LUTHER GIVES GOOD BATTLE

For the first few minutes of play neither team scored but both teams showed good floor work and several attempts at baskets proved fruitless. The visitors started the scoring by a neat shot from the side and immediately after boosted the score by a free throw. Meanwhile Capt. Carolan had missed three free throws. Betzel started the scoring for the River Falls team by a goal from the foul line. A little later Booty tied the score by a free throw. Clafflin romped around the floor getting within the vicinity of the hoop and shoves up the score two more notches. The visitors soon tied the score at five by Ulrich, the right forward getting in close and dropping the ball through. By a long lucky shot Luther surged ahead two points, but the Red and White soon came up with their opponents and the half ended 7 to 7.

The second half both teams came back strong and for a while the second period seemed as though it would be a repetition of the first. The locals started the scoring by a free throw and kept the lead throughout the entire period. Clafflin gets a second goal and immediately after the visitors scored, but from then on they did not score until near the end of the game. They missed several chances to score on free throws while River Falls missed only one free throw the second half. The Red and White steadily gained the lead but were not

RIVER FALLS COPS OPENER

Dunwoody Defeated to the Tune of 27 to 16

The whistle blew, "Booty" tapped the ball to Jim, Betzel received the pass right under the hoop and scored. Shortly after Capt. Carolan scored a free-throw, setting a 3 to 1 lead. The visitors started their scoring by a free throw and a little later scored a field goal from the foul line. The locals played persistently at the short pass and very seldom shot any long shots while the visitors had to resort to rather long shots throughout the game. Carolan regained the lead for his team on a clever left hand close in shot and in a little while Clafflin boosted the score on a close in shot. The visitors played hard, but could not keep up with the red jersey men. They tried just as many shots as the locals but due to their poor shooting and length of shots failed to make them count. The latter part of the first half was considerably slower than the first part, the half ending 14 to 11 in favor of the locals.

The Red and White came back with a burst of speed and very early in the period boosted the score to 20 before the visitors had scored at all. The second half the visitors were at a more disadvantage than the first and made several substitutions. The second half the visitors scored five points to the locals' 13. From a stand-point of real basketball the last half was better than the first.

The game was characterized by many fouls due to holding and tripping. The locals showed good team work, but at times the passing was ragged and slow. The guards played a good defensive game and at times worked in very well in helping to advance the ball. Butenhoff had the jump on his opponent allowing the team to play signals. The locals missed several close in shots, but this is characteristic of all early season games.

ASSEMBLY TALKS

President Ames accounted for his last week's vacation at the Tuesday assembly. He attended a meeting of Education Boards at Madison. At this meeting were the members of the Education Boards, as, the State Normal Board of Regents, University Board of Regents, and other State Boards of Education. There were several presidents of the Wisconsin State normals, River Falls, Eau Claire, and Oshkosh being represented. The President of the Menomonie Institute was also present.

The purpose of the meeting was a disarmament conference as it were, to discuss problems existing between the different boards, and as to how to best eliminate the friction between them. Of the questions discussed was the betterment of the schools in general, the increasing of the efficiency of the teachers sent out to teach in high schools. There was brought out one surprising fact concerning this latter discussion; that the Wisconsin State Normal Schools were developing a greater per cent of the high school teachers than all the other educational institutions in the state. River Falls leads in the number of teachers of Agriculture, Oshkosh in the number of teachers of Manual Training, Stevens Point in Home Economics, La Crosse in Physical Training, and Whitewater in Commercial Course teachers. To more fully prepare the high school teachers for their work, it was resolved that after 1924, all high school courses would be three years, and after 1926 would be increased to four years. Those of course who have their diplomas before that time will be permitted to continue their work.

Another problem that was brought up and discussed was that of the Jun-

ior College plan. Under this system the high schools of the larger cities would be permitted to add two more years to their course, including Freshman and Sophomore College work.

Mr. Ames also discussed the credit relation between Normal Schools and the University. Credits will be accepted at the University from the Normal Schools at their full value, providing that the student has properly adjusted his work and studies according to the particular profession he is intending to enter. Also included in this is whether or not he has the full sixteen units required for a High School course, the amount of time spent at the Normal School and the program he carried while at the Normal.

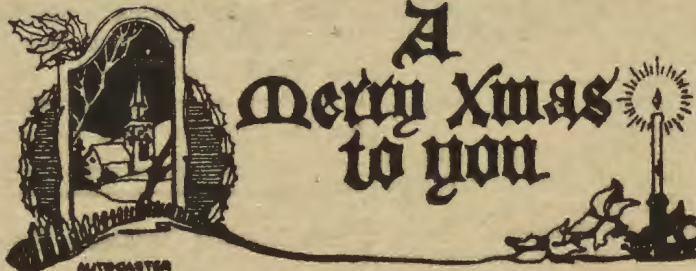
