## College to Hear Nehru's Daughter In April Lecture

Mme. Indira Gandhi, daughter of Prime Minister Jawaharlal Nehru of India and her official hostess, will present a public lecture at Wisconsin State College at River Falls on April 8, at 8 p.m.

Under the joint sponsorship of the College and the American Association of University Women, Mme. Gandhi will speak at the Karges Center.

Mme. Gandhi is a forceful leader of India's ruling political party and became president of the Indian National Congress in 1959. Politics and public service have been a tradition in her family and she was reared in an atmosphere of political discussion and planning for freedom.

At many times during her childhood, all the adult members of her family were jailed by the British who then ruled India.

"I have no recollection of games, children's parties or playing with other children," says Mme. Gandhi. "My favorite occupation as a very small child was to deliver thunderous speeches to the servants. All my games were political games."

Since 1946 Mme. Gandhi has been hostess at the Prime Minister's home and has accompanied him on state visits to Europe, the United States, China and Russia.

Tickets to the lecture may be purchased at the door. Admission is \$1.00.

## Senate Campaign Starts Today for Spring Elections

Campaigning for the April Student Senate elections may begin today, the Student Senate has announced.

Any person who wishes to run for one of seven positions as member-at-large on the 1962-63 Student Senate must proclaim his or her candidacy by filing a petition in the Dean's Office no later than 5 p.m. on Friday, March 30, according to an announcement by the Student Senate.

Petitions are available at the Dean's Office at any time.

To be eligible a student must

have a grade point average of 2.0 or better and have a petition signed by at least fifty students. A student may sign more than one petition.

Incumbents are automatically placed on the final election ballot.

If the number of students filing petitions totals more than 12, a primary election will be held on Wednesday, April 4, to narrow the field down to 12 new candidates. A final election will then follow on Wednesday, April 11.

If the number of new candi-

dates does not total more than 12, the new candidates plus interested incumbents will be placed on the "primary" ballot of April 4 and that election will be held as the final election.

Candidates must consider the rules of individual campus buildings for the placing of campaign posters and other materials. General rules concerning the entire campus are as follows:

1. Nothing tacked, taped or glued to finished surfaces.
2. Personal stands made by individuals must be set in "out of the way" places.
3. Nails or tacks may not be used on trees.

Rules concerning individual buildings are as follows:

**North Hall:** Bulletin Boards are set up outside the balcony of the first floor.

**South Hall:** Bulletin Boards are available outside the offices and may be used with permission from that department.

**Hathorn Hall:** There is a wire around the lobby wall to which posters may be attached.

**Stratton & Prucha Halls:** Campaign material may be posted or distributed with permission of the resident counselor.

**Student Center:** The Student Center will provide places for campaign material. Such materials must be initialed at the Director's Office.

**Karges Center:** Campaign materials may be posted upon permission from the janitors or the Athletic Director.

**Agricultural & Industrial Arts Buildings:** Dr. Delorit must be contacted for permission to place campaign materials.

**Library:** Permission must be requested and granted by Mr. Cooklock to place materials in the Library.

## Teachers Will Discover 'New Twist in Education'

"A New Twist in Education," the theme of the fifth annual Elementary Education Conference, will be presented to visiting teachers Friday by Robert T. Filep, executive associate of the Center for Programed Instruction in New York, and Joe Dickman, special project manager for Encyclopedia Britannica.

The day's program will begin at 8:30 a.m. with a coffee hour in the Student Center. An exhibit

of teaching materials, books and programed learning materials will be on display at the same time in the Student Center basement.

The Junior High Choir, under the direction of Nicholas Jadinak, will sing at 9:30 in North Hall Auditorium and then Mr. Filep will give his address.

Room demonstrations will be held from 10:30 to 11:30. Also during this time period, Mr. Filep will demonstrate programed instruction devices in Room 101 of the Student Center and Mr. Dickman will conduct an elementary math workshop in Room 201 of the same building.

After lunch in the Student Center, room demonstrations will continue at 1 p.m., along with programed instruction demonstrations and the math workshop.

Dr. L. G. Stone, dean of the College's School of Education, and Dr. Rowland Klink, principal of the Campus School, will give a summary of the conference at 2 p.m. in North Hall Auditorium.

Room demonstrations will be conducted by: Miss Brenna Steil, kindergarten; Miss Wanda Maurer, first grade; Miss Ann Dubbe, second grade; Mrs. Leona Cooper, third grade; Mrs. Naunda Tietz, fourth grade; Ronald Laymon, fifth grade; James Murphy, sixth grade; Miss Velma Carlson, seventh grade; and Miss Opal Knox, eighth grade.

# Polsfoot Inks Grid Contract With Cardinals

The appointment of Fran Polsfoot as new end coach of the St. Louis Cardinals professional football team was lauded by the St. Louis Post-Dispatch in their March 12 issue.

Mr. Polsfoot, who has been coaching at Wisconsin State College at River Falls since 1954, has resigned his post here. During the past five years he has been head football coach here, posting a record of 22 wins, 20 defeats and two ties during that time. He will report to the St. Louis club on about June 1.

The St. Louis paper wrote in part:

"The 34-year-old Polsfoot, who held one of the Big Red receiving records until Sonny Randle topped it almost a decade later, in 1960, is the first of two new assistant coaches to be announced by field leader Wally Lemm.

"We're lucky to be able to add Fran to our staff," Lemm said of the former Chicago Cardinal.

"Polsfoot was an excellent pass receiver and blocker and he can teach these abilities to our receivers," Lemm said. "He will be invaluable in improving our receivers' ability to work their way into the open."

Polsfoot, a 6-foot-3 athlete, set the old Cardinal club record of 57 passes caught in 1951. Before entering pro ball, he had been a hurdler as well as football player at Washington State.

When Lemm recently accepted the head coaching job with the Cardinals, after his 1961 championship tenure with the Houston Oilers of the American Football League, one of Wally's first goals was to hire an end coach as an assistant.

"It's important to bring the young pass receiving prospects along fast," he explained. "Most of the pro rookie ends are backs in college and must learn the pass receiving moves."

### NIBA ANNOUNCES TEAM CHAMPIONSHIPS

The National Intercollegiate Bowling Association announced today that it will hold its first annual team championships at

the United States Air Force Academy, Colorado Springs, Colorado, on April 14, 1962. Seven NIBA conference champions and the Air Force Academy shall compete for the first NIA team championship.

The seven conference champions represent the seven competing conferences in the National Intercollegiate Bowling Association structure. Each of these conferences has conducted seasonal competition beginning last November with the conference winner qualifying for the team championship. Five of the conferences conduct their seasonal schedules by postal procedures. Each of these conferences will be holding their final face to face conference roll-offs during March at different locations around the nation. To qualify for these final conference roll-offs, the team must finish in one of the first four places at the completion of postal competition. The other two conferences are traveling conferences: The Gulf Coast Conference in Texas and the Tri-State Conference in Minnesota, North Dakota and Wisconsin. The winner of the conference shall be their conference representative at the Air Force Academy.

The NIBA is in its first year of operation with representation from coast to coast. This is the first organization at the collegiate level to conduct intercollegiate bowling competition with a move toward amateurism. College bowlers on NIBA member teams are prohibited from entering cash tournaments at any bowling establishment. The NIBA feels that for inter-collegiate bowling team competition to be justified with the college structure of activities, it must be conducted within the framework of educational policy and procedure. Plans are now being formulated by NIBA officials for an extension of amateur qualifications for the college team that wishes to become a part of the NIBA program. NIBA membership is open to NCAA or NAIA athletic affiliated institution.

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## Don Shirley Trio Will Play Thursday in North Hall

A native of Jamaica, he has earned doctor's degrees in religion, music and psychology. Now 35, he began giving public recitals at the age of 5 and made his American debut at 18 with the Boston Pops Orchestra.

Other members of the trio are Bassist Ken Fricker and Cellist Donald Anderson.

Holder of a master's degree from Juilliard School in New York, Mr. Fricker played four years with the Air Force Band in Washington. He also has played with the New York Philharmonic, Robert Shaw Chorale and the Ralph Flanagan and Sal Salvador orchestras.

Mr. Anderson, a graduate of Eastman School of Music in Rochester, N. Y., has played with the Rochester Philharmonic and the Radio City Music Hall orchestra. He has appeared in many recitals and chamber music concerts and has toured Europe under the State Department auspices.

## Chemistry Club Wins First Place In College Bowl

For the third time in the three year history of the River Falls College Bowl the Chemistry Club won the silver flask. The contest was held on March 15 with the Chemistry Club, Physics Club, Math Club and Beta Beta Beta participating.

In the elimination round the Chemistry Club trounced the Math club after a slow start. The Physics Club won over Beta Beta Beta by a very large margin also.

In the final contest the Chemistry Club defeated the Physics Club. The Chemistry Club team, consisting of Earl Button, Dick Zimmerman, Chlorin Peterson and John Hansen, came from behind to win by a decisive margin. At the half the score was the Chemistry team 87 and the Physics team 72.

Each contest or match consisted of 20 parts in all. The questions were divided into two parts. First there was a toss-up question that was given to the first team that felt it could answer it. If it succeeded it was given a bonus question.

Questions were submitted by faculty members and leaned heavily toward the science and math fields because most of the team members were majors in those fields. Questions from the music, psychology, social science and history departments were submitted also.

The purpose of the college bowl is to give competition to the intellectual side of college life.

## Staff Members Receive Grants For Research

The State College Research Advisory Committee has approved applications for research grants from four River Falls faculty members.

The recipients, Dr. Chisholm, Dr. Laakso, Dr. Langford, and Dr. Anderson, will continue teaching while doing their research. However, for some, most of the work will be done during the summer months.

Dr. Chisholm, who will receive \$1,000, will do research on curriculum study groups engaged in research toward a state wide curriculum in English and Language Arts. This will provide consultants to meet with elementary and secondary teachers for the improvement of the English and Language Arts curriculum.

Dr. Laakso will do an ecological study of an impoundment during a period of heavy pollution and subsequent period of abatement. His grant will be \$485.

Dr. Langford, whose study will concern the Protestant philanthropy on stewardship, will receive a total of \$750.

Dr. Anderson, who received a grant of \$700, will work on developing a test on academic aspirations.

These grants are part of \$40,000 which was appropriated by last sessions legislature to the State College System, for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1962.

## Committee Is Seeking New Project

While the Bronze Falcon, sculptured by John Rood, is "all but on the wall," the Foundation Committee has announced that it is trying to decide what its next project should be. Because the projects of the Foundation are student sponsored, it is the consensus of the Committee that the next project should be suggested by the student body, they report.

A few suggestions have already been received, the committee said. Such projects as a bus to be used by campus organizations, the completion of the Karges Center bowling lanes, or French bells for North Hall are among them.

A suggestion box will be placed in the Student Center and the Foundation Committee has expressed its hope that all interested persons will place their suggestions in it. After the suggestions have been received, the Committee asks that the persons making the suggestions come to a Foundation meeting to explain and exemplify their suggestions.

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
