men and 186 women completing their courses of study. Over half of the graduates are from the College of Education. Of the 286 who have graduated, 142 will receive bachelor of science degrees in secondary education, 135 will receive bachelor of science degrees in junior high education and four have bachelors degrees in music education. The women outnumber the men 158 to 128.

The second largest number came from the College of Arts and Sciences. Bachelor of science degrees were issued

to 100 men and 20 women and bachelor of arts degrees have gone to eight men and three women for a total of 131.

The College of Agriculture graduated 65 men. Thirty-seven have bachelor of science degrees in agriculture, 27 have graduated with bachelor of science in agricultural education and one has a bachelor of science in earth science.

Finally 18 have earned master of science degrees in teaching from the Graduate school. These included 13 men and five women.

Wall, Luberg Distinguished Alumni

Dr. E. H. Kleinpell, president of Wisconsin State University-River Falls presented two Distinguished Alumnus Awards today at commencement ceremon-

The awards were presented to LeRoy Luberg, class of 1930, and posthumously, to the late Dr. Melvin Wall, class of 1936.

Luberg, a native of River Falls, is dean for public services at the University of Wisconsin. He gave the commencement address at River Falls.

Wall, who died in a plane crash March 25 in Vietnam, was chairman of the plant and earty science department in the River Falls College of Agriculture. He was a member of a survey team studying Vietnamese universities for the U.S. Agency for International Development.

Luberg holds the master of philosophy and the Ph.D. degrees from the University of Wisconsin.

He became principal of West Junior High School in Madison at 24 and served as principal of the summer laboratory schools at the University of Wisconsin from 1938-41. In March, 1947, he accepted a special assignment with the U.S. Office of Education as an administrator of the Lanham Act.

In September, 1951, he was named assistant to the University of Wisconsin's President E. B. Fred and later became assistant vice-president of academic affairs. He became dean of students in September, 1957 and has been dean for public services since October, 1963.

Dr. Luberg interrupted his career in education to volunteer as a private in the infantry in September, 1942, ending his duty in World War II with the rank of major and later attaining the rank of lieutenant colonel and chief of staff for the 84th Airborne division, which he helped organize after he returned to the United States from his duty with the O.S.S. in the China-Burma-India theater.

In 1951 he accepted a civilian position with the foreign branch of the Central Intelligence Agency and in 1957 took a leave of absence from his University duties to serve as executive secretary to Gov. Vernon W. Thomson.

Wall joined the faculty of River Falls in 1940. Previously, he was vocational agriculture instructor at Roberts High School for two years. He received his B.S. degree from Wisconsin State University-River Falls in 1936 and his M.S. and Ph.D. degrees from the University of Wisconsin.

During the summers of 1940-45, Dr. Wall was in soil conservation work in Vernon county. He was active in civic and community affairs and was chairman of the Campus Development Committee at River Falls. He did much of the planning for a committee project, the beautification of the South Fork area of the campus. An amphitheatre he planned was designated the Melvin Wall amphitheatre by the Board of Regents.

Prof. Wall also was honored in a series on leading agronomists published in Crops and Soils Magazine.

This year marked the first time the University gave more than one Distinguished Alumnus Award. One has been given each year since 1958.

During his 21 years as President of WSU-RF, President Kleinpell has seen many changes and many new things appear on this campus.



and growth for Wisconsin State University-River Falls. Not only changes in the way the campus looks, but changes that will make a significant difference in the future of WSU-RF.

A change that is already being felt and that will be felt in the future is the resignation of President E. H. Kleinpell. Dr. Kleinpell has been a part of WSU-RF for the last 21 years-the years that spanned the growth of the state institutions from Teachers Colleges to state Universities.

After twelve years as dean of students, Dr. B. J. Rozehnal resigned this year. Dean Rozehnal has been a part of WSU-RF for the last 35 years. He was appointed dean of men in 1947 and director of student personnel in 1948. He plans to assume the job of registrar next year while Melvin Germanson is on leave.

The biology department will be minus two people who have been the core of that department almost from the beginning. Miss Lieneman has been at River Falls since 1936 teaching plant pathology and botany courses. Dr. Lieneman is retiring in June. Dr. B. H. Kettlekamp will also be retiring in June. He has been part of the biology department since 1935. Although he is the head of the biology department, he will be remembered as a teacher. As one student said when he heard that Dr. Kettlekamp was to retire, "He's the most interesting, the best teacher I've ever had."

The death of Dr. Melvin L. Wall in a plane crash in South Viet Nam was a great loss to the University. He was one of eight U. S. educato ving the uni-

This has indeed been a year of change versities at Saigon, Hue and Can Tho. He joined the WSU-RF faculty in 1940 and was chairman of the Campus Development Committee, planning the amphitheater which was later designated the Melvin Wall Amphitheater by the Board of Re-

Among those coming to WSU-RF next

year is Dr. Walker Wyman, previously a history professor at WSU-RF for thirty years, recently resigned his post as president of Whitewater State University and will return to teach history here.

going up. Last fall two new dorms were occupied for the first time. McMillan, the women's dorm was named in honor of Mary McMillan, a math teacher at WSU-RF. The men's dorm, Grimm, was named after Jay H. Grimm, long-time regent.

Presently under construction are two more dorms, one for men and one for wo-

In the area (old Ramer Field) of the new dorms a food center is being constructed. The food center, which is expected to be in operation by Jan. 1, 1968, will serve 2,400 students in two seatings. It will also include a complete kitchen, bakery, lounge areas, meeting rooms and four dining rooms.

Plans are under way for the \$1.7 million addition to the Chalmer--Davee Library. The addition will add 70,000 square feet of space to the current facilities. Among the additions are offices, classrooms, an instructional materials center, an audiovisual department, a microfilm room and the Area Research Center. The wing will be built onto the southern extension of the present library.

Money was granted by the State Building Commission for a Fine Arts Building this year. Plans are presently being drawn up and the location is being determined. The proposals include teaching laboratories for speech and theater students and a Theater House with a 300 seat capacity, art and music laboratories with a 300 seat recital hall.

The building will also have 2,500 square feet of classroom space and 10,000 square feet of office space. Altogether, it is estimated that there will be 40,000 square feet of usable space.
