Honors Day Features Kleinpell Portrait

Kleinpell was presented to the student body by the faculty at the annual Honors Day Program last Thursday.

The portrait was presented to student body representative Tom Shaffer by Dr. Richard Swenson chairman of the Faculty Coun-

The portrait was commissioned this spring by the Faculty Council, the administrative body of the faculty. The artist who painted this portrait is Jan Rivard Atridge, originally from Marshall, Minnesota. Mrs. Attridge has a studio in Minneapolis. Minnesota and works for the Guthrie Theater.

President Eugene H. Kleinpell addressed the annual Honors Day Program on the character and

change of higher education.

Kleinpell stated that the role of the university has been research, teaching and public service. He added that the university has been able to accomplish these things because it has provided a climate in which ideas may be examined in an atmosphere of respect and decency, removed from external and internal pressures.

The university leader said that, 'No other institution in our socity makes such a deliberate effort to seek truth and understanding through free investigation. He added that the church asks a man to accept certain doctrines before he may belong; the lodge requires him to accede to certain rituals; the Army demands his rigid obedience and continued service, and voluntary absenteeism is punished severely. In a sence, he told over 700 students and faculty, the University is the last place in society where man can come closest to the free exercise of talent, thought and expression."

The university prexy added that the thing that has made the university a unique social institution is the loyalty it has demonstrated to its central purpose -- to search for the truth.

Kleinpell pointed out that there is mounting evidence that on many campuses there is growing antagonism between faculty, students and administrators.

the WSU-RF student body will graduate this afternoon in Karges Center.

This year's figure of 462 graduates is nearly three times the number ten years ago in 1956 when 118 students received degrees, and it is twice the number of graduates seven years ago in 1959. It is also 100 more than last year.

Eight people received master of science degrees in education and 454 received bachelor degrees; 12 bachelor of arts in Liberal Arts; 121 bachelor of science in Liberal Arts, 112 in secondary education, 140 in elementary education, 23 in agriculture education and 45 in agriculture.

Men outnumber women 297 to 165 overall and in all areas except elementary education.

Information Agency Director Gives Commencement Speech

Carl T. Rowan who served as director of the United Stat formation Agency, U.S. Ambassador to Finland and Deputy Assistant Secretary of State will be the speaker at River Falls'88th annual Commencement today.

Rowan, 40, was born in Ravenscroft, Tenn., and joined the Navy after a year of study at Tennessee State University in Nashville. Serving for three years during World War II, at age 19, he was one of the first fifteen Negroes in the nation's history to be raised to officer rank in the Navy.

The journalist received a bachelor's degree in mathematics from Oberlin College, Oberlin, Ohio, and was awarded a master's degree in journalism from the University of Minnesota.

He now writes a syndicated column which appears throughout the country in leading newspa-

fessor of education at the University of Minnesota, will receive Sunday, May 29, at Commencement ceremonies at Wisconsin State University - River Falls. The selection of Dr. Clymer for this year's award was announced Saturday evening at a Senior-Alumni-Faculty banquet.

Clymer, a native of Hudson, Wis., was graduated from River Falls in 1949 with a B.S. degree in secondary education. He is married to the former Lois Brandt of Hudson, a high school classmate and also a 1949 River Falls graduate. The Clymers live at 3428 Skycroft Drive in Minneapolis.

Of his undergraduate life at River Falls, Dr. Clymer says, "Several factors had a strong influence on my professional and personal life; the good theoretical foundations in education, psychology and science; dedicated teachers who know their fields but who also took sympathetic interest in their students; the part time jobs I held."

From River Falls Clymer went to the University of Minnesota, earning the M.S. degree in educational psychology in 1951 and the Ph.D. in educational psychology in 1952. He served as teaching assistant and research assistant at Minnesota in 1949-50 and as instructor in 1950-51.

His first full time teaching position was at River Falls, as sixth grade supervising teacher in the Ames Laboratory School, during the 1951-52 academic year. In 1952 he was appointed assistant professor of education at the University of Minnesota, became associate professor in 1957 and professor in 1959.

Since 1958 Clymer has been chairman of the studies and research committee of the International Reading Association, a member of the Association's board of directors since 1961 and served as its president in 1964-65. He is on the editorial advisory board of "The Reading Teacher" and serves as editor of its research issue. He is editor

of the "Reading Research Quarterly." Since 1962 he has served as consultant on research in English for the Cooperative Research Branch of the U.S. Office of Ed-

Clymer is listed in American Men of Science and will be listed in the forthcoming edition of Who's Who in the Midwest. He is a certified consulting psychologist for the State of Minnesota.

With Dr. James F. Kerfoot, associate professor of education at River Falls, Clymer will codirect the NDEA Institute for Advanced Study in Reading scheduled for the summer session at River Falls.

A busy professional schedule permits Dr. Clymer only limited time in his enjoyment of outdoor activities, especially fishing and camping. Last summer when he was invited to lecture for a week at the University of London, the Clymer family toured the European continent by Microbus.

"We camped and wandered through the rural areas of Belgium, Netherlands, the Black Forest and Rhine area of Germany, Switzerland, northern Italy and the Tyrol area of Austria a most enjoyable seven-week trip," he recalled.

Class Rank Withheld

No information regarding a student's academic standing will be released to any draft board without the written authorization of the student involved.


Students desiring to inform their local draft boards of their academic standing must present a written request to the Registrar. The Registrar will report the students rank in class to the draft board on a Selective Service form 109. The student's rank in class will be reported in one of the following categories: upper 1/4, upper 1/2, 1/4 of the full-time male students in his class (freshmen, sophomore, junior, senior). Class rank will be determined on the basis of a student's cumulative grade point average at the end of the school year. Request forms are available in the Registrar's Office.

Submission of a form 109 does not constitute a request for deferment. The student must write to his local draft board requesting consideration for deferment.


