#### JUNIORS TAKE EASY VICTORIES

Seniors place second and Third-Year Seniors take last place with a clean slate of defeats.

The Junior teams were easily the outstanding teams in the tournament and most of their men had been playing more or less all season. In the first game of the tournament the Senior firsts went down to defeat before the Junior firsts 26 to 5, and the second game the Junior seconds triumphed over the 3rd. year Senior seconds 25 to 6. The second day the Senior firsts and Junior seconds won their games, and the third day the Junior firsts and Senior seconds were triumphant.

This is the first year in the history of class basket-ball that the 3rd, year Seniors have been represented. Although they lost all games they made a good showing when you consider the small number of men they had to choose from, compared with the other classes. The last day of the tournament the 3rd, year Senior firsts held the Junior firsts to a 15 to 9 count, and the 3rd, year Senior seconds held the Senior seconds to 12 to 10 count.

The class spirit at the games this year was not so marked as it has been in previous years and there were not very large crowds in attendance at the games.

# MILWAUKEE DEBATERS HERE TONIGH'

Affirmative Squad at Stevens Point

Next Friday evening Milwaukee, Stevens Point and River Falls will meet in a triangular debate for the state championship. The local Negative will meet the Milwaukee Affirmative on the home platform, the Falls Affirmative the Stevens Point Negative at the Point, and the Point Affirmative the Millwaukee Negative at the Cream City. Each of these teams are the survivors of preliminary debates, Milwaukee having eliminated Platteville and Whitewater, Stevens Point Oshkosh and La Crosse and River Fälls Superior and Eau Claire, in the first clashes.

The Fall's Negative team will be made up of Landon Chapman, Frank Allbee and Edward Casey. The Milwaukee team comes with a record of having defeated Whitewater Negative and Whitewater has always been strong in debate. Last year they won the championship of the southern league. The debate here, therefore, is sure to be hotly contested and very interesting. The judges for the debate will be President J. C. Brown of St. Cloud Normal, Prof. John H. Gray, of Corlton College, and Dr. J. C. Hazzard, of Macalester College.

The Affirmative team consists of Alvin Howalt, Rex Liebenberg and Melvin Thomson. 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


The formation of a State Association would provide for a travelling chaplain or speaker who would visit each Normal school several times a year.
