Fifteen New Staff Members Join River Falls College Faculty

Fifteen new staff members will join the faculty of Wisconsin State College at River Falls for the 1960-61 school year, it was announced today by Pres. E. H. Kleinpell.

These include five new positions four as replacements for staff members who are on leave of absence doing graduate work, and six replacing faculty members who have retired or resigned.

Carlton E. Beck will join the staff as assistant professor of education. Mr. Beck received the BS degree in 1952 from Ohio University and was granted the ME degree from Ohio in 1954. He will receive his Ph.D. degree from the University of Minnesota this year. He taught at Parma (Ohio) high school from 1954-58 and at the University of Minnesota in 1958-59. Mr. Beck replaces Glen Tinkham who resigned to accept a position with a textbook company.

Donald F. Brod of Cortez, Colo., will join the faculty as an instructor in journalism. Mr. Brod has been news editor of the Montezuma Valley Journal at Cortez for the past two years. He received his bachelor's degree at Southeast Missouri State College at Cape Girardeau, Mo., and his master's degree from the School of Journalism at the University of Missouri in 1958. In addition to his teaching duties he will serve as advisor to the Student Voice.

Resident counselor at Prucha Hall will be George W. Curtis, Jr., who received his BA degree in 1959 and his MA degree this year at Michigan State University. He served as Resident Assistant for two years at Shaw Hall at Michigan State. In addition to his work in the residence hall, Mr. Curtis will teach a course in introductory psychology.

Dr. James C. Dollahan will join the School of Agriculture as assistant professor of animal husbandry replacing Prof. A. N. Johnson who retired at the close of the school year. Mr. Dollahan received his BS degree from New Mexico State University and the MA degree and Ph.D. degree from the University of Florida. For the past two years he has been on the staff of Mississippi State University.

Also teaching in the School of Agriculture will be Edwin P. Ebert who will act as an instructor in

agricultural engineering and industrial arts replacing Russell Gerber who has been granted a year's leave-of-absence to do graduate work at the University of Missouri. Mr. Ebert received both the BS and MS degrees at Stout State College.

R. Vern Elefson has been appointed assistant professor of agricultural economics. Mr. Elefson received the BS degree from the University of Missouri and has completed all course requirements for the Ph.D. degree at the University of Minnesota where he has taught principles of economics in

Hog Show Will Be At College Farm

The 4th Annual Meat Type Hog show will be held at the Wisconsin State College Farm on Sept. 8. Any farmers of Pierce and St. Croix counties are invited to exhibit a pen of two market hogs. Entry can be made by contacting either the county agent at Baldwin or Ellsworth.

The animals will be graded and a judging contest will be held for both the adults and high school boys who attend the meeting. Cash prizes will be awarded to the exhibitors of the four best pens of hogs.

Extension specialists Fred Geisler and Ray Penn are slated to speak on the afternoon program.

Dealers who handle all kinds of hog equipment will be invited to exhibit at the show. Further details can be obtained from the county agent of either Pierce or St. Croix counties.

A noon luncheon will be served by the River Falls Chamber of Commerce.

Immediately following the show all hogs will be trucked directly to South St. Paul where they will be sold and slaughtered. All interested persons can view the carcasses in the packing plant on Monday, Sept. 12.

This event is sponsored by the River Falls Chamber of Commerce, Central Livestock Association, St. Paul, Wisconsin State College at River Falls, University of Wisconsin, and the extension services of Pierce and St. Croix counties.

President of U. of M. To Speak at Dedication

Principal speaker at dedication ceremonies for three new buildings on the River Falls campus Friday, September 23, at 10 a.m. will be Dr. O. Meredith Wilson, the new president of the University of Minnesota.

Dr. Wilson's speech at the dedication of the H. T. Hagestad Student Center, the R. A. Karges Physical Education and Recreation Center and Prucha Residence Hall will be one of his first off the University of Minnesota campus since his arrival in this area.

Members of the Board of Regents of State Colleges will meet their September session at River Falls in conjunction with the dedication ceremonies.

Dr. Wilson came to Minnesota from the University of Oregon where he served as president from 1954 to 1960. Trained as an historian, he had previously taught at Brigham Young University, the University of Utah, and the University of Chicago. Immediately preceding his work as president at Oregon, he served as executive secretary of the Fund for the Advancement of Education.

Mr. Wilson was graduated from Brigham Young University in 1934 and received the Ph.D. degree from the University of California in 1943. Previously, he had done work at the University of London and the University of Heidelberg.

Dr. Wilson is a member of the American Historical Society, the American Academy of Political and Social Sciences, Phi Beta Kappa, and the National Council of Boy Scouts of America.

A second dedication also is scheduled at the College this fall on Saturday, October 29, when ceremonies will be observed at the Campus Laboratory Farm. The dedication will coincide with the annual Rural Life Conference October 28-29.

Cyrus Running, head of the music department at Concordia College, Moorehead, Minn., will give the opening freshman convocation at 8 p.m. in North Hall Auditorium on Wednesday, Sept. 7.

Mr. Running is a piano humorist, and his act is a piano and voice satire. He does a take-off "on everything from classics to the popular groaners."

The convocation is open to all students, with no admission charge.

Orientation For Freshmen Begins with 9 a. m. Convo

Orientation of new students at the college will begin with an opening convocation Tuesday, September 6, at 9 a.m. followed by meetings for freshmen and transfer students with their advisors.

Tuesday afternoon will be occupied with the freshman testing program and, in the evening, a freshman mixer is scheduled in the small gymnasium of the R. A. Karges Physical Education and Recreation Center. A picnic supper will be served by the Student Center cafeteria.

Registration of students will begin Wednesday morning with seniors registering from 8 to 10 a.m. and freshmen registering during the remainder of the day. An all-school convocation is scheduled for Wednesday evening.

Sophomores and juniors will register Thursday morning beginning at 8 a.m. along with those seniors who have not registered previously. Freshmen will have a convocation at 10 a.m. when college organizations will present an outline of their programs for the coming year. Freshmen physical examinations are scheduled for Thursday afternoon. Open house will be observed Thursday evening in River Falls churches when student religious groups will meet to acquaint newcomers with their organizations.

A full schedule of classes is set to begin Friday, with a dance scheduled for Friday evening sponsored by the Social Commit-

tee. The opening game of the football season will be played at Ramer Field Saturday evening when the Falcons meet Augsburg College.

A late registration fee will be charged students enrolling after Thursday and a special fee will be assessed freshmen who must be given tests after the scheduled period Tuesday afternoon.

Faculty members will have their first meeting of the year at 9 a.m. Monday, Sept. 5, in the Little Theatre.

Robert Swenson To Be Manager of Ace Food Service

The contract for the college's food service has been awarded to Ace Foods of Milwaukee. Named as manager was Robert Swenson of Minneapolis, Minn.

A graduate of Gustavus Adolphus, Mr. Swenson joined Ace Foods last year to manage the cafeteria service at Wisconsin State College at Superior. Previous experience includes two and one-half years with the Farmers Union Central Exchange in South St. Paul, Minn. Mr. Swenson is married and has one daughter.

Ace Foods also serves Superior, Mount Mary College, the University of Wisconsin's Downtown and Kemwood Campuses, and many industrial plants.

Two different plans are being offered the students for the coming year. Plan I includes 15 meals per week at a cost of \$108 per 12-week quarter. This plan covers three meals a day Monday through Friday.

Plan II offers 20 meals per week at a cost of \$126 per 12-week quarter. This includes three meals a day Monday through Saturday and breakfast and lunch on Sunday.

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Siemers Works With Off-Campus Teaching

Explanation of the philosophy concerning the off-campus secondary student teaching program to nine participating schools in the area has been the recent concern of Dr. Allan A. Siemers, Director of Secondary Student Teaching at the College. Dr. Siemers has been meeting with high school faculties during their pre-school workshops, advising and instructing the schools concerning River Falls' off-campus block student teaching program.

This year nearly all secondary teacher education candidates will be on the block program - that is, teaching full time for eight weeks off-campus after three weeks of intensive methods and materials instruction on-campus. Because so many students are now engaged in this type of training and because of a need for a more definitive term other than "student teacher" (actually the college has many categories of "student teacher" training, both on and off campus), block program secondary trainees will be designated as "externs". The college believes that by using the term "extern" to identify "eight weeks, off-campus, secondary, student trainees" greater clarity can be given to this specific training program.

In the fall quarter twenty-three externs will be teaching in thirteen cooperating schools in an area from Red Wing, Minnesota, to Spooner, Wisconsin. Many of these students have voluntarily attended the pre-school workshops in schools where they will be externing from September 28 to November 23.

The college will continue to have the off-campus supervision services of two men, Dr. Siemers and Carlton Beck, recently from the University of Minnesota. Mr. Beck will be completing his Ph. D. in Secondary Education this year, and in addition to his extern supervision he will be teaching the Education 20 classes on campus. He replaces Glen Tinkham who resigned from the college faculty in April.

The Falcons' hopes will get the extreme test as the Auggies will be fielding an all-veteran team. The Augsburg attack features a pair of fleet halfbacks Jim Roebach and Jerry Peterson. The rest of the Minnesota College's backfield is intact from last year with Oscar Blegen at fullback and Dennis Kalpin running the squad at quarterback.

Last year River Falls dropped a 27-21 decision to Augsburg with the clincher coming on Roebach's 45 year scoring dash midway through the second half.

After a week of practice Poltfoot would only narrow his start-

ing offensive unit to 20 men.

Sixty Gridiron Hopefuls Report to First Practice

Sixty gridiron hopefuls reported Thursday, Sept. 1, for the first 1960 football practice. The number will again jump when late players check in this week.

Forming a nucleus for the 1960 edition of 'Falcon Football' are 16 lettermen. After winning the conference crown in 1958 the Falcons dropped to eighth last year with a 2-4-1 conference record.

Expected to bolster the college attack this year will be two-time all-conference halfback, Mick Lauber. Lauber has lead the team in scoring for three successive seasons.

Head Coach Fran Poltfoot faces a major rebuilding job. Since winning the WSCC football crown Poltfoot has lost three-time all-conference end Jack Neuer, Jim Carew, a 220 pound all-conference tackle for two years and Dick Shimel, who was an all-conference guard on the 1958 squad.

Other key players lost by graduation were quarterbacks Jim Hallen and Jon Hillstead, tackle Ed Olund, fullback Jack Omer, center Rog Piehl, and halfback Frank Sprenger.

The Falcons will open the season with only one veteran quarterback, Bob Dawson, as junior signal caller Tom Everson entered the military service. The loss of center Dave Le Claire opens up the other sore spot in the "Red and White's" offensive unit as there is no candidate for the position with college experience. Other non-returning lettermen are halfback Marv Hanson and guard Jim Murphy.

Poltfoot says that the fans will see more shifting of offensive and defensive units than any other season. The Falcons open the season Saturday hosting the Augsburg Augies at Ramer Field. A scrimmage against St. Thomas was played Sunday.

Camping, Outdoor Education Conference Set for Sept. 14

A full-day conference on school camping and outdoor education is being planned by Wisconsin State College at River Falls in cooperation with the State Department of Public Instruction for September 14 at Camp St. Croix.

The program, to be at the camp south of Hudson, is under the direction of Dr. Rowland Klink, director of the campus laboratory school, and Orlo Miller, state coordinator of health, physical education and safety. It will be open to superintendents, supervisors, and principals of schools throughout Northwestern Wisconsin.

Dr. L. G. Stone, Dean of the School of Education at River Falls, points out that school camping is one of the promising frontiers in curriculum develop-

ment, and that the conference Sept. 14 is designed to acquaint school administrators with some of its possibilities.

The program will begin at 9:30 a.m. with a welcome and explanation of the conference by Dr. Klink. Others on the program include Mr. Miller, who will discuss the purposes and program of school camping; Jack Murdock, camp director; Robert Ellingson of the state conservation department; and Jenny Webster, superintendent of schools of Eau Claire county. Two motion pictures and a luncheon also are included in the day's program.
