RED AND WHITE LOSE

FIRST CONFERENCE CONTEST

Stout defeats River Falls for the first time in seven years. The Red and White team is the first to cross the Stout's goal line this season.

First Quarter

Captain Murphy won the toss-up and chose to defend the north goal. Right from the start the breaks went against the Falls and the first kick-off was fumbled, Stout recovering the ball on our 25 yard line. A series of three plays netted the opponents 12 yards. On the last down of the next series Chard went over for a touchdown about three minutes after the game started. Damberg kicked goal. The Falls run the next play back about 25 yards and on the first play lost the ball to Stout on a fumble. The opponents started down the field, a second time, which looked as though another touchdown was inevitable. They made first down on two plays but now the locals held for three downs and Damberg tried to drop-kick. The Falls did not make first down so punted out of danger only to have the visitors run the ball back and attempt to another drop-kick. The locals seemed to be unable to gain and were forced to punt again. Stout carried the ball back and attempted a third drop-kick which hit a man on the line of scrimmage and the ball was recovered by the visitors on our 22 yard line. The quarter ended immediately after the third play with the ball on the Falls 13 yard line.

Second Quarter

Raab was sent in at quarter in place of Melvin. Stout made their first down and had the goal to make. Our line put up a stonewall front and the opponents were thrown for a loss and they tried another drop-kick but Damberg was decidedly out of luck. The Falls still found it hard to gain through the line and a penalty for off-side on the part of the opponents, giving the locals first down. A couple of plays and a second penalty brought

the ball to the 40 yard line. River Falls opened here aerial attack which proved to be very effective throughout the game. Butenhoff completed the first pass, a short one over center, which seemed impossible to get. The next pass was intercepted but all Stout did was to punt the ball back into River Falls territory. The next series of plays gained only nine yards and the two teams exchanged punts, Murphy recovering the ball in mid-field. Raab completed a pass which netted first down. On the next play Kiefer received an injury and was forced to leave the game. Johnson, who has been out since the first game, was sent in at the half vacated by Kiefer. Raab completed a second pass which placed the ball on the visitors' 13 yard line. They did not make first down and Stout punted out of danger. The half ended with the ball in our possession on the opponents thirty yard line. The Falls completed four passes in this period.

Third Quarter

Stout returned the kick-off to the thirty-five yard line but lost the ball on a fumble after a couple of plays. Standish carried the ball through the opponents for a twenty-five yard run placing the ball on their fifteen yard line. While completing another pass, Rabb fell down about one yard from the goal line, the ball going out of his hands rolled across the line in front of Morgan who fell on it for a touchdown. Murphy kicked goal. Neither team could make gains so exchanged punts. Stout completed a pass for a gain of thirty-five yards which was the first and only pass they complet-

ed. Johnson intercepted the next pass on the ten yard line and returned five yards. The Falls was unable to gain and punted. Stout carried the ball to our forty yard line and attempted another drop-kick which hit the line of scrimmage, Butenhoff recovering the ball out of bounds on the opponents forty yard line. Rabb completed his fifth pass making a gain of fifteen yards. The Falls did not make the required distance and lost the ball to Stout who punted out of danger. The quarter ended with the ball in our possession on the thirty yard line.

Fourth Quarter

Melvin was sent back into the game at quarter. On four plays Stout made their second touchdown, Damberg kicking goal. Score 14 to 7. The Falls returned to the thirty-five yard line. Melvin and Standish completed passes for two successive first downs. Standish went through the

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line for a gain of eight yards. The next pass was intercepted and the opponents made two first downs and were then forced to punt which was blocked. A pass completed by Morgan netted first down. Melvin completed a second pass placing the ball on the visitors thirty yard line. The locals tried four passes which were incomplete, Stout getting the ball, making gains for first down. The game ended with the ball in mid-field.

Stout completed one pass out of six attempts.

The Falls showed their ability at passes by completing ten out of twenty-two attempts.
