## RAMER FIELD NEARS

### COMPLETION

The new athletic field on East Cascade avenue is very rapidly nearing completion, and will be ready for the coming grid games this fall. The new field is to be named Ramer Field, in honor of our honorable Normal School Regent, P. W. Ramer, who was very instrumental in securing funds for the field.

Ramer Field is to be one of the largest and best in the state. It covers a ten-acre tract which will furnish ample room for any and all athletic events. A quarter-mile track will surround the gridiron which is located on the west end of the field. The east end is reserved for an excellent baseball diamond, also several tennis courts, which will be completed as soon as possible. A temporary grandstand and sloping terraces will furnish sufficient room for all spectators at the games.

The general location and bowl effect of Ramer Field gives it a unique appearance. The students and faculty realize the great improvement and boost that is given the school by a field which will long hence be a pride of the school and this locality.
