FALLS NINE SCORES BRILLIANT 5 TO 0 WIN OVER ST. MARY'S

Playing errorless ball behind the superb pitching of Jimmie Luther, the Falls nine registered their second shut-out of the season against St. Mary's College at Wniona, Minn., last Monday.

The masterly twirling exhibition dished out by the redoubtable Luther, erst-while keystone guardian, gave local baseball stock a stupendous boost, as it was to this department of the game that Coach Chandler had been devoting the greater portion of his worry. Rice is still nursing a sore wing and Jimmie Carolan's port side member is rounding into shape very slowly.

While Jimmie was breezing along at high speed and amassing a formidable list of strike-outs, his mates were paving the way to a shut-out and a three hit-contest by accepting every chance without a babble.

On the offense Jimmie Carolan starred with two clean singles out of four trips to the plate; an average of 500 for the afternoon. Johnson gave the horsehide a ride in the third frame, good for three corners, while Gurnoe and Carlson got a two-ply smash apiece. Olson and Melvin drew singles at opportune moments, each man driving in a tally.

The locals scored their first run in the second inning after Johnson had been retired. Carolan singled, and Luther sent a slow roller to third. Cashman on a fielder's choice played for Carolan but was too late, both runners being safe. Melvin flied out to center and Olson scored Carolan on a clean single to left field, Luther going to third. Phalen grounded out to second, retiring the side.

In the third Gurnoe grounded out to shortstop. Carlson walked and Davis sacrificed him to second from where he scored on a three-base drive by Johnson. Carolan flied to short, retiring side.

The third counter came in the sixth when Johnson flied out to right field, Carolan drew his second single and pilfered second. Luther struck out. Carolan counted on a single over first by Melvin. Olson grounded out short to first. Two more counters were pushed across in the ninth. Melvin flied out to second. Olson got a life on an infield error. Phalen grounded out to first. Olson then scored on Gurnoe's two-ply smash to left field. Carlson followed with another two-base wallop to right cen-

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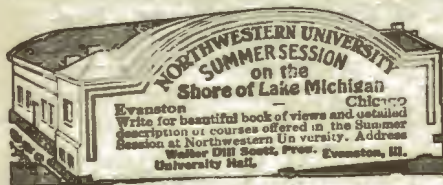
