Falcons Will Meet Superior In Homecoming Game

At 2:30 Saturday afternoon, Ramer Field will be the scene of one of the outstanding football games of the season when the Falcons begin the big Homecoming battle with the Superior STC Yellow Jackets.

The annual Falcon-Yellow Jacket grid encounter has been a long standing institution in the Western State Teachers College Conference. A spirit of friendliness exists between the two colleges with each team hoping to win the game more than any other of the season.

Statistics show that River Falls holds a slight edge over Superior in the won and loss column by winning 5 while losing 10 and three games were tied. The Falcons have piled up 349 points to the Yellow Jackets 186.

First Postwar Homecoming Will Be Gala Affair

Today, all roads lead to RF-STC! It's the big 1945 Homecoming which is calling many alumni and friends of the College back to the RFSTC campus. The entire college is prepared for a really gala weekend, the first big Homecoming in three years.

Tonight at 6:30, festivities will get under way with a big mass meeting in North hall auditorium, Dr. Kettlekamp presiding.

The big feature of this event will be the coronation of Miss Betty Peterson of Baldwin, Wisconsin, as queen of the 1945 Homecoming. Miss Peterson, who was chosen queen in an all-school ballot taken at the general assembly October 18, will reign over all Homecoming events, assisted by her Guard of Honor consisting of four of the runners-up in the queen election: Beth Davis of Hayward, Betty Reid of Eveleth, Minnesota; Lila Estenson of New Richmond, and Shirley Wiff of Spring Valley. Lois Bernd of New Richmond, another of the queen candidates, was chosen by lot from the runners-up to act as Coronation Mistress.

Class stunts and a special novelty act will also be included in the program.

Following the mass meeting will be a huge bonfire and snake dance.

The highlight of the weekend will be reached when the Falcons strike out against Superior's Yellow Jackets at Ramer Field Saturday afternoon at 2:30. The game promises to be a real thriller since there is strong rivalry between the two teams. Donna Olson, Jo Ann Cole, Kathleen Riley, and Beulah Olson, will be out to help stimulate enthusiasm as our team fights to "Shear Superior."

Eugene Wirz—A Junior from Chippewa Falls. He graduated from Rice Lake High. He plays first string center and controls the ball on the kick-offs. Gene is a science major under Doc. Karges.

Jim Montgomery—Another House of Collins athlete. He hails from Osceola where he played center for 3 years. He was all conference center for two years. Now he plays right tackle for the Falcons and doing a bang up job of it.

Jim Forsyth—A Freshman from New Richmond. He played for the home town high.

Leonard Peloquin—Cadotte star football man. "Clem" is a freshman.

Jim Moore—A Freshman from Balsam Lake, who is doing a swell job at right end. Jim starred last year for Balsam Lake. Here he has shown power on offense and defense.

John Ronnigen—A Freshman from River Falls. He played bang up ball for the high school last year and is continuing the job in college.

John Cook—A New Richmond boy playing his first year of college football. John is giving promising results at his end position.

Norval Olsen—"Pee Wee" is a discharged vet from Hudson. He's a dandy kicker for those precious points after the touch-down. Norval is playing his first year of college football.

Warren Johnson—A Sophomore from Barron. Warren is playing his second year of college football and doing a swell job of it. He plays at the quarterback spot.

Norris Crist—A Freshman from River Falls. He played football for the local high

school. Norrie is the starter at the quarterback post.

Dick Berggren—Here is the anchor of the team. Dick is a Navy vet serving two years. He is a tough man at backing up the line, and when he carries the ball he goes, and I don't mean maybe. His home is at Baldwin.

Dick Swenson—A four year letterman from Prairie Farm. Dick, or Shorty as the boys call him, is the little fellow of the team and through tough sledding has earned himself a first team berth.

Gordon Schock—A Freshman from Amery, who has been the star of the Falcons. Gordie has proven time after time his right to the No. 1 spot on the team. He holds down the left half position.

River Falls journeyed to Menominee last Saturday afternoon to trip the Industrial Arts boys by a 14-6 score. This was the best game the boys have played this season, each one playing his position like a veteran. We were unfortunate to have two touchdowns called back, but if needed we had reserve power for another.

The first quarter was well given to Falcon fumbles, with three occurring. This put an end to any scoring threat the Falcons may have cooked up.

The second quarter found the Falcons putting on a drive downfield with Gordie Schock and Wally Wirz carrying the ball. Gordon went over from the 4 to give River Falls their first score. On the point after the score our kick was blocked and rolled back to the 15. Everyone started to walk off, except Berggren, who walked over, picked up the ball, and raced for the goal line. By the time Stout woke up it was too late to stop him.

The Falcons showed superior power in the line with Montgomery playing his best. Hahn, Redmond, and Swenson were by no means idle. The boys really stopped the boy from Stout, who outweighed River Falls by a goodly number of pounds. John Ronnigen receives the credit for the best tackle.

Beautiful kickoffs were sponsored by Gene Wirz; the kicks were high and long, just perfect for the boys who went down field to "smear em". Gene played a good offensive game as center and backing up the line on defense.

For the fancy running we will give Wally Wirz top honors, how he could turn and side step all those players was more than anyone else could do. Schock did some hard fought maneuvering when he sprinted 82 yards for a touch-down, only to have it called back, plus a 5 yard penalty on the Falcons for pushing. Big Dick Berggren did some fancy line plunging for good substantial gains. When "Bergy" hit them they really knew it.

Ends Jim Moore and John Ronnigen kept the Stout boys from going any place when they came around their end. Moore caught the only completed River Falls pass of the game.

Starting at quarterback was Norrie Crist; he and his able assistant, Warren Johnson, lead

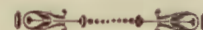

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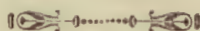
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RFSTC Welcomes New Nurse
