Nelson, left forward for the visitors was caught traveling by referee Smith immediately after play had commenced and Carolan counted on the gift.

Holstrom, the invaders speedy center, evidently disliked being a trailor and shoved his team into a one point lead when he trained his longe range artillery on the objective and whiffed one through from mid floor. The Superior defense was tight and the locals attempted several long shots none of which materialized. Carolan drew a technical and Johnson counted. Then came the most sparkling play of the game. Morrow intercepted a Superior pass well up in the danger zone and whizzed the ball the full length of the court to Carolan. He then followed in and counted on a snappy return from the nimble south-

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paw who was covered and unable to score himself. It was great work and the mad mob responded with wild cheers. Carolan then came across with his first two pointer on a shot from the foul line, and Gurnoe, who was showing great form soon followed with a "bat in" shot.

The score board said 7 to 4 and Superior called for time. When play began Carolan immediately increased the lead by dropping in his second shot from the free throw line. Superior worked the ball under with some neat passing but Holstrom missed his shot. Johnson, the visitors captain. soon got a similiar chance and did likewise. Nelson then completed his team's scoring for the first half by dropping one through from the side line. Two more field counters by Carolan and another by Wright ended the scoring for the first period. The count stood 16 to 8 at intermission The locals had scored seven times from scrimmage to their opponents two but the visitors captain was showing great form in his free throwing, having made good in every one of his four attempts.

The second half showed Coach Loop's charges coming back with renewed vigor and field baskets by Johnson and Holstrom and some more accurate free throwing by Johnson soon brought the count up to 14 for the opposition while the Chandlerites were going from 16 to 19. Gurnoe then began a scoring spree for the home team by caging a sensational "over head" shot and followed immediately with a close under basket on a pass from Wright. Wright was next to count on a pretty follow in shot. A personal was then called on Carolan. The crowd resented the referee's decision and in so doing gave the sharp shooting Johnson two chances instead of one, by drawing a foul for their unsportsmanlike tac-The attitude shown by the crowd was wholly uncalled for and the counter blow struck by referee Smith in calling the foul was well directed and should prove a valuable lesson to those who are in the habit of starting altercations with officials.

Another basket by Gurnoe from the center and a long one from the side by Holstrom for the visitors ended the scoring for both teams and gave the final score a 29 to 18 appearance.
