FALCONS ATTEMPT THE IMPOSSIBLE AT BELOIT

Lose N.A.I.B. Tourney Playoff by 10 Points

River Falls fell before the almost impossible task of defeating Beloit on the big Beloit floor. The Falcons gave Beloit a much better game than anybody on the other side of the State had thought possible. After seeing the game, we'll string along with Coach Schlagenhaut, that we would beat them on our own floor and will also add that it would really be a toss up on any neutral floor.

The game started out very slow with both teams showing signs of nervousness. The teams exchanged the lead several times until the five minutes of the first half when the Falcons had a defensive lapse, permitting Beloit to hold a 32-25 half time lead.

River Falls came back strong in the second half and pulled up within three points of Beloit. Then the big floor began to tell on the Falcons as Beloit extended its lead to 10 points on the tiring locals with the final score being 71-61.

Beloit's defense was the difference in the game. They were like shadows on our men when we had the ball. This made it almost impossible to work our usual offense. Benson played his best game of the season and his push shot was at its best as he scored 16 points. Nate DeLong was the game's high scorer with 20 points and he scored almost every chance he had. The AP chart shows Nate making 7 out of 14 field goal attempts and 6 out of 7 free throw attempts.

Johnny Orr, the whiz kid, played a bang-up game for Beloit as he bagged 16 points along with a sensational floor game.

Comforting thought: Coach Zorn assured us after the game that the playoff conditions next year would be different. His hands were tied this year, but now he has a substantial argument and he is determined that there will be a fair play-off next year.

ADMINISTRATORS MEET; TALK SHOP

Selmer Berg, Superintendent of St. Paul schools, spoke on "Schools for Students" at the annual School Administrator's conference at the State Teachers College, River Falls, Saturday, March 6. School officials from the western Wisconsin area gathered at the all-day session to discuss their mutual problems.

President E. H. Kleinpell of River Falls State Teachers College opened the conference at 10:00 a. m. with the address, "What the College can do for the Region." Other speakers included Supt. Ray Glynn, Frederic; Supt. E. P. Rock, Hudson; Supt. D. K. Lien, Amery; Gordon Holmgren, St. Croix Falls County Normal; Tryn DeCracium, a student at River Falls from Clear Lake; and the following staff members of the River Falls college: Dr. Gordon Stone, Russell Johnston, Miss Lura Curriers, and Dr. Walker D. Wyman, chairman of the conference.

Subjects to be discussed include "The College and the Region", "The School in Transition", and "The Problems of the Elementary Teacher."

Editor Wallace Leaves School

The editor for the Student Voice, Jack Wallace, left at the end of the Winter term with plans for transferring into Law School at Drake University during the summer quarter.

"I wish River Falls offered the course that I want," was his remark before leaving. "I liked it here very much and I am somewhat doubtful about entering a large university."

Jac Wallace entered RFSTC in the Winter quarter last year after being discharged from the Army Air Corps. He had previously attended Michigan State College for one year in 1944. He had accumulated more than enough credits for his pre-law work in this time.

Debaters Rank High In N.W. Tournament

PLACE FOURTH IN DECISIONS AND POINTS

The college debaters placed high in the 17th Annual Northwest Tournament at St. Thomas, March 1, 2, and 3. This is the only major speech tournament in the nation which is devoted exclusively to debate. Competing with 68 teams representing 42 colleges and universities from 10 states, River Falls placed fourth in decisions and fourth in points earned for debating technique. It was the only Wisconsin college to enter the quarter finals.

The RFSTC teams won decisions from such colleges as: Jamestown College, Jamestown, N. D.; St. Olaf, a finalist; Notre Dame University; Knox College; Illinois State Normal University; Huron College, Huron, S. D.; Drake University, Des Moines, Ia.; Mankato Teachers College; and Carleton College. Each of these colleges has had an outstanding debate record for years.

The Newton Nelson-Louis Daniel combination chalked up another enviable tournament record of seven wins out of eight debates and earned 196 points on technique. This made their season record of 21 wins out of 24 debates the highest for any single team in the northwest. They were defeated by a narrow margin in the first round of the finals by Augustana College of Rock Island, Ill., tournament winners.

The ROSENFELD PIANO DUO will appear here on March 15 at 8:00 p. m. in the auditorium. Jane and Joan Rosenfeld, identical twins, will give mid-western music enthusiasts two fold entertainment on their present tour.

Wearing identical concert gowns, playing identical pianos and presenting identical appearances on the stage, the "carbon copy twins" have received the highest acclaim of critics and musicians in New York and other eastern music centers. Audiences as well as critics have joined in praise of the polished, smoothly blended combine.

The duplicate duo began serious music study at the age of 10 under the direction of Otto Schlaff of Verona, New Jersey, closely followed by a three year study under Carl Roeder of the Julliard School of Music in New York. They are at present under the able guidance of Vronsky and Babin, noted Russian born pianists, who have won acclaim in the concert field.

FROM RUMANIA TO RFSTC

Though few know it, one of the students here at RFSTC has the distinction of being foreign born. He has had several years of experience teaching and since his enrollment at River Falls, has been in classes with some of his former students.

Tryn J. DeCracium was born near O'beba, a small village in Banat county of the Hungarian sector of Romania. His parents were of peasant families and lived in neighboring villages. They did not meet one another until they came to this country. Tryn's father worked in the tanneries of St. Paul. After three years

of life in America, Tryn's mother went back to Romania to get her brother and bring him back to America. It was then that Tryn was born. They lived in Romania three years and then returned to the U. S.

From St. Paul, their first home in this new world, the De Craciums moved to St. Louis, Mo. Because of Mr. DeCracium's work the family transferred back and forth between St. Paul and St. Louis a couple of times and in 1925 settled on a farm six miles east of Clear Lake, Wis.

Tryn's education started in St. Paul. This included the first seven grades. His eighth grade training began at Clear Lake and here he continued until he finished high school.

After graduating from high school, Tryn spent one year as a grocery clerk in St. Paul. In 1931 he furthered his education at the Polk County Normal located in St. Croix Falls, Wis. He took a one year rural teacher's course. In 1932 he taught at Bear Lake, Wis. In 1933 Tryn enrolled at Superior State Teachers college, and upon leaving there qualified for a two year state-graded position. In 1935 the teacher for the grades five through eight at the Edgewood School located in Clayton, Wis., was none other than Tryn.

On June 12, 1942, Tryn entered the army at Ft. Sheridan, Ill., and eventually attained the rank of first sergeant in the ground forces of the Army Air Force. On December 14, 1945, he left the armed forces at March Field, Riverside, Calif.

One month after his discharge, Tryn accepted the principalship of the state-graded school at Conrath, Wis. Here he taught the eighth grade.

Tryn enrolled at RFSTC as a junior in September 1946, taking a junior high school course. This year he is a senior and hopes to graduate with a BS degree.

Tryn never wanted to teach. He wanted to go to medical school, but the depression came and he started teaching. He liked it so well that he has no desire to quit now.

A person of many capabilities, Tryn is the YMCA secretary and the president of the Men's Glee Club.

The luckiest thing that ever happened to him, he claims, is coming to America and says he has been lucky ever since.

We were sorry to note that as editor you deemed it necessary to print the column headed "Sports Retorts" in your February 23 issue of "The Spectator". The tone of ridicule that it assumed we felt to be unfair and unprovoked.

It is true that many of the faults which your columnist, Mike Karrow, finds with our gymnasium exist. Because of the limited capacity of our gymnasium and the large number of persons who wish to attend the games, it is often impossible to make adequate seating arrangements. Educational Survey Conducted by Time

The influence of education on political attitudes and predictions is primary among the factors to be measured in an unprecedented international survey of public opinion, sponsored by Time, The Weekly News magazine.

The polling, which has just been completed, was conducted by Elmo Roper in the U. S. and by eight other research organizations in Britain, France, Italy, Sweden, Switzerland, Germany, Brazil, Mexico and Canada. Tabulation of answers is now underway and results will be published in the April 12 issue of Time, James A. Linen, publisher of the magazine said today.

Survey questions concern the differences existing among nations outside the Russian sphere. Interviewers sought answers from people of all educational and economic levels in the 11 countries. Attitudes toward the Marshall Plan and individual reasons for favoring or opposing it were polled, with a notation of the formal schooling of each person interviewed. Respondents were asked to estimate the chances of the United Nations to maintain peace, and were called upon to evaluate concepts of a "United States of Europe" and a "United States of The World."

People in the 10 countries under survey were asked which side they believed was gaining ground in the present conflict between Russia and America, and to predict which side they would be on 20 years from now. Survey results will also chart individual estimates of the existence and relative importance of political, economic and civil rights in the various nations.

The survey seeks to define specific areas of disagreement among the western nations. "The arbitrators of international disagreements must deal with millions of individual attitudes—some based on misconceptions and other on genuine differences of opinion," Mr. Linen said.

The program will include four rounds of debate and a noon luncheon with discussions. An innovation of this year's tournament will be a trophy sponsored by the local chapter of Pi Kappa Delta and donors on the debate squad.

River Falls will be represented by three inexperienced teams. They are: Marlyn Eslinger and John Rockman, Dave Benson and Dick Yde, and Bill Miller and Nancy Murry. This will be their first inter-collegiate competition.

The 1948 World Student Service Fund appeal will be launched here Wednesday, March 17, with a showing of the Academy Award winning film "Seeds of Destiny", according to Chuck Taylor, YMCA president.

Final arrangements for the drive were made recently by representatives of the "Y" and the Interdenominational Council.

"Seeds of Destiny" is a hard-hitting documentary movie filmed since the war by the war department. It was made to acquaint the public with the terrible want and starvation conditions which prevail in many foreign countries. Students who have seen the movie say it is one of the most powerful films of our times. It won a 1946 Academy Award for documentary films.

Immediately following the movie, which is scheduled for 10:00 a. m. in the auditorium, students will be asked to contribute to the WSSF appeal. The WSSF is an organization of American students and professors formed for the purpose of helping deserving students in war-torn countries of the world. Most of the aid is in the form of supplies and medical aid.

All campus organizations are being asked to back the 1948 drive so that the 1947 mark may be exceeded.

Falcons Wallop Winona; Lose To Stout

With a conference championship tucked safely under their belts the RFSTC basketball team proceeded to close their regular season schedule by defeating Winona State Teachers 96-48, and losing their last conference game to Stout Institute 61-52.

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CAPTAIN FIELDING GIVES TIMELY TALK TO STUDENTS

A flat prediction that 50,000 to 75,000 American troops will be in Palestine by the end of the year to keep order was made by Capt. Michael Fielding in an address here Wednesday, February 25.

Fielding, a journalist and World War I Indian army captain, also predicted that there will be much bloodshed in the Middle East when the British withdraw August 1 and that Russia will throw its support to the Arabs then.

Russian agreement with the U. S. on the Palestine partition plan was trap into which we have blundered, he said. Now, he stated, we can do no more than match Russia division for division in the military forces which the partition plan will require in Palestine.

The much-traveled lecturer attacked the Zionist position, and said that all the Arabs of the Middle East have gained independence except the Palestinian Arabs.

"Facts show that the (Zionist state) cannot be upheld on the basis of legality, equity, and justice", he said. The Balfour declaration, according to Fielding, is as much a pledge to protect Arab rights as it is a pledge for the establishment of a Jewish homeland in Palestine.

Captain Fielding told the assembly that the United States must face facts and assume world leadership or Russia will do it.

President Travels To Chicago Meeting

Present in Chicago at this time are Dr. Kleinpell and Dr. Kettlekamp where they attend the annual meeting of the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools.

Programs at the meeting extend March 8-12 and center around the theme of the role of education in American democracy and international affairs.

RFSTC is a member of the North Central Association and the American Association of Colleges for Teacher Education.

RFSTC Students Hear Candidate Speak in St Paul

About 40 River Falls students heard Henry Wallace assail "big business interests" and America's foreign policy in a speech at the Minneapolis armory February 27. The speech was Wallace's first bid for Minnesota support of his third party presidential candidacy.

Wallace accused the two major parties of stirring up trouble abroad and said they are blocking domestic progress.

Harold Stassen, Sen. Ball, and Congressmen Judd and Knutson of Minnesota were rapped by the former cabinet member and were termed reactionaries.

Speaking of American foreign policy, Wallace told the crowd of 6500 that the "Czechoslovakia story" will be repeated in other countries as long as the United States continues its "get tough with Russia policy." He asserted that Russian acts of "consolidation" have been prompted by anti-Russian acts on the part of the United States under the Truman doctrine.
