### PAGEANT A SUCCESS

Mrs. Anne Hocking Smith and those who assisted her in the presentation of the Ben Hur Pageant are to be complimented upon the success of the pageant. When one considers the immense amount of labor necessary in the presentation of a pageant of this kind, it seems miraculous that such finish of style and special regard to detail could be secured in a maximum of ten days' work.

Its purpose was twofold. Primarily that of earning substantial proceeds for the hospital, and secondly as a pleasing form of entertainment. The purpose was fully realized and those who attended felt that their money was well spent.

The stage settings and lighting effects were beautifully artistic, enhancing the beauty of the costumes so that the audience was easily transported to the realities of the life of old Rome where an atmosphere of wealth and elegance pervaded.

The pageant opened with a procession of 150 girls passing in review, their costumes producing an effect of exquisite beauty against a dark background. They were followed by the cast of Ben Hur. Here special lighting effects were used to display each member as he passed before the audience. The scenes from Ben Hur which followed were perfect in detail. Each player was a star and seemed to live the part which he interpreted. Between the scenes of the play the spectators were entertained by interpretative drills, among which were the Oriental Fire Worshipers and the Dance by the Bubble Girls. ### CONTINUE STRIDE

#### River Falls 7—Superior 0

Our on-rushing football team continued its winning stride last Saturday by handing the Superior Normal team a neat 7 to 0 trimming. After playing two hard-fought games with Carleton and St. Thomas in preparation for a conference start, the Red and White journeyed northward with the old-time pep and confidence which will undoubtedly feature another championship year. Saturday's tilt was the first conference game for Captain Bliss and his mates, who will fight for the remainder of the season in conference circles.

After taking a beating from Eau Claire Normal on the previous Saturday, Coach Loop's northern aggregation came back in a strong manner as is shown by the score. They had a well balanced team of a shifty type which called for some real football from Coach Hayward's men. They were in the game from the start so the seven points registered in the first quarter was never a safe margin.

#### Long Pass Features Scoring

River Falls received on the kick-off and made a brilliant start when Olson returned the ball thirty yards before being downed. Things looked big the first couple of times the ball was carried. By a series of line plunges the "Falls" made two consecutive first downs. After this temporary advance, the northerners braced and held. Getting possession of the ball Superior retreated in apt manner by starting the ball back. After running the oval to mid-field, the fight came to a dead lock which lasted until the close of the quarter. With only a few minutes of the quarter left and the ball in the "Falls" possession in mid-field, Chinnock completed a long pass to Gurnoe. The pass was well gauged and fell to Gurnoe amid a host of scrambling enemy. Gurnoe went down on Superior's ten-yard line. On line plunges, the ball was advanced to the enemy's six-yard line when Superior was penalized five yards for being off-side. With one yard to go for a touchdown, Bill Smith went over for six of the seven points. Gurnoe added another point by kicking goal.

For the remaining three-quarters the teams battled evenly with only one serious threat to score. During the second and third quarters, the northmen played brilliantly only to give way somewhat in the final quarter. In this period the Falls gang made a

## EAU CLAIRE GAME CANCELLED

Much to the disappointment of the big pep element of the school, the Eau Claire football game scheduled for next Friday has been cancelled. It was a disappointment, indeed, because of the ruination of a big excursion to Eau Claire as was anticipated by over a hundred of the students and faculty. The game for Friday was viewed by the students as the big affair; with the exception of the La Crosse game. Friday was to be a vacation day for the school, but the day of liberty has been postponed for a week from Friday when we are to celebrate a day of days and see a game of games; that of River Falls vs. La Crosse.

The reason for the cancellation of the Eau Claire game is one of ineligibility. It has been proven that Eau Claire has been playing three or four men who are ineligible for conference football.

The Stevens Point and Superior games, that were won by Eau Claire, have been protested and forfeited to the losers. With this record attached to a team, it is very unnecessary and would be an injustice to conference football to play them.

Since the beginning of athletics at Eau Claire Normal, our school has enjoyed a very friendly relation in athletics with our worthy neighbor. We have met their teams in all branches of athletics. They have always been a very worthy opponent and have represented a very sportsmanlike grade of athletics. For these reasons, we sincerely regret that existing conditions, such as they alone are responsible for, have caused this cancellation.

If we were to give them a game under present conditions, we should be wrongly endangering conference sports and encouraging a displacing of conference athletics by the professional brand. This we cannot afford to do if we are to maintain our present standard of sports.

### Regulations Governing Normal School Students in Rooming Houses

#### I—On the Part of Householder

1. Men and women must not room in the same house.
2. Proper and sufficient light, heat and linen must be furnished.
3. In the case of women students, a parlor for the reception of callers should be provided on the first floor.
4. Callers should not remain after 10 p. m.
5. Students are expected to keep their room for a semester.

#### II—On Part of the Student.

1. Study hours should be observed from 7:30 p. m. to 10 p. m.
2. Students should not be on the streets after 7:30 p. m.
3. There should be quiet in the house during study hours and after 10 p. m.
4. There should be no social calls or functions on study nights, except those given or approved by the school.
5. No callers should remain after 10 p. m.
6. Students should notify householder when they are to be away from home later than 10 p. m., overnight, or out of town.
7. When adequate reason exists for a change of boarding or rooming place, the consent of the President or Dean of Women must be secured before any change is made.

NOTE—These regulations are made for the purpose of establishing a common standard of action which will foster good health, good scholarship, and good citizenship among the students of River Falls. A spirit of helpful co-operation from householders and students will make these simple rules effective. Cases of persistent or willful disregard of regulations should be reported at once to the President or the Dean of Women.

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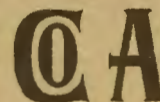
