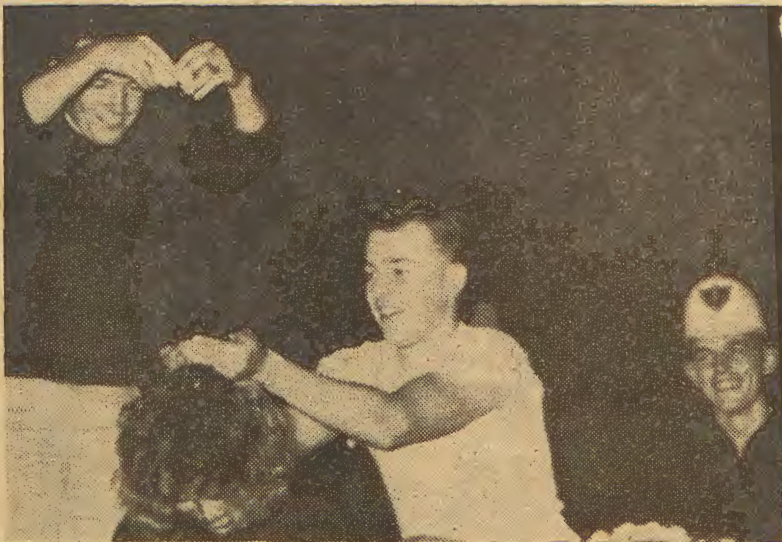

Elected the 1960 Homecoming Queen was Edith Walker, lovely dark-haired sophomore from Edgerton, Wis. "Queen Edie" was sponsored by the College Vet's Club.

The Queen's court consisted of Kay Holmes, junior from Nekoosa; Sue Dorgan, junior from Rice Lake; Criss Jelen, junior Pepin; Nancy Fox, junior from Waukesha; and Gloria Grover, junior from Galesville.

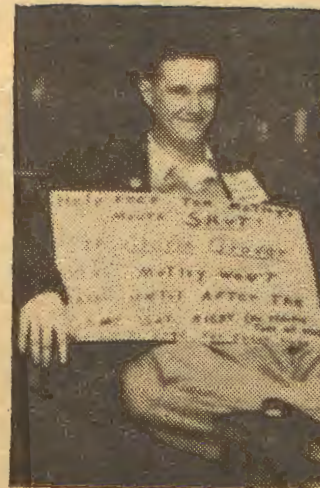
Saturday's parade was led by a mounted color guard with approximately 30 entries following in one of the most colorful Homecoming parades in recent years.

Oshkosh Squashes Falcons 14-6

Oshkosh State College squashed River Falls 14-6, Saturday in the Falcons Homecoming game. It was the second straight setback for the grid team.

Coach Fran Polsfoot's team now has a 0-2-1 conference mark and a 1-3-1 season record. The win was the second for Oshkosh against one setback. This week they encounter Whitewater, last years champs and currently undefeated this season. Serious injuries continued to plague the Falcon's squad Saturday as they lost the services of three veteran players. Guard Gary Wagenbach and end Tom Overman are out for the rest of the year. Mick Lauber left the game with a twisted knee, but its severity is not known as this article goes to press.

Oshkosh grabbed a 7-0 lead late in the first period and jump-

ed 14-0 lead before the Red and White was able to score. The titans recovered a Falcon fumble on the 'Falls 22, John Thome picked up six yards through the Falcon line and then drove for five more yards and a first down on the Falcon eleven. John Hume then carried to the seven where Richard Ricco and Thome ground out enough yardage for a first and goal on the 1 foot line. Here the River Falls defense stiffened and held Huhm for no gain. Quarterback Thome capped the drive when he sneaked accross on second down. Bruce Hammond then added the first of his two extra point conversions to make the score 7-0.

The Titans scored again early in the second period when they recovered a Red and White fumble on the River Falls 26 yard line. Huhm drove up the middle for six

yards. Thome, on an option play, squirted up through the right side of the Falcon line where he cut left and darted through the secondary for a 19-yard touchdown run. Hammond made good on his second extra point attempt.

River Falls came back to score their only touchdown later in the period. The Falcons recovered a fumble on the Titan 49 yard line. Dawson passed to Fred Colman for a 17 yard gain and a first down. Dawson then hit Mick Lauber who lateraled to John Lauber who went to the Oshkosh 12 yard line. Duane Jenson carried to the six before Dawson aerial found John Lauber in the end zone. Mick Lauber's conversion attempt was no good, leaving the score 14-6.

Another potential scoring drive by River Falls died on the Oshkosh 7 yard line, a pass by Dawson was incomplete and the Titans took over on downs.

Individual statistics show that Mick Lauber was the top ground gainer for the Falcons with 53 yards to his credit. John Lauber followed with 37, with Jenson picking up 32. Bob Dawson completed 12 of 30 passes good for 113 yards.

La Crosse Feature of Dad's Night Program

The LaCrosse Indians this year will provide the opposition for the annual Dad's Day game. The game to be played this Saturday night at Ramer Field will ring down the curtain on this year's home schedule.

Coach Bill Vickroy's Indians have a 1-2 conference mark and are 2-3 on the season. Having lost their conference opener to Stout in a squeaker 7-6, the Indians bounced back a week ago with a 21-8 win over Oshkosh. Last Saturday night the Indians were soundly beaten by the Whitewater Warhawks 27-20.

LaCrosse works primarily from a straight T with the occasional use of the single wing and slot formation.

The big gun for Vickroy's In-

dians again this year is all-conference fullback Fred Pongratz. Pongratz is a double threat in the LaCrosse backfield, capable of running, passing or being passed to on any given play.

Another feature of the LaCrosse team Falcon fans will probably get a chance to see on Saturday night is the speediness of the defensive linebackers and ends and their ability to cover on most pass patterns.

In last year's game at Memorial Field the Indians came from behind in the last six minutes to score the winning touchdown. Bill Abraham took a Tom Everson punt on his own ten yard line and pounded 90 electrifying yards for the longest Indian touchdown of the year.

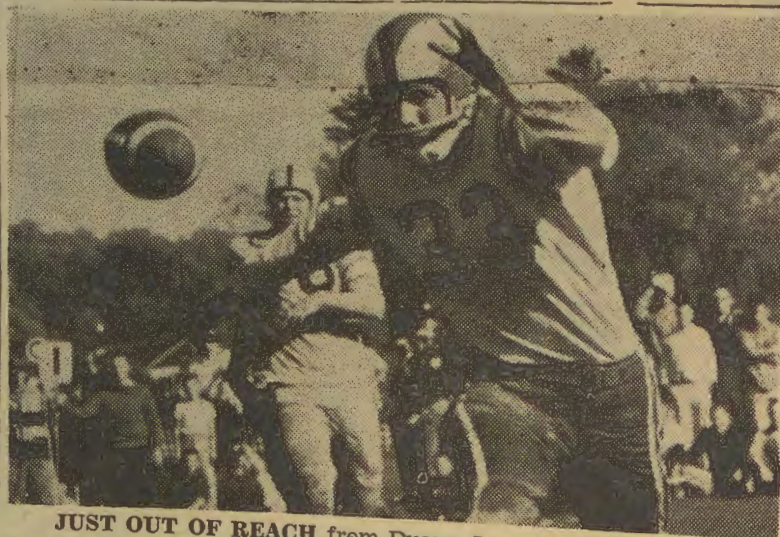
The Red and White took a 7-0 lead with four minutes to go in the first quarter. In the second quarter the Indians came back to tie the score when Wes Mooney speared a Tom Everson aerial attempt and scooted 30 yards for a TD.

With time running out in the first half, Bob Dawson fired two pass completions, moving the ball up to the LaCrosse 14, with 37 seconds left in the half.

On first down Jim Hallen faked a field goal attempt, but a bad pass from center went 20 yards over his head. Hallen raced back and picked up the ball and in a desperation pass found Jack Neurer open in the end zone. Hallen added the extra point attempt, making the score at half time 14 ti 7.
