TEAM TAKES FIRST TRIMMING

Long Shots of Carleton
Man Prove Too Much

The hard trip, combined with an overload of long shots by Hutton, left forward of the Carleton squad, built up an obstacle the Red and White were unable to surmount, and after holding Carleton to a tight score during the first half lost the game with a final score of 31-17.

During the first half Carleton was unable to make much headway against Eggebrecht's five men defense, although they led at the end of the first half 15-7. River Falls missed many baskets during this half and gained little via the free-throw route, Ziebell's throws falling short of the basket. Near the close of the period Claflin received an injury which kept him from working at his usual gait.

The second half opened with fast and furious play, with Carleton unable to break through the defense. The Collegians changed their tactics confining their tries to long shots. Hutton proved adept in this department, caging six in that number of attempts all from beyond the center of the floor, giving Carleton a generous lead.

Carleton resorted to stalling during the remainder of the period but lost the ball twice to River Falls for field baskets. Ziebell was decidedly off, his shooting of free throws missing repeatedly. Field and Claflin led a very good defense, but this could not hold Hutton on long shots.

Carleton has a well filled schedule and will not play a return game at River Falls. We are confident that our team would be able to turn the tables if a chance were given for a game on the home floor.

TEACHERS' COL- LEGES RECOGNIZE FALLS SCHOOL

Mr. O. M. Hanna Selected for Judge
In National Contest

Dean H. C. Menich of Teachers' College, Miami University, Oxford, Ohio, has asked Mr. O. M. Hanna of the English department to act as one of the judges of the syllabi in English, collected by the committee on Standards and Surveys of the National Council of Teachers' Colleges. The manuscripts will be judged sometime between January 25 and February 20. This contest is nationwide and produced some of the best work of its kind in the United States.

It will be remembered that Mr. Davison was awarded first place on his history syllabus last year in a similar contest, conducted by the National Council of Teachers' Colleges.

The fact that River Falls Normal School can draw requests and be accepted by the teachers' colleges of other states in their contentions shows its capability of handling a four year college course.

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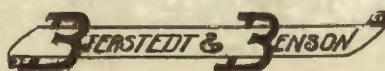
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
