It is hard to pick any one outstanding man in this year's lineup. Nate De Long, a product of Chippewa Falls is the leading scorer and rebound man. Eugene Deiss of River Falls and Newman Benson of Drummond are constant scoring threats and many will say there isn't a finer ball handler in collegiate basketball than Benson. Harry Gibbs, hail ing from Madison is the long shot opponents defense with his almost uncanny ability to hit from the center of the floor. Jack Henneman, the big guard, also hails from River Falls, and there isn't a better defensive man on the team. He is a good ball handler and is invaluable because of his fine play making ability.

Just Reminiscing . . . Falcons Set Record

As we browse through the records of River Falls basketball teams since 1895 we find that in handing the La Crosse Indians a stinging 89 - 60 defeat, our Falcons set an all-time single game scoring record for River Falls quintets and notched the first conference championship since 1930. This is the eighth basketball championship for the Falls since the 1915-16 quint first brought home the bacon.
