Brief Sketches Of The Falcons

DAVE HANSON from River Falls. He played at the River Falls High School in 1937-38. This team in 1938 went to the state. He played forward. He is a veteran of the Marine Air Corps from the Pacific area.

DON BAIRD from River Falls. He played on the River Falls High School team and finished in 1939. He played center position. He also played on the Falcon squad before entering the service. He was a Marine.

BUD FOSS from River Falls played at the local high school in 1937-38-39-40. He played guard on the 1933 team that went to the state. He played at the Teachers College in 1940-41. In 1941 he entered the service with the Eighth Air Force and during his service, won the Combat Infantry Badge, Presidential citation with two oak leaf clusters and five battle stars.

GORDON VINE of Neilsville. He played on the high school team of Neilsville in 1938-39-40-41. In1943 he played at the Teachers college and won a letter. He entered the service in 1943 with the Air corps and spent 7 months in the E.T.O. area.

EARL PICHA from Hillsboro, played on the high school team of 1937-38-39-40. He was Co-Captain in 1939 and captain of the team in 1940. In 1940 he received the American Legion Award. He is a veteran of three years in the Air Corps and was located in the Europeon area.

DICK BERGGREN from Baldwin played on the high school team of 1941-42-43. Chosen all-tournament guard in 1941 when the team was district champions. He is a veteran of two years in the navy.

BYRON BROOKS from Spring Valley played on the teams of 1940-41-42. The '42 team of which he played forward won the district and regional tournamentand took fourth in the state tournament. He is a veteran of two and a half years in the Artillery and was located in the E.T.O. area.

NORVAL OLSON of Hudson played on the high school team of Hudson in 1939-40 as a guard. He is a veteran of five years in the So. Pacific.

WAYNE GREENLEE from St. Croix Falls played on the Falls team of 1942-43. He is a veteran and was in the Medical Corps. He was wounded in the invasion of Leyte.

HOWARD DIETZLER of Roberts, played center on the Roberts team of 1942-43-44. He won three letters in high school.

FRED THOME from Spring Valley, played on the Valley team of 1939-40-41-42. He won three letters and played a guard position on the 1942 team that went to the state tournament. He is a veteran of three years in the heavy weapon division of the Infantry and won the Purple Heart.

DICK TRACY formerly of Ellsworth, played on the Ellsworth team in 1938-39-40-41. The team of 1941 went to the state tournament. He is a veteran of the South Pacific area with the Marines earning three stars for major bttles.

DON GARDNER of Elmwood, played at Elmwood in 1943-44-45 as a guard. He was chosen on the all-star team. He won two letters.

JIM MOORE of Balsam Lake played center on the Balsam Lake team of 1944-45. The 1945 team was district champions.

ART VINDAHL of Hudson played forward on the Hudson team of 1944-45, captaining the team in 1945. In 1943 he played on the Altoona High School team. He was chosen "Representative athlete" in '45.
