GYMNASIUM CLASSES DOUBLE PERFORMANCE

Dances Appear as Special Features

The Gym Demonstration was given under the auspices of the Girls' Athletic association in the North Hall gym last Friday evening to raise money to buy athletic rewards for the girl athletes, to pay for the team pictures in the Meletean, and to contribute to a project for equipping the training school playground. One hundred-fifty girls from five different 'gym' classes co-operated, under the direction of Miss Wirt, to make the demonstration a success.

The demonstration was repeated by request at the Armory last night. The marching tactics and dumbbell drill were done with snap and precision.

The lesson in aesthetic dancing demonstrated the steps in technique which are later combined to form complete dances.

The entire audience enjoyed the stunts and games as well as the girls themselves.

Each group of dancers in the "Cycle of the Seasons" dance was encored; the costumes of these dancers were very elaborate.

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
DECLAMATORY AND



well as being educational.


Other demonstrations and booths, as well as exhibits, are also to be given, making the Field Day a whole day affair. Other information will be printed in the next issue of the Student Voice.

Ethel Blanchard and Edna Olson spent the week-end at their homes in Amery.


Agnes McDonald and Abagail Bennett motored to St. Paul with Prof. May Saturday.


