The Editor Says

Under the chairmanship of George White, the committees are doing a really super job. But don't forget that they can't do it alone. Let's all get behind them and make February 15 and 16 an unforgettable weekend for everyone.

In this age of development, it is of great importance that we have diversified interests. The purpose of extra-curricular activities is to help create and foster varied interests among the students. Here on campus we have many such organizations in a number of fields including music, athletics for both men and women, dramatics, journalism, art, mathematics, and many others. Broaden your mental scope by being active in at least one organization.

The popularity of the Tuesday and Thursday afternoon coffee hours has really justified the work of the girls who sponsor the service. It's surprising how much a cup of coffee can brighten one's outlook at 4 o'clock in the afternoon and give one the strength to go on. SHOULD WE ALLOW FILIBUSTERING IN CONGRESS

Does any senator or group of senators have the right to filibuster indefinitely? This problem is currently brought into focus by the Southern Democratic filibuster against the F.-E.P.C. led by Senator Bilbo.

Regardless of our position on the bill in question, there is a deeper question involved. None would deny the senate freedom of debate; yet why should important legislation be retarded while one senator wastes the senate's time correcting the Congressional Records?

In truth, the filibuster is a cowardly, underhanded method of gaining an end. Why is a filibuster attempted? Because a minority cannot hope to defeat a measure by their votes, and therefore resort to talking in an effort to prevent the bill from being considered. Are such tactics in keeping with the Democratic principle of majority rule?

Perhaps in the day when life moved at a slower pace and there were not so many matters to be legislated upon, filibustering had a place. Today, when normally the legislature scarcely has time to consider all of the important issues, the practice is certainly outmoded. Filibustering should be outlawed by common consent, if not by law.

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BOOKS BY FIELD AND THURBER ADDED TO LIBRARY

Two new library books worthy of popular attention are Marshall Field's "FREEDOM IS ONLY A WORD" and James Thurber's "THE WHITE DEER". Field's addition to books written on the ideals in a democracy is a compact work stressing freedom of expression. "...there is special interest in that Mr. Field can describe how he is using the tremendous financial resources at his command to translate a credo into reality".

In a lighter vein, humorist Thurber writes of a land where "...rabbits can tip their heads as men now tip their hats, removing them with their paws and putting them back again." "THE WHITE DEER" is a fantasy in prose that is almost poetry. The drawings make the reading fun. Adult readers will enjoy this serene and beautiful fairy tale.

R.F.S.T.C. Falcons Hit 5 Game Losing Streak

The Falcons played host to the strong Eau Claire Teachers College team Wednesday evening Jan. 23 and fell victim to the hot shooting Blue and Gold by a score of 65 to 49.

The Eau Claire club which has lost but one game this season got off to a whirlwind start as they split the net with five out of their first six shots. The Falcons tried gamely to get back into the game but simply couldn't connect on their long shots while Denny Helixon was going on a scoring rampage for Eau Claire. Thanks to Helixon's one hand push shots the Blue and Gold had a comfortable 33 to 19 lead at half-time.

River Falls opened the second half with grim determination and for fifteen minutes made it a ball game, at times cutting Eau Claire's lead to 8 points. This offensive was led by 'Farmer' Hanson and 'Donny' Baird, both of whom were doing great work under the basket. But in the meantime, the Falcons were having their hands full with Helixon and Babington and Eau Claire pulled away from the tiring River Falls club to make the final score 65 to 49.

Hanson meshed 17 points and Baird had 10 to pace the Falcons while Berggren had 8 to aid the cause. For Eau Claire, Helixon had one of his greatest nights as he poured in 27 points and Babington tossed in 12. Davies, another high scoring forward, was held to 6 points, but Helixon's scoring splurge more than made up for it.

Concordia Whips R.F.

On Saturday evening Jan. 26th River Falls S. T. C. invaded Concordia College of St. Paul and went down to their fourth straight defeat 38 to 33. It was the poorest game played by the Falcons all year, which can be realized by the fact that River Falls whipped this same Concordia team by a 52 to 33 margin in the first game of the season.

River Falls simply couldn't get started. Their shooting was miserable and their passing was wild and erratic. The only bright spot of the game as far as the Falcons were concerned was the nice shooting of Freshman center Jim Moore who tossed in 10 points to lead the River Falls scoring. Otto and Maltsky paced the winning Concordia team.

Close Game With Stout

Tuesday evening Jan. 29th. saw the Falcons absorb their

fifth straight defeat as Stout edged River Falls 45 to 41 in a thrilling and rough encounter at Menomonie.

Stout roared into a quick lead as their big center Wutii batted in a couple of buckets to give Stout a 7 to 0 lead before Moore hit from the corner for the Falcons. After Stout had run the score to 12 to 3 Coach Schlagenhauf replaced his shock troops with the regular starters, Moore stayed at center position, however and hit for three consecutive corner shots to keep the Falcons in the game. Stout held on to a six point lead which made it 26 to 20 at half-time.

The second half saw the Falcons come back with a vengeance and twice Foss and Berggren intercepted passes to score and tie the game at 27 all. From then on it was a nip and tuck battle. Twice the Falcons went into the lead 30 to 29 and 33 to 32 but Stout regained the lead as Wutii slipped in a basket and added a free throw. Then Adams hit for two long ones to give Stout a lead they held to the end of the game.

River Falls had a miserable night as far as free throws were concerned. In all they missed 19 charity tosses while making only 11. In other departments of play they were much improved over the Concordia game and gave Stout a battle all the way. Moore continued his fine shooting by counting 11 points while 'Bud' Foss hit for 10. Big Wutii had 12 for Stout but he was given quite a bit of help by the officials whose handling of the game was at times pretty bad.

INTRAMURAL TEAMS COMPETE

The boys intramural basketball league has been organized and is well underway.

The favorite and leading team is, "Six Old Men". Putting in their bid for second place honors we find the "Rapid Rabbits", "Battle Babies" and "Quiz Kids" in close competition. The "House of Nelson" and "The Flying Dutchmen" are not to be pushed into the background, however.

In last week's games the "Quiz Kids" defeated the "Battle Babies" 51 to 39 while the "Old Men" trounced over the "House of Nelson" 54 to 35.
