The women's debate team, Louellyn Reiss and Louise Melbye, won two out of four debates. The wins were against St. Olaf's first and second teams.

Eau Claire played host to 10 colleges from three states at a debate tournament on March 3. The colleges represented were: Concordia Junior College, Concordia College, St. Olaf, Gustavus Adolphus, Augsburg, Luther, Iowa State Teachers, Eau Claire State Teachers, Macalester, Milwau-kee State Teachers, and River Falls State Teachers.

Lois Hunter gave her original oration that placed her first at the Moorehead meet, and Reverend Splinter gave the talk which tied him for second place in extemporaneous speaking at the same meet.

A very interesting letter came from Lt. Rita Salmon now stationed in Texas. She writes:

"The work we're doing here is very fascinating to me. It is nearly all peripheral nerve injuries .And we have to keep records of it all, going to Washington for the "History of this War." I surely do love this work. You can't imagine what a thrill it is to teach fellows to walk on their new limbs. I think I have a "sure fire method." In fact, I taught one fellow who has two wooden legs to walk without any limp. First time he did it we were so thrilled we both started to cry. These patients are all so grateful and swell about everything you do for them ....

The following was written by Pfc. Harry B. Healy:

"Even though there many new and strange names in the Student Voice. I enjoy reading it very much. It is about the only source of information I have for keeping un with the old gang. This war has spread us far and wide and thus far I haven't had the good fortune to meet any of

them over here.

"Right at present. censorship draws the veil of secrecy over my whereabouts. I can sav. though, that since my arrival on this side of the Atantic. I have been in England France. Belgium, Holland, and Germany. I have had the privilege of spending two days in London and also seeing Paris. Brussels. and Liege. all of which was very interesting and enjoyable. However only served to increase my longing for and appreciation of the United States."

Lt. Phil Hammer writes:

are maintaining our aerial nugilism against "Jerry" and keeping very busy at it. Our basketball team 'Franks Yanks' is one of which we are proud. To date they have rung up 29

victories and are undefeated. We think they have a swell chance of copping the 8th A.F. crown."

Closing of the letter to Stratton of Capt. Harold L. Odden station in England:

"Greet all of friends back there, and my deepest sympathy goes to you with such a concentration of women about

you all the time."

Howard J. Hannon wrote a very interesting letter about the people in the Philippine Island where he is now stationed. "Most of the people we come into contact with are those of the farming class. Hence their amount of education is quite small compared to even the average G. I. Most of them speak some Engglish so a conversation can be had, but the difference in use of words and the great amount of slang used by the soldiers keeps the conservation on a very plain scale. They very friendly people and like to talk. They are quite good business people and really can strike a good bargain. Inflation is high. Money to the Philipino has no value so they sock the poor soldier high prices for any souvenir and any laundry they do. However for the G. I. money still has a value and so a great problem arises when the two factors meet to do any amount of business. The result has been a change to the barter system. .

"I'm still working as a chaplain's assistant and now I'm with a new Chaplain. I have a choir of about 15 voices and even if I do say so, they are quite good. They all have good voices and they sing very well together. . It is one thing I have always wanted to do and, now that I can, I enjoy it

very much."

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## College Survey Shows Legislation on "Cuts"

The school paper at Eau Claire State Teachers College polled fourteen Wisconsin colleges' practices in relation to unexcused class absences, commonly known as "-cuts". The reports from some of the colleges are given below.

Carrol College—No "cuts"

Carrol College—No "cuts" permitted. Each faculty member decides penalties to be assigned. "Cuts" immediately before and after vacation heavily penaltized.

Central State Teachers College—(Stevens Point)—No "cuts" permitted. No rule regarding penalties. "Cuts" before and after vacations are not more heavily penalized.

La Crosse State Teachers College—"Cuts" permitted if the teacher permits them in his or her classes. "Cuts" immediately before and after vacation must be excused by the deans, or the student must pay a reinstatement fee of \$2-before allowed to return to class.

Oshkosh State Teachers College—"Cuts" immediately before and after vacation, or from the last session of a class unless excused by President

will result in a requirement of one additional credit hour for graduation for each unexcused absence. Otherwise no regulation.

River Falls State Teachers College—No "Cuts" permitted. Not permitted to make up work lost if they do cut. Penalty for "Cuts" immediately before and after vacation left to individual teachers.

Superior State Teachers College—"Cuts" are permitted. Same number as credit hours in course. If number exceeds limit, additional credits required for graduation. "Cuts" immediately before and after vacations are not more heavily penalized.

University of Wisconsin—
No legislation on 'Cuts''. Attendance is left to the individual teachers and the students.


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
