From England, came this letter from Lt. Frank O. Pappenfuss. "Since you last heard from me I have moved about quite a bit so that at the present time I find myself in England-yes, dear old Enland. This would be a great place if they would modernize it and find a "bad weather eradicator." I have been fortunate enough to get several 48-hour passes. One was spent in London, naturally, and the other in Cambridge. While there I made it a point to visit the famous Cambridge University. Quite an interesting place to say the least.' "
