R.F.H.S.Busy With Debate and Basketball

Look for High Class Teams in Both Lines.

Our neighbor across the river is as deep in the whirl of school activities as we are, especially in basketball and debate. River Falls Normal is especially interested in the prospects for basketball in the surrounding high schools, since the sectional tournament is always played off here in the spring. River Falls High School has the makings of a light but fast team. With Dawson and Jenson back as a nucleus, and with good material from each class, especially the sophomores, who won the interclass tournament, the coach can expect to work up a good team which will make a good showing against neighboring

New rules prevent the playing of ninth-semester men, which has been done by several schools in the past.

Debating has always been one of the major student activities in this school. The question for debate this year is on unemployment insurance, practically the same as that of the Normal last year. There are seven men out to compete for places on the team, two of them, Norseng and Davidson, are experienced debaters. High School debating took a slump this year, inasmuch as the old three-judge system is in force again in place of the one expert judge plan which has been used for the last two years.

Plans for the year book, the Kinnick, are also under way with Miss Arnquist in charge. The staff has has not been elected, but nominations have been made, so this work will no doubt progress rapidly. It is no small task for a high school the size of River Falls to undertake a business proposition such as this, very few high schools attempt it. River Falls has made the thing go through for the past two years and has developed some exceptional talent along both artistic and business lines as well as putting out a very good book.

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
HELP US OUT
