## LA CROSSE OUTCLASSED IN THRILLING CONTEST

Friday night north hall gym was the scene of perhaps as brilliant an exhibition of basket ball as has ever been staged within its walls. True, there have been games in which the margin of victory was less pronounced and grant that a close score is on of the requisites of an ideal contest, but that can in no way blight the performance of the Chandler machine through out the forty minutes of play. It was River Falls' night on in both shooting and team play and those are the two elements that usually predominate; when one team has both the argument is soon over.

It seemed to be the universal verdict of the assembled fans, that as regards all around brilliant basketball, Friday nights' performance established a new high water mark. Never has a Falls quint scintillated with more brilliance than did the Chandlerites against their La Crosse guests. Never has a River Falls forward gone into a more notorious scoring fit than did "Dubry" Carolan. He fired the opening salute of the evening with a clean ringer from center and before the initial period had terminated he had the Keeler proteges staggering under a handicap from which they never succeeded in extricating themselves.

But scoring is only one phase of the game and is made possible only thru the proper functioning of the other parts of the machine. Throughout the entire season, and Friday night was no exception, the form displayed by the team in general, has been of the kind that if mention be made of the special merits of any one player, it must always be done with reservation in mind for the remaining four.

Friday night's contest featured everything that stands for classy basket ball. The defense was iron clad, the pivoting was sensational and interspersed with the regular short pass game were occasional flashes of accurate long range shooting and passing. Those who thrive on variety had no reason to feel slighted. The La Crosse team played hard clean basket ball from the first toss up until the final gun, but the complicated short pass game of the Red and White combined with superior speed and aggressiveness forced the Keeler men into a defensive game which afforded few opportunities to count from close range.

The visitors loomed big at the outset. Jennings the elongated center, striking distance, but Reay failed to get the jump on Wright and on a neat play the ball was carried within connect with the hoop. Both teams seemed to be laboring under a tension and a short period elapsed before the scoring on either side got under way. Carolan started the fire works by whiffing one through from the center. A personal foul was called on Rippe and Carolan missed the free throw. Jennings then threw a scare into the audience by caging a long one from the side line. A personal and a technical was called on Carolan in close succession and Jennings failed to put his team in the lead by missing both chances. Carolan then took a long snappy relay from Rice and shoved the score board up two notches. La Crosse had found our de-

fense too tight and were relying on long shots none of which were successful. Carolan broke away for another shot but his aim was a bit off and the leather rolled out. In the ensuing scramble, Wright made a clean get-away on one of the neatest pivots of the game, but missed his shot. In the endeavor to regain the sphere he deflected a La Crosse pass. Carolan saw the ball heading in his general direction and lost no time in covering it into material available for the score sheet.

With the game ten minutes old, La Crosse took time out for a conference. The conference seemed to be void of results. Rice opened up immediately with a double counter but he was called for traveling and his effort went to waste. Jennings missed his third straight attempt from the one point line. Dahlgren was called for holding and Carolan scored his first free throw. He followed immediately with a clever overhead shot on a long pass from Morrow. Reay followed with the second counter for his team on a back board shot from center. He was called for a personal and Carolan again counted from the free throw line. Gurnoe followed up Morrow's missfire and drew his first basket. A personal was called on Carolan and Jennings annexed his first one pointer.

Coach Keeler sent in Reget for Thomson. Gurnoe got a personal and Jennings counted. Rice followed with a technical and Jennings made it three straight. Carolan caged another close in basket. Reget drew a technical and Carolan missed. Reget scored the first close in counter for the visitors. Carolan sunk his sixth and final basket for the half. Another technical was called on Rice as the gun announced intermission.

When play was resumed, Coach Keeler sent Reynolds in for Dahlgren with instructions to follow Carolan. This move had been anticipated and Carolan dropped back to the guard position in compliance with orders. This enabled Rice to score four times during this period.

The scoring began when Rice took a clever pass from Gurnoe and made a pretty side shot. Wright followed shortly with a tap in shot. It was neat work. Carolan broke loose again with a neat back board shot from center. Morrow relayed to Rice who shot and counted from the side line. He came back immediately and ran his total to three. Carolan shot and missed but followed up and batted in. Technical was called on Carolan and Jennings missed. Carolan took another long try from center and missed. Wright followed it in and scored. Thompson substituted for Jennings. La Crosse made a number of short attempts at scoring none of which materialized.

Morrow drew a technical and Thom-

son scored. Gurnoe counted on Carolan's rebound. Melvin was then sent in for Carolan. He was called for traveling and Thomson missed the free throw. Reget scored from behind the free throw line. Rice came in and counted his fourth basket after a series of the most sensational short passes in the game. It was wonderful work and drew a great deal of applause from the sidelines.

Olson was then sent in for Wright. Thomson scored after some neat team work by the visitors.

Mc Connel substituted for Reay. Melvin caged a close in shot as the result of another beautiful exhibition of the short pass. Chinnock was then substituted for Olson. Gurnoe completed the scoring for both teams with a clean shot from the foul line.
