RED AND WHITE GRID

TEAM TAKES OPENER

Playing in good early-season form, the Normal football team defeated the strong Shattuck Military Academy eleven 7 to 0 on Ramer Field last Wednesday afternoon in the first game of the season. The score does not indicate the relative strength of the teams, for at no time was the Normal goal in danger while the Cadets' goal was continually threatened. The greater part of the game was played in Shattuck's territory, and only costly fumbles and penalties kept the Normalites from further scoring. The team, although playing rather loosely and far from mid-season form, showed the making of a team of championship calibre.

Clapp, veteran guard, starred with his fierce tackling. Several times he downed the Cadet safety in his tracks, and twice he recovered the ball on fumbles. Morgan, as usual, was a demon at end, spearing three passes for good gains and breaking up all plays around his side of the line. Clanton and Butenhoff alternated at the other end. Captain Murphy played in his old time form. Fields played at center creditably and with a little more seasoning should fill that gap. Three men were tried at left guard: Garretson, Cole and Seefeldt. Lippke held down the tackle opposite Captain Murphy and showed up well.

Standish, Johnson and Fahland performed in good style and look like fixtures in the backfield. Fahland showed strong at defense and all were consistent ground-gainers. Melvin and Raabe alternated at quarter. Both showed good judgment in piloting the team.

Details of the game:

Shattuck received on the kick-off on their thirty-yard line and returned the ball five yards. On the third down they lost the ball on a fumble. A series of line plunges failed to net any ground and Shattuck gained possession of the ball again. They were

forced to punt after three unsuccessful attempts to gain ground. A pass from Murphy to Morgan netted ten yards. Two line plunges by Standish added six more yards. An incomplete pass followed and Murphy was forced to punt. A pass and three line plunges failed to make ten yards and the Cadets lost the ball on downs. The quarter ended with the ball in our possession on Shattuck's forty-yard line. Raabe replaced Melvin at quarter and Clanton, Butenhoff at end. This quarter was pretty much a repetition of the first. Shattuck fumbled twice, Clapp recovered each time. Raabe circled left end for a run of fifteen yards. The half ended with the ball in Shattuck's possession on their fifteen yard line.

Second Half:—

In the third quarter Captain Murphy and his mates opened up with some real football and marched steadily down the field for their one and only touchdown. A series of line-plunges and end-runs by Fahland, Standish and Johnson placed the ball on Shattuck's one-yard line and Fahland went over for a touchdown. Murphy kicked goal. Score 7 to 0.

The fourth quarter began with Melvin at quarter again. Cole and Seefeldt were given trials at guard in place of Garretson. The ball was in our possession in Shattuck's territory during the greater part of this quarter. A fifteen yard pass from Murphy to Morgan and the tackling of Clapp featured the quarter. The game ended with the ball in our possession on Shattuck's forty-yard line.

Shattuck made first down four times, River Falls thirteen times. Shattuck gained sixty-seven yards through the line, River Falls gained 159 yards.

The Normal Farm exhibited 7 head of cattle and 4 head of hogs at the county fair last week. A large number of cattle were shown by several exhibitors and the competition was keen. The herd was quite successful in the showing, getting first on the herd sire and also on a 2-year-old heifer, two second prizes, one third and one fourth. The Farm also took first in sweepstakes, Produce of Dam. In view of the fact that the herd is only two years old and that we were competing against breeders with several years of experience, the showing was very good. This week the herd is being shown at the St. Croix County Fair at New Richmond.
