In a beautiful exibition of basketball, the Red and White tossers romped home with an easy win over their Mill City opponents Saturday night.

The brilliant form displayed by the home boys was somewhat of a surprise to their many admirers. First because they had shown a consistant aversion towards exhibiting their top form on the home floor and secondly because the gruelling contest of the night before was conceded as being ample excuse for a night off. It was this last magnificent effort of the home pets that turned the tables, and snatched a brilliant victory out of an apparent defeat. The burst of speed began with Gurnoe caging a long one from the center of the floor. A foul was called on Eau Claire and Carolan in perfect accord with the need of the hour annexed the much needed one pointer, when play was resumed he immediately followed with a long clean double pointer, that tied the score. With three minutes to go Eau Claire took time out, when play was again resumed the locals opened up with a series of short snappy passes that carried the sphere through the Eau Claire defense. Rice shot for the basket, and missed but Gurnoe was in hot pursuit, and tapped in his mates misfire for the last and deciding field goal of the evening. 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
