### Look for truth says Bailey

Dr. Richard P. Bailey, president of Hamline University, St. Paul, will address the graduating seniors of WSU-RF at the commencement excerises in Karges Center, at 2 p.m. May 25.

Dr. Bailey, a native of Stockton, Ill., took office as 13th president of Hamline University on July 1, 1968. He received his B.A. degree from North Central College, Napierville, Ill., in 1943 and his M.A. and Ph.D. degrees from the University of Wisconsin, Madison, in 1959.

Dr. Bailey began his career as a high school English teacher in Belleville and Mansfield, Ohio, in 1946. In 1949 he taught English and journalism at Oshkosh State College, Oshkosh. He was research assistant for the Board of Regents of Wisconsin State Colleges from 1953 to 1957. From 1957 to 1959 he was the assistant director of the Wisconsin State Colleges. He was president of the Yakima Valley Junior College, Yakima, Wash., from 1959 to 1962. He was also president of Northland College, Ashland, Wis., from 1962 to 1968.

Dr. Bailey was past president of the Wisconsin Association of Independent Colleges and University and was a member of a number of state and national committees. In 1968 he was granted and honorary doctorate degree by Lakeland College.

During World War II Dr. Bailey served as a lieutenant in the the United States Navy commanding a minesweeper (YMS) in the South Pacific from 1942 to 1946.

Dr. Bailey married the former Olive Jean Hughes of Mansfield, Ohio, on December 12, 1943. They have five children, ranging in age from nine to 18. Mrs. Bailey is also a graduate of North Central College, with a degree in music.

Dr. Bailey has had many articles on education published in a dozen professional magazines. For six years he wrote a monthly column for the Wisconsin Journal of Education. He is a contributor to the National Educational Association; American Association of University Professors Bulletin; School and Society; Education Digest; Junior College Journal and University Business.

Dr. Bailey is listed on "Who's Who in American Education" and the latest editions of "Who's Who in the Midwest."

"I read in various polls that 60 per cent, 70 per cent, even 80 per cent of the general public believe that something must be done to quiet down young people." said Bailey in his Commencement Address.

He continued, "Key words today are "Law and order" and crack down on young people" and the eternal question that comes to me with disgusting regularity "Who's in Charge?"

The subject of his speech was Student Unrest. He said that in dealing with student unrest we should first try to understand today's young people. He then continued by saying that the youth of today aren't first generation activists;

Bailey then talked about the problems of youth as not being simplistic. He used the example of Vietnam and how the older generation forced this on the young.

"Third," Bailey continued, "we must try to understand the activist young person in an imperfect society. How did he get that way?...He got that way because we told him that things were wrong in our society and we asked him to do something about it."

Bailey later in his address related what

he told high school seniors about life. He told them they were heroes in a large drama, and institutions were villians trying to suppress them.

He continued by saying that seniors should never be lazy, and be drawn into the comfortable institutions; rather they should rise above the institutions and become heroes.

Bailey then told what he said to Hamline University honor students this spring. He said the establishment admires them, but will try to fool them, beat and jail the, and might not listen to them. He told them not to fall into the rut of tradition and to strive for their own truth and once finding it live in it.

He concluded, we (the older generation) must love our young people; we must understand them; must prove to them that rationality, justice, and wisdom are ours and can be theirs; and lastly we must listen to youth and change things which we can't defend, like Vietnam.

"I do not ask that we accomplish all things. But let us put an end to violence in action and in reaction. Rationally and humanely, old and young, LET US BEGIN."

### Hunt and Erlandson distinguished alumni

William Hunt and Ray Erlandson received Distinguished Alumni awards from Wisconsin State University-River Falls at commencement exercises today.

Announcement of the awards was made at a senior-alumni-faculty banquet Saturday evening. Hunt was the featured speaker at the annual event which honors graduating seniors and former students.

Hunt, executive vice president of Georgia-Pacific Co., graduated from River Falls in 1929. A Madison, Wis. native, Hunt now resides in Portland, Ore.

After graduation, Hunt taught and coached at Algoma, Wis., until 1935 when he became a salesman for Algoma Plywood & Veneer Co. The firm was absorbed by U.S. Plywood and Hunt rose to the offices of vice president, director and member of the executive committee. In 1957 he became vice president of Georgia-Pacific and has since assumed his present position.

Erlandson, current president of The Children's Fund foundation, was graduated from River Falls in 1914. He worked his way through school as a salesman then turned to teaching in Chippewa Falls, Wis and River Falls, Wis.

After serving in World War I, Erlandson turned to business and held offices as director of broadcasting for Majestic Radio, sales manager for automobile radio sales with Zenith Corp., vice president of the Wurlitzer Co., part owner of the San Antonio Music Co., and originator of the American School of the Air.

In 1953 he became chairman of Trinity College's department of business administration. He retired in 1964 to become president of The Children's Fund, 'a foundation for the education of economically handicapped young people of superior ability.'

1957 he became vice president of Georgia-Pacific and has since assumed his present position.

The Distinguished Alumni award is presented annually to graduates who have been of exceptional credit to WSU-RF.

## It's been a hectic year says 68/69 UC president

"It has been a rather hectic year to be United Council (UC) president with the student turmoil which has set the tone for bad relations with the state legislature and Board of Regents," said Bob Rasmussen. "It is particularly difficult to work through the channels as an elected representative of university students when other students are trying to destroy those same channels."

Rasmussen, 1968-69 President of UC (the state student government association for all nine Wisconsin State Universities) is one of 561 graduating seniors at WSU-RF on Sunday. His college years have been far from normal, however. He has served for three years on the Student Senate at WSU-RF, before being elected UC President in the spring of

"Ras" was graduated from Tomah High School in the spring of 1965. He had selected River Falls as the college he would attend as early as his freshman year in high school. He had heard of the fine reputation of the agriculture department at WSU-RF and decided that he would like to study agriculture in college. Rasmussen visited the campus and liked the small town atmosphere and the small campus itself.

In June of 1965 he was elected state Vice President of the Future Farmers of America (FFA). Through his work with FFA he met Bob Hubbard, who was going to attend WSU-RF in the fall of 1965, too. It was Hubbard, who was on the freshman nominations committee, who talked Rasmussen into running for a student government position at River Falls. He ran and was elected Freshman Class President in September, 1965. He thus served on the Student Senate all that year and was involved with many studentfaculty committees. In the spring of his freshman year, he was appointed to the University Judiciary Board and has served on that board for three years.

Rasmussen was elected to another term as a Student Senator at large for his sophomore year. He served as Senate treasurer during the 1966-67 school year, as well as serving as a Resident Assistant at Grimm Hall and pledging Theta Chi (then Sigma Tau Epsilon) fraternity.

He began attending UC meetings when he was a freshman, too, and has estimated that he has attended 12 General Assem-

blies and 11 President's Councils in his four years at River Falls.

In the spring of his sophomore year Rasmussen decided to run for another year as a Student Senator at large. He easily won another term and was elected as President of Senate for the school year 1967-68-his junior year at WSU-RF.

In May 1968 "Ras" was elected Presisident of UC. Under his administration the UC budget has been expanded from \$1500 to \$7500 per year. He worked for this budget even before being elected President, "I drew up the first expanded budget proposal," said Rasmussen, "And worked with the nine state university presidents for four months before it was passed."

"This increased budget has enabled us to expand our activities, particularly in the area of state level representation by at least four to five fold," he

Last Tuesday Rasmussen was awarded the "Gold R Award" for maintaining a 3.5 Grade Point Average over the last two years at the University. He will graduate from River Falls with an overall 3.4 GPA and a Bachelor of Science degree in Agriculture Business.

For the past five summers Rasmussen has worked for one of the largest irrigated vegetable farms (3000 acres) in Wisconsin, which is located south of Stevens Point. "This summer I am unemployed....hint, hint!" he said.

"Whatever job I get this summer will have to be higher-paying than in the previous summers." The reason being, is that Rasmussen will enter the University of Wisconsin Law School in the fall. He took the Law School Admissions Test (LSAT) earlier this year and

passed in the upper 90 percentile. He has also applied at the Harvard Law School, but has not had a reply as yet.

Rasmussen received a \$600 Knapp Scholarship to attend UW next year. He expects problems with the draft board, however. He currently has a 2-S deferment until October, and expects to be drafted in January, 1970, "unless there would be some change in the present ruling on graduate deferments."

"When I get out of law school I would like to get into state government, whether I take a job with the government or get elected to a position," he said.

Rasmussen stated that if there was any portion of his education that he was disappointed in, it was the fact that 'A haven't been able to obtain a better background in areas such as philosophy, history and political science."

In summing up his four years on the River Falls campus, Rasmussen said: "I have seen student government change from a body more concerned with social activities, to a group more concerned with social change. This trend is reflected on college campuses all across the nation."

As far as WSU-RF is concerned, Rasmussen would like to see the University granted the College of Veterinary Medicine, "which is almost a reality," he stated
