He said his comparatively short trip home was made amusing by the fact that he stopped three of four times from India to Egypt for something to eat, and each time he was given the same thing, prunes.



Falcons Split Even During Past Week

The fast St. Thomas sailors found themselves up against a changed River Falls quint as they relied upon their luck to win 46-45. At St. Thomas the trouble when Toms had no they trounced the Falcons 69-

The game started out slowly with the first three minutes scoreless. Corrigan scored two field goals to give the Tom's a 4-0 lead. At the end of the first quarter the Toms were ahead 8-6. Wally Hitt and Sam Young led the Falcons during the first ten minutes. Late in the first half St. Thomas, starting to see that River Falls was not going to be the same push over, began to get down to business. Miles, Dimick, and Young kept the Toms from using their fast break by trying for rebounds and typing up Furey, the cool Tom center. Wally Hitt and Hap Dimick kept the Falcons in the race by matching the Toms bucket for bucket, and at half-

time the score was tied 20-20. Coach Bud Manion did not use any substitues during the first half, each man playing his best. Corrigan paced the Toms, along with Wise and Furey. Sam Young, who had four personal fouls in the first half, played foulless ball during the second half. Jack Stone, who played an excellent game, went out on fouls late in

the game.

In the second half the Falcons started the scoring taking a 22-20 lead. Young and Hitt scored making it 26, as Furey gave St. Thomas 22 points. From then on it was a see-saw battle for the lead. in speed. Dimick, Hitt and Young paced the Falcons, while Corrigan won the game for St. Thomas putting in six field goals and seven free throws for 10 points. Don Miles played a fine de-fensive game; if "Baldy" went after a Tommie who had the ball, there was a fair chance that Baldy would have it when the tangle was unpiled.

The Falcons handled the ball much better than St. Thomas. themselves better than Wise and Nelson, the Toms first string guards. Centers Dimick half. and Furey put on personal duels with Dimick outscoring

Hap Dimick and Co. took out their revenge on a La Crosse team, who beat River Falls at La Crosse by a 30-29 score, by beating them 58-35.

The game started slowly with La Crosse leading 4-2 after 5 minutes of play. Dimick and Hitt scored field goals putting the Falcons into a 6-4 lead they never relinquished. At the end of the first quarter River Falls led by a 10-6 score.

During the last minute of the first half the La Crosse detense opened up a little giving Young a Hitt, Dinick and chance to extend the Falcon lead. At halftime the score stood 26-16 in the Falcon

The Falcons completely outscored La Crosse in the second half making 32 points to La Crosse's 19. La Crosse was paced by Murphy, Seri. Cook, who played good ball. River Falls had Dimick, Young and Hitt as their outstanding players.

February 10. River Falls made it win No. 12 when they easily beat a game Superior Club 48-35. Sam Young and Hap Dinick paced the Falcons getting 16 and 12 points respectively. Superiors big center, Buch, ,made 12 points to be high for the yellow- jackets while Klein, their new addition from the University of Wisconsin, made 10 points. Klein however, could not match Sam Young's playing during the evening. The Falcons held a noticeable edge in height and
