Army, Navy Gives Test to Fourteen RF Men

Last Wednesday morning fourteen college men took the Qualifying Test at the college. This test is the first step in the selection of men for the college program of the army and navy.

Ten of the fourteen indicated navy preference which if they qualify, will enable them to take the V-12 program for providing officers in the Navy, Marine Corp and Coast Guard. The other men, if they qualify; will take the Army Specialized Training Program to provide technicians and specialists for the army.
