River Falls Cops "Victory Bonfire"
To Tune of 3-0.

The football team of River Falls Normal School took an active part in Stout's Homecoming Saturday and quenched the "Victory Bonfire" with the score of 3-0. The team was accompanied by a number of loyal rooters who had chartered busses to attend the game. Others came by cars, and from the number of former Falls' students at the game, one was led to believe that it was also a homecoming for our own school.

Stout students had the town decorated in honor of the occasion, with the colors of both schools. Our rooters entered into the spirit of the game and assisted Stout in making it a glorious occasion. Very few of the students remained for the dance after the game.

First Quarter

The Falls won the toss and chose to defend the south goal, while Stout chose to kick. Smith received the ball and advanced it to the center of the field. After the first lineup it was evident that the Red and White was in with all the drive they had and drove through for first down, but were penalized for holding. Smith then kicked to the opponent's thirty yard line. On the third down Stout was penalized fifteen yards for holding and later failed to make the distance. The Falls failed to gain distance and were forced to kick. Hefron made a good tackle on the ten yard line. The Falls were again penalized for holding. Still Stout could not gain distance. The Falls made distance but were penalized as often as a good gain was made. The Falls recovered the ground lost, and a forward pass to Morgan netted twenty-

five yards. In the next series of plays the ball was carried to the one yard line but was lost to Stout on fourth down. Judisch kicked out of danger, but the ball was brought back to the twenty-five yard line where our team again started line smashing. The quarter ended with the Falls in possession of the ball on the twenty-eight yard line. Score 0-0.

Second Quarter

In two downs the ball was carried eight yards. Morgan was replaced by Gurnoe. On the next play Gurnoe made a successful drop-kick from the thirty yard line. Score 3-0. After this play the gains made by the Falls were offset by penalties. The ball kept moving from the center of the field toward Stout territory, and at no time was the River Falls' goal in danger. Gerretson and Judisch were both injured during this quarter, Judisch being replaced by Joyce. The Falls made three first downs, and Stout completed a pass for thirty yards, but failed to carry the ball further. The quarter ended with the ball on Stout's twenty yard line.

Third Quarter

MacAndrews was substituted for Gerretson. On opening the half, Stout chose to receive. Smith kicked the ball to their twenty-five yard line. Here Bergman, right guard, went out with injuries. River Falls made first downs three times in succession, Smith and Reincke carrying the ball. Stout failed to gain and were again forced to punt, M. Smith making a good return. In the next play, M. Smith carried the ball through their line and after being tackled was hit by Damberg. This blow broke Smith's collar bone and will put him out for the rest of the season. Gerretson went in for Smith. The accident only served to whet River Falls' fighting spirit and two first downs were made. On the next two plays two penalties were called causing a loss of twenty yards. A pass failed and the ball became Stout's on their own forty-five yard line. Stout completed a pass and an end run making first down, and two more passes gave them two more first downs and
