In the first conference game of theseason Eau Claire and River Falls battled to a scoreless tie. Eau Claire was quite confident of a victory and the team was accompanied by a band of twenty-five pieces and about two hundred rooters who traveled in cars. The east side of the field was reserved for them and they made a good. effort to fill the space.

River Falls was represented by a crowd three times as large as that of the Dunwoody game. Helped out by the band, the rooters gave evidence of their overflowing "pep." As the ball changed hands the rooters of either side gave vent to their enthusiasm and tried to out do each other. Theoverflowing stand and the filled spaces outside showed that the townspeople as well as the students were backing the team.


Perhaps Eau Claire was disappointed in not winning, but the crowd had the pleasure of seeing a real battle. The absence of several men from the lineup of the Falls team gave them the idea of an easy victory.

The game had to be devoted to straight football as the brisk south wind made passing almost impossible, only one pass being completed. The team having the wind at its back had the advantage during that period, but even with this, neither were able to score.

First Quarter.

Eau Claire won the toss and chose to defend the south goal. River Falls kicked against the wind and made but a short distance going to the forty yard line. Eau Claire was penalized five yards for being off side on first play. They made five yards on a delayed buck and then attempted a pass which Gurnoe intercepted. Eau Claire, attempting to kick, was block. ed, but recovered ball. They then attempted another kick, the ball going to Smith who made five yards. River Falls and Eau Claire both fail to make downs and Eau Claire kicks over goal line, the ball being returned to twenty yard line. 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


CAN YOU STAND THE "GAFF?"

AG. NEWS

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
A large number of the men in the Agricultural Department attended the National Dairy Show at St. Paul last Thursday, as well as the entire corps of the Ag. faculty.

All reports indicate that the show was a marked success. The poultry exhibit of three thousand birds was exceptional from the standpoint of breed, type and quality. The quality of the "Dairy Breed's Exposition" surpassed that of any other year. There were over one thousand animals exhibited of the five dairy breeds.

The demonstrations given by the high schools were of superior merit. One of the men made a remark to the effect that Prof. Hayes of the U. of W., had real competition in several of the "Poultry Culling" demonstrations.

The University Stock Judging contest was won by North Dakota. Ohio and Massachusetts won second and third respectively.

RIVER FALLS HOLDS EAU CLAIRE TO SCORELESS TIE

noe kicks to Carrol, who is stopped by Lipke on Eau Claire's forty-five yard line. They were thrown back for a loss in the first play but succeeded in making first down. In next at-tempt they were held and forced to kick, the ball going to River Falls' twenty yard line. The Falls gains six yards but are forced to kick. Eau Claire returns ball ten yards and later succeed in making first down. They resort to passes and fail to complete two. On the third try, Gurnoe catches pass and makes three yards. The Falls makes but three yards in as many downs, and quarter ends with ball on our twenty-five yard line. Second Quarter.

River Falls has the advantage of the wind and Gurnoe kicks to Eau Claire's thirty yard line. Six yards were made in two downs, and Eau Claire was penalized fifeten yards for holding. They kick to River Falls, but ball only goes to their forty yard line. On the first play, the Falls fumbled, Lipke recovering and first down is mdae. For a second time the Red and White makes first down, and ball is carried to the opponent's ten yard line, where a pass gives the ball to the Gold and Maroon. Carrol punts out of danger, the ball going to River Falls on the thirty five yard line. Failing to make downs, Gurnoe punts over goal line. Eau Claire fails to gain, and half ends with ball on thirty yard line.

Third Quarter

Chinnock is substituted for Casey, and MacAndrews for Reincke. Gurnoe boots over goal line. From the twenty yard line Eau Claire makes but little ground, and Carrol kicks to our forty yard line where, due to a fumble, no return is made. River Falls fails to make downs and Gurnoe punts over goal line. The ball is Eau-Claire's on their twenty yard line. They succeed in making two first downs carrying ball to River Falls forty yard line. Casey is sent in for

Chinnock. Eau Claire gains ball and manages to carry it down to the two yard line only to lose it. Gurnoe punts to the thirty-five yard line, the Gurnoe ball being returned ten yards by Schipper. Eau Claire is held for a loss, and ball goes to River Falls on their ten yard line. On the second play, the ball was fumbled, Olson recovering on the five yard line. The team made mighty efforts to hold and on fourth down the ball is still two yards from the goal. Eau Claire fumbles, and MacAndrews recovers the ball when over the line, making it a touch back, saving the day.

It a touch back, saving the day. The ball goes back to the twenty yard line, and Gurnoe kicks to forty yard line when quarter ends. Eau Claire had out played the Red and White during this quarter with the wind against them but failed to score due to fumbles.

Fourth Quarter

At the beginning of the last quarter, the home team tightens, and hold Eau Claire from making the required downs, forcing Carrol to kick. The ball is fumbled and the Red and White fails to make a return, also failing to make downs. Gurnoe punts to Carrol on forty-five yard line. They are blocked on the ten yard line, and Gurnoe punts out of danger. Carrol tries several passes to Horan and Chickester, but to no avail, the ball going to our team on the twenty yard line. D. Smith does a wonderful amount of stalling, and on fourth down kicks the ball to opponent's forty-five yard line. They fail to make downs, and Carrol punts over goal line. 
EAU CLAIRE DANCE


