RED AND WHITE VICTORS OVER ST. MARY'S

Last Saturday the St. Mary's football team invaded Ramer Field determined to give the Falls eleven a defeat. This idea must have left them very early in the game as the locals put up a brand of football that showed that the result of the Carleton game did not indicate how well they could play.

First Quarter

River Falls kicked to St. Mary's and after three unsuccessful attempts to make first down were forced to punt. Raab received the punt and returned about twenty yards to midfield. Three plays netted first down, but on the next series of plays St. Mary's got the ball. A few plays up with three complete passes brought the opponents about 25 yards from the goal where they attempted a drop-kick which went wide about six feet. The Falls made first down and on the next series were forced to punt. The quarter ended with the ball in St. Mary's possession on our eighty-yard line.

Second Quarter

Melvin went in in place of Raab. On the first play the opponents punted which proved to be a very poor punt and River Falls gained possession of the ball on St. Mary's twenty-five yard line. On the second play St. Mary's were penalized for off-side which gave our team first down with the goal to make. On the third play with a couple of yards to go, Melvin made an end run for the first touch-down, Captain Murphy kicking goal. St. Mary's received the ball on the kick-off but as usual could not gain. The ball changed sides several times and the half ended with the ball in the Falls possession on the sixty yard line.

Third Quarter

The Falls received the kick-off and returned the ball about fifteen yards. St. Mary's team came back strong and held our team so they were forced to punt. During this quarter the opponents made several gains through

Fourth Quarter

This period was the big period for the locals. St. Mary's team was weakening and the Falls was making larger gains. The last few minutes of play the team opened up and a pass from Captain Murphy to Raab placed the ball on our eighty-five yard line. Four plays netted first down and on the second play of the next series Standish went over for a touch-down. Murphy kicking goal. St. Mary's received the ball and on their second play Raab intercepted a pass on our forty-yard line. Three plays netted first down. From this point of the game three successful passes from Captain Murphy to Morgan, Standish and Butenhoff respectively, netted another touch-down. This was three goals out of three attempts. The game ended about two minutes after the kick-off.

Captain Murphy was switched to full-back which seems to have given the team more strength and confidence. Clanton played the tackle va-

lated by Murphy and Melvin and Raab changed off at quarter. The line put up a stonewall front and our ends proved themselves by getting down under punts and downing the ball almost where it was caught.
