

## Farley and Co. host Blugolds for homecoming



A bit factor in the outcome of Saturday's homecoming game with Eau Claire will be whether the Falcons can establish a running game. Senior John O'Neill (43) shown running behind the blocking of Carlos Kreibich (66) has been Mike Farley's most consistent ground gainer to date. O'Neill picked up 242 yards in the season opener against Augsburg, and was named offensive player of the week in the WSUC, for his outstanding performance.

Eau Claire signal caller Tom Bauer (15) hands off to back Dave Hoppe (44) in the Blugold's 31-7 defeat of River Falls last year. Both Bauer and Hoppe will be in the starting line up Saturday afternoon and promise to give the "Big Red" defense plenty of headaches.



Described as a "good blocker" by Mike Farley, senior tackle Carles "Sugar Bear" Kreibich is in his third year as a starter in the offensive line. The Alma native has "good" speed for his 6'1" 260 pound bulk and leads the sweeps for the Falcon running backs.

A year ago, the River Falls Falcons journeyed to Eau Claire for the Blugolds homecoming game, and came away with a 31-7 pasting at their hands. Saturday, coach Mike Farley's ball club will be the host team, with the added incentive of it being the Big Red's homecoming.

Neither River Falls or Eau Claire has had much success to date on the gridiron. The "golds" are 1-2 in conference play and 2-4 overall. Preseason ratings tabbed Eau Claire as a "sleeper" for the conference crown. Injuries and inconsistent play have hampered the Blugolds, who finished in a tie for third in the WSUC last year.

Both teams have met the same ball-clubs, in Superior and Augsburg. The Falcons dumped the Auggies 27-15 in their season opener, while Eau Claire eked out a 7-6 win over Augsburg, on a late fourth quarter touchdown scamper. A tough Superior "11" blitzed RF 26-12 and topped Eau Claire 21-6.

Former Durand ace Tom Bauer is the big sparkplug in the Eau Claire offense. Bauer, a 5'9'' 185 pound quarterback, gave the Falcon defense fits last year, as he worked the roll out option to perfection, picking up two touchdowns on his scrambles.

A couple of other Blugolds to watch are halfbacks Dave Hoppe and speedster Gary Tepler. Hoppe ran for two touchdowns against the Red men last fall. Sophomore flanker Steve Cooley, an honorable mention All-Conference end choice, is Bauer's favorite target. Cooley caught nine passes against the Falcon defense last year, five of them for first downs.

While the Blugolds look solid offensively, they have had trouble getting points on the board this year, as quarterback Tom Bauer has been sidelined with a leg injury, until recently. Defensively the "golds" are a question mark, as coach Link Walker said in the preseason outlook; "We will be a young club with only five seniors on the entire roster. The offense should be fairly solid, and if the defense matures quickly and learns to play as a unit, we could be tough."



Junior Lee Born has developed into a starter this year and is a mainstay in the Falcon defensive line. The River Falls native fills a defensive tackle slot with his 6'4" 225 pound frame. During the spring, Born is a discus thrower on the track squad.



The team with the best defense may very well be the winner this weekend, as both offensive units have the ability to put plenty of points on the scoreboard. Tom Bauer, an ex-Durand star, scored twice against the Falcons last fall as did halfback Dave Hoppe. Falcons Terry Bodeen (7), Steve Aperavich (70), Duane Jensen (50) and Lee Born (80) will be seeing plenty of Bauer and Hoppe.

Coach Jim Helminiak's defensive unit will have their hands full come gametime, as Bauer likes to take off and run with the ball, just as Platteville's Chris Charnish does. The Durand dandy was considered the "cream of the freshman crop" last year, and averaged 107 yards a game passing, 48 rushing, and scored 13 touchdowns.

Look for the pigskin to be in the airways quite often for both clubs. The Falcons Jerry Trooien will be looking for ends Joe Rozak and Tim DeLawyer, plus halfback Jim Lohman, while Bauer will be pitching to Cooley and Tepler, and doing a little damage himself on the ground.
