Lusk Memorial Fund Set for Ag Students

Dr. E. H. Kleinpell has received a check for \$5,000 from the Lucy K. Lusk estate to establish an agricultural scholarship fund. The provision in the will of Mrs. Lusk under which the check was presented is as follows:

To the Wisconsin State College Foundation, at River Falls, Wisconsin, the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000) for a Scholarship Fund to be known as the W. F. Lusk Memorial Scholarship Fund, the income from which shall be awarded to any student (s) during any or all of the Four (4) years of such student (s) attendance at Wisconsin State College at River Falls, Wisconsin, providing he is a resident of Wisconsin and is majoring in agriculture. Said student shall be selected by a committee of three (3) comprised of T. F. Setterquist, Chair-

man of the Chemistry Department or his successor in office, the Treasurer of Wisconsin State College Foundation, and a member of the College Agriculture Staff. The awards shall be made at the beginning of each quarter of the school year."

William F. Lusk was once an instructor at this college.

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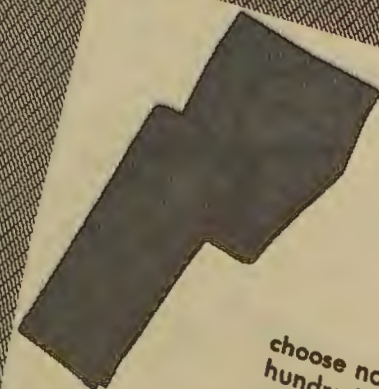

It will then proceed down Pine Street to Main Street going down Main Street to Locust Street and up Locust to Second Street where it will break up.

Masquers To Present A Thurber Carnival

Soon to be presented by Masquers is "A THURBER CARNIVAL," a play by the late James Thurber, one of the sharpest humorists in the world.

Thurber began his writing career with a newspaper and, with the help of essayist E. B. White,

graduated to the staff of the New Yorker magazine, for which he wrote a column and many stories.

His fame rests with these stories which satire the customs and fears of modern man with particular emphasis on loud mouthed women and besieged men in search for peace.

Books such as Men, Women and Dogs and Fables for our Time are among the many volumes that he has turned out complete with the cartoons about which one reviewer said: "They are funny--but they are psychological and social and sometimes a pathological commentary as well."

Almost totally blind toward the end of his life, Thurber continued to turn out stories from his life-long store of observations. Several times he lent his hand to the stage where much of his work has appeared, including his book The Male Animal which he adapted with Elliot Nugent. The production of "A THURBER CARNIVAL" is the latest of his work to be brought to the stage and consists of such tales as "The Secret Life of Walter Mitty," "If Grant Had Been Drinking at Appomattax" and "The Little Girl and the Wolf." These are easily some of the best stories Thurber has done and promise to be at their witty best on the Little Theatre stage.

Weak Foes Will Pass

Platteville is expected to fill the homecoming air with passes tomorrow. This is not due to a strong passing game, but rather a lack of solid ground game on the Pioneer squad.

Believing that we should keep the student body well informed concerning topics of vital interest, we contacted our man in Platteville for the lowdown on the upcoming Pioneer-Falcon game. The first question we asked him was, "Who are your big guns."

"Offensively we don't have any," was the reply which we received. Although we tried to chide our spy into giving us at least a tip as to whom we should watch when Platteville had the ball, he was adamant. "When a team has only scored one touchdown in its first four games and managed only a net gain of 14 yards in the second half of the last tilt, you can't say that it has any big guns."

He further elaborated that the line and the ends seem to be solid enough, but there is a serious deficiency at quarterback.

Coach Lester (Butch) Leith has apparently plugged the gaping holes at tackle but has been unable to come up with a topflight field general.

Platteville, having only scored six points this year against 115 by the opposition, seems headed toward its fifth straight second

division in the Wisconsin State College Conference. The Pepless Pioneers now stand at 0-3 in the

conference and 0-4 overall. They have yet to score against a conference opponent.

History Favors Falcons

The Platteville Pioneers might just as well stay home Saturday because they will be bucking history in attempting to defeat River Falls in a Homecoming game.

The Falcon footballers have an impressive record in past Homecoming encounters with an overall record of 23 victories, 15 losses, and three ties. The Old Birds have outscored their opponents 523 to 363.

Only the recent history of the Falcon's Homecomings favors the Pioneers. The Falcons have failed to win a Homecoming game since 1958 but that year their victims were, of all teams, the Platteville Pioneers. Last year LaCrosse lacerated the Falcons 28-13.
