in spelling class.

They have eleven health rules to follow during the next term. They are learning these rules, and theories connected with them by means of real experiences. They must check themselves every day on a chart concerning: washing hand, brushing teeth, cleaning finger nails, carring clean handkerchiefs, drinking at least two glasses of milk slowly every day, playing out of doors, taking a complete bath, and getting eleven hours or more sleep each night The teachers say that when Primary children have eleven hours of sleep each night, they are able to accomplish much more work than when allowed to sit up until late hours with the adult members of the family.

These young crusaders are anxious to make a score as nearly perfect as possible in all these points, in order that they may earn a series of badges as they proceed form one stage to another in the advance to Knighthood.

This method of health study is one that is very effective, and most excellent results can be secured.

All material for carrying on this work is furnished by the Tuberculosis Association and can be secured free from the state office in Milwaukee.
