RED AND WHITE NOSE OUT OPPONENTS 15 TO 17

The Red and White line up was considerably changed from previous games. Due to ineligibility, the first semester, Betzel was unable to participate in the game and his place was filled by Claffin, who has been playing guard all season. Melvin, playing his last game in a Red and White uniform played the guard vacated by Claffin.

Right from the start both teams played an exceptional strong defensive game and for the first 18 minutes of play neither team scored a field goal. During the first eighteen minutes of play both teams were very close to ringing some counters but most times when anybody attempted a shot he was smothered down by two or three opponents. Several fouls were called on both teams and Booty scored three free throws to Carrols two, giving River Falls a one point lead. About two minutes before the end of the first half Swanson, Eau Claire's big center, caught the ball off the bounding boards and reaching way up in the air dropped it through the hoop for the first field goal. Immediately after an Eau Claire forward caged a basket from the side lines and the half ended with the visitors in the lead 6 to 3. All through the game the two teams were not more than three points apart.

Booty started the scoring the second half by a free throw and immediately followed with a field goal from in under the basket. The visitors scored a couple in rapid succession while Booty broke even with two free throws. Cap't Carolan who had been missing several attempts soon located the hoop with a long one only to be followed by a ringer, from past the center, by Caroll. By caging two in succession Jim gave his team a one point lead. With only about six minutes to go Eau Claire started a shower of longshots with only one going through. The Red and White again regained the lead when Jim scored a field goal and then the locals proceeded with a stalling game which both worried and aggravated their opponents.
