### Slonimsky Proposes **Broader Education** In Nation's Schools

Emphasizing his belief in a broad education for everyone. Nicholas Slenimsky, composer, pianist and musicologist who visited the campus last week, gave a new twist to the charge that such a plan leads to "medioc-

"Mediocre," said Mr. Slonim-sky, means 'average." If we could teach children to be 'average' physicists, geographers, historians, artists, and mathematicians, it would be wonderful."

Although not all are suffictently talented to be able to sing of play a musical instrument, Mr. Sionismky said, everyone should be exposed to music theory and should learn a little about the history of music. All should at least have an opportunity to discover what talents they have, he

While he would object to "militarizing" education, Mr. Slon-lmsky said he believes, that it must be more authoritarian than is now the case.

"It's ridiculous for a student to refuse to take a course because he doesn't 'like' it," he said. "Students have a healthy respect for the teacher who says 'You must do this whether you like it or not."

The practice of attempting to make the student "like" to work has produced a generation of "cultural illiterates," he said.

Mr. Slonimsky gave a lecturerecital to an all-school assembly On March 1, he will speak to at 10 a.m. Tuesday, Feb. 3, and again that evening in the Little Theatre. During his visit on campus, Mr. Slonimsky spoke to a number of music students and attended a music class.

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A special "thank you" to St. Bridget's Church and the Newman Club for bringing the St. John's University's Men's Chorus to River Falls Feb. 4 The two-hour performance of great choral music by these college men represented many hours of grueling rehearsal and afforded the audience first hand contact with many masterpieces seldom heard in concert. The appearance, the stage deportment, and the general effect of the performance were superb. No details that might interfere with appropriate staging were overlooked. For the most part, the concert was formal and the dress was very formal. But in the final group of folk songs, the attire became informal. This is commendable.

From the standpoint of the music critic, it seemed unfortunate that the bass section could not balance the tenors. As is sometime the case, it was probably necessary to use lyric baritones for the bass part. It is necessary to say also that the over-all quality of tone was indifferent and that a unification of the vocal lines was therefore difficult.

Good musicianship asserted itself by the fact that this chorus sang in tune. Its diction is to be commended as well. It is significant to note that the group sang in Latin, in German, in Japanese, in Sicilian, in Dutch,

The fact that Part I, representing early church music, left the audience cold was not entirely the fault of the audience. While this music is objective and does not "parade" the emotions, it is none-the-less vital and vibrant. Perhaps because of its difficulty, these musicians gave the impression of too much technical seriousness with a limited understanding of content significance.

### Student Senate Minutes

February 2, 1959

The meeting was called to order by President Clarence Dulek. After the secretary's report was approved as read, the treasurer reported balances of \$867.69 in the Student Senate account, \$654.23 in the vending machine account, and \$12.89 in the River Falls account.

President E. H. Kleinpell was present to discuss several matters with the Senate. In a discussion of elimination of last-quarter exams for seniors, it was agreed to submit the Senate's suggestions to the faculty

The Senate voted unanimously to send a letter to Mr. E. P. Rock, President of the WSCRF Foundation, thanking the group for its gift of \$3,000 to the new

Representing the Winter Carnival Committee, Gwen Schlough thanked the Senate for sending the Committee members to the ski weekend at Virginia, Minn.

The schedule for KCTA - the educational television channel will be published in the Student Voice as often as space permits this year as a convenience for students who wish to use the TV set now operating on this channel in the visual aids room. Next year, the Voice budget will be such that the schedule can be included as a regular feature.

The Senate voted accept Mr. Wolfe's recommendation of Warren Rogers as editor of the Student Voice, to take over in the spring quarter for a one-year period.

After advising the committee to establish dress-up night in the cafeteria every other Wednesday, the meeting was adjourned.

River Falls has received an initation to participate in the 959 National Intercollegiate 3ridge Tournament sponsored by the Games Committee of the Association of College Unions.





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The nine student centers the nine campuses have cost six million dollars to build and equip. Most of the money was borrowed from the Federal Housing and Home Finance A-gency on a 40-year loan. A fee of \$9 a semester per student will repay the loan.

Dining facilities alone in the new buildings will seat a total of 4,000 students at one time. More than 7,500 chairs have been purchased for the buildings, 75,000 plates, 12,000 forks, 10,000 cups, and 40 ping pong tables.

Of brick construction, the new student buildings range in size from the largest at La Crosse, costing \$850,000, to the smallest at Menomonie, costing \$500,000. There are conference rooms, game rooms, music rooms and offices for student and alumni activities. The 600 dining room tables fold away so that the dining room can double as ballrooms for proms.

Purchasing of equipment has been handled by the state Bureau of Purchases with standard equipment used as much as possible to keep costs down. All chairs, for instance, are standard with only slight variation in color from college to college. Each center is of a unique construction with five architectural firms designing the nine build-

Just three years ago the college Regents applied for the loan to build the student unions. Temporary student snack bars and game rooms have been set up in academic buildings. This space will now be remodeled for classroom and laboratory use.
