
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# Falcons set for Homecoming duel with Titans

Jerry Trooien (12) will be called upon to get the Rozak, Tim Delawyer and Dave Rosga the former St.



The Falcons will be seeking their second conference victory Saturday against the Titans of Oshkosh. Both teams go into the River Falls homecoming game with identical records of 2-2.

The Titans won their opener against St. Thomas and then lost their next two of three conference games. Last week the pre-season favorites were surprised by Stout 13-0.

The Falcons are coming off a 48-0 thumping by non-conference foe, St. Norbert. In in defense of the Falcons Gary Thompson, an inside linebacker did not play and after falling behind Coach Gwyn Christensen decided to experiment with different player since the game did not mean anything in conference standings.

The game will feature the second and third leading passers in the conference last year. The Falcons Jerry Trooien nosed out Oshkosh's Jim Goeckerman for the second spot.

Coach Russ Young guided the Titans to a co-championship in his sixth year as head coach last fall, but insists, "We will be hard pressed to repeat last year's performance in a stronger-than-usual league. One more loss should eliminate the visitors from the southeast from the title. Whitewater currently holds the top spot by its self with a victory over Platteville last week.

Three all-conference performers head the list of returning lettermen, including halfback Ron Cardo, the league's leading rusher with 772 yards and a 4.5 average. Also back are all-star center Pete Gabrielson, fullback Brian Burbey, and defensive guard Clair Rasmussen.

Young has nine regulars back from the offensive platoon and five from the defense. The Titans run their offense out of a winged-T with variations, and Young's squad is blessed with experience, good speed, and fair size. The problem area is defense, where lack of depth is a drawback. Oshkosh will also be seeking to improve its inept offense after being shut out by surprising Stout. Goeckerman should provide the Titans with experienced leadership in the game but the senior had his troubles last week.

The Falcons unvailed Gary Gray, a 9.6 speed merchant from Milwaukee Custer at St. Norbert. With little high school experience Gray is just starting to find himself in the backfield.

Another back to be watched Saturday will be Dale Stephenson of Stiensville. The 5'10", 202 pound Stephenson started the season at linebacker but returned to his natural position in the backfield last Saturday against

If Trooien falters Dave Astin, a junior from Milton, will take over the reins at quarterback. Against a tough St. Norbert defense the redheaded signal caller connected on eight of 15 passes for 96 yards.

With both teams being shut out in their previous games, look for wide open offenses with John O'Neill, Dick Carlson, Ed Gruenwald, John Cahalan and Gary Gray lugging the pigskin for the home town Falcons and Cardo and Burbey carrying the mail for the white shirted Titans.




