## Annual High School Tournament 'Climax' Tonight

### Oshkosh Is Host Of Annual Forensics Contests Tonight

John Burke Will be Representative In Oratorical Contest; Placed Two Years Ago

Extemporaneous Speaking Entrant Is Jack Davidson; Has Had Experience

The annual forensics contest is being held in Oshkosh today at which John Burke, the River Falls orator, and John Davidson, the extempore speaker, are entering from River Falls.

Both men have been working diligently with the aid of Mr. Mitchell and are rounding their work into shape so that they are expected to place well up in their respective contests.

Burke and Davidson are both experienced speakers. Two years ago Burke won second in the state contest between orators, and he has also been a member of several Falls debate teams. Davidson has competed in local extempo and oratorical contests and has been placed among the leaders every time. He, too, has been a member of debate teams here.

These two men will be accompanied by President Ames and Mr. Mitchell.

Both men practised upon their respective work last Tuesday by presenting what they will have to do at Oshkosh before the student body in the assembly.

Milwaukee and LaCrosse Teams Will Be Opponents In Way Of Championship Now

River Falls began its march toward a championship in state debating by winning both of its conference tilts from Superior and Eau Claire two weeks ago today.

The judge of the contest against the Eau Claire negatives, here, was Professor John Castell of Northwestern University. Many students listened to his after debate criticisms.

The entire Superior student body turned out at the debate there which Professor A. T. Weaver, head of the U. of W. speech department, gave the River Falls team.

As a result of these victories River Falls has earned the right to meet the victors of the two other triangles, which were Milwaukee and LaCrosse. The negative team will meet the Milwaukee affirmatives here some time during week after next. The date has not been definitely settled as yet, but will be after the forensics contest at Oshkosh.

The negative team will meet the Falls affirmative here at the same time. According to the talk in Coach Mitchell's office, this debate is going to be an unusually hard one as LaCrosse has three veterans on the team that they are sending here.

### Eight Quintets Fight For Go To Madison Tourney

Teams Are Selected By Representatives of Districts On Relative Strength

Tournament Now Under Supervision of W. I. A. A. Formerly Put On By Normals

The annual high school basketball tournament is being held in the North Hall Gymnasium this week. The tourney has been one of the high lights in the college and high school years for some length of time.

Members of the tournament have been chosen not so much on their standing or the games won or lost, but upon their showing of strength. Some teams have played much stronger opponents than others, thus lowering their standing below that of some team that has won more games, but who has played weaker opponents.

All these points are taken into consideration when the representative from Ashland, Eau Claire, Rice Lake, and River Falls districts meet with the representative of the Wisconsin Interscholastic Athletic Association to pick those teams which they consider are the strongest in these four districts.

The teams which have been chosen for this year's tournament are Colfax, Clear Lake, Spring Valley, Hudson, Downing, Ellsworth, Menomonie and River Falls. On the opening day Downing played Clear Lake, and Ellsworth played Colfax in the afternoon while Hudson played River Falls and Spring Valley played Menomonie in the evening. Further information in regards to the games is found on pages three and four of this paper.

Tournaments have been held here for about sixteen years, the first one being held in 1911. They were not, however, played under the auspices of the W. I. A. A. until four years later. Up to that time the Normal schools invited in the strongest teams of their districts and conducted a tournament, the winners of which had the privilege of entering a state tourney held at one of the normal schools. Three such tourneys were held. Stevens Point, Milwaukee, and Eau Claire each held one.

Then the W. I. A. A. took charge so that now the winners go to Madison to determine who is the state champion.

RIVER FALLS HUDSON

The evening schedule for Wednesday started off with a bang when the Falls quint defeated the Hudson team by the small but interesting score of 15 to 10.

The local five showed a slightly superior type of teamwork, and handled the ball in a better style than their opponents.

The first half was the fastest of the day with neither team showing any decided superiority.

Hudson began the scoring with a long shot, and River Falls followed suit. River Falls seemed a little bit better at working the ball down the floor, with Hudson resorting almost entirely to long shots. The half ended with the Falls leading 9 to 5.

River Falls slowed down a little in the second half and with the loss of their captain and center, Linehan, were soon tied with a score nine all. They dropped a gratis shot to take the lead at the end of the third quarter.

The last period was all River Falls' and they came out on top with Hudson's scalp. Sutherland starred on the floor.

## SPRING VALLEY - MEMONOMIE

Memonomie handily defeated the Spring Valley aggregation by a 14 to 30 count. Memonomie was compelled to wear white sweaters as both teams had red uniforms, but this did not seem to bother them any, for they soon piled up a commanding lead. The Valley men had an attack of stage fright in the first few minutes of play but at last came to enough to get seven points to their opponents seventeen during the first half.

The accurate shooting of both long and short shots coupled with a far better developed teamwork proved too much for Spring Valley in both halves of the game, and Memonomie easily copped the tilt.

Stori of Memonomie was the star of the game.

## COLFAX-CLEAR LAKE

The dark horse of the tournament, Colfax, sank a two-pointer from the tipoff. Clear Lake evened things up soon after. In less than three minutes Colfax ran their total up to seven while the Lakers were collecting four. Clear Lake took time out, and came back on the floor, making three baskets to put them in the lead. Not to be outdone Colfax dropped in two short ones and a gratis shot to take the long end of the 13 to 10 score at the half.

Colfax ran up three baskets in short order as the second half opened. The Lakers took a spurt, dropped two from the field. The final quarter caused the entire crowd to come to its feet, but Colfax kept its lead and came out of the game the victor.

The game ended 26 to 22 and was one of the most exciting of the tournament. By virtue of their victory they will meet River Falls tonight in the finals of the tournament. The betting stands even as to who the winner will be.

## HUDSON-SPRING VALLEY

Spring Valley sank a long one just after the tip-off, and duplicated it thirty seconds later. They started out playing a much better game than they played against Memonomie the night before. The quint that put up such a good game against River Falls the night before was held scoreless the first quarter and let the Valley boys score six more field goals in the second period while they were only able to gather in one point on a free throw.

The Memonomie coach remarked that his team would have been beaten if they had played in the same style the night before.

The last half found the tables entirely reversed with Hudson getting all of the baskets. Spring Valley did not count once while Hudson gathered in eleven points to bring their total up to twelve, which was six points less than than they needed to tie the score. The game ended with the score standing 18 to 12.

## DOWNING- ELLSWORTH

Ellsworth went into the fray with determination to make up for the stinging defeat at the hands of Colfax. They scored five points before Downing knew that they were playing, but Downing finally woke up and showered the backboard with shots but only two of them were successful in finding the iron rim. The half ended with Ellsworth leading 5 to 4.

The teams started out quite evenly in the second half, neither team making many shots. In the final quarter, however, Ellsworth hit its stride,

bringing the score up to fifteen for Ellsworth while Downing had to be satisfied with seven points.

Both Downing and Hudson were eliminated from the tournament because of their two defeats.

## MEMONOMIE- CLEAR LAKE

Clear Lake was eliminated from the tournament this morning by Memonomie in a slow contest ending 30 to 13. Clear Lake held their opponents almost on even terms the first half, but were no match for Memonomie the second half.

Memonomie plays Spring Valley tonight for third and fourth place.

## ELLSWORTH-SPRING VALLEY

In one of the slowest games of the tournament Spring Valley defeated Ellsworth for the right to meet Memonomie tonight. The first half ended with Ellsworth leading 3 to 1. At the third period whistle the score stood 3 all. In the last period Spring Valley played circles around Ellsworth and won the game 8 to 4.

As a result of these contests and last night's games the program will consist of games between River Falls and Colfax for first and second honors and between Memonomie and Spring Valley for third and fourth.

The games promise to be close and fast, and a large crowd is expected.

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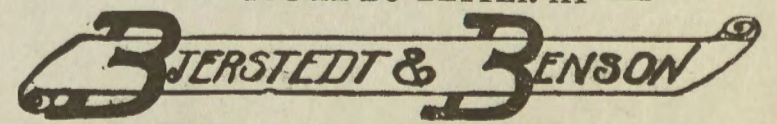


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# Superior Teachers Fall To Lose Conference Title

## Victors Are Fastest Quint Ever On Floor

### Brilliant Comback In Last Few Minutes of Play Takes Game Out of Coals for River Falls After Superior's Last Half Spurt.

In one of the fastest and most exciting contests that has ever been staged on the Falls floor the River Falls midgets gathered in few baskets in the last few minutes of play and smashed all of Superior's hopes for a championship by one the pluckiest uphill battles downing the Superiorites by a 37-33 score.

Witnesses of the game classed it as evidencing the best all around basketball playing that they have ever seen. One thing is certain however, and that is River Falls has never before met a tougher foe than Superior.

There was very little difference in the style of play or ability between the two teams, both playing a fast driving game that kept the crowd up on its feet cheering continually. At no time before in the season has River Falls met a team that could go into the fray driving for the ball on every move made by the opposing team and get it as much they did.

Although the cardinal quint lead at the end of the first half Superior soon took the lead away, and it was only a great deal of fight and basketball strategy that River Falls was able to take the game out of the fire.

#### THE GAME

The game opened with the Falls shooting all around their opponents but failing to hit the loop at any time Bud started the scoring with a field goal. Seg fouled Horizart, who failed to make it.

Bliss missed his free throw given to him by Dolan. Bud made a free throw and Nor followed under the basket. Bliss sank another gratis shot. Superior took an easy shot and missed it. Nadolskit made a field goal. Superior, like River Falls, was missing the basket. No. 1 fouled Hunt, who made it. Nor made a free throw after a technical had been called on Superior. The proceeds of this tournament will be put into a fund for baseball this spring.

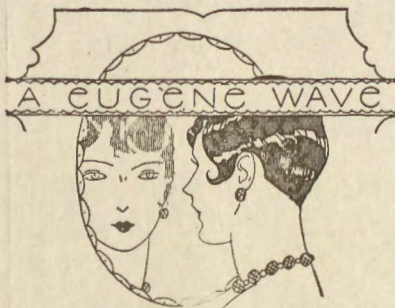

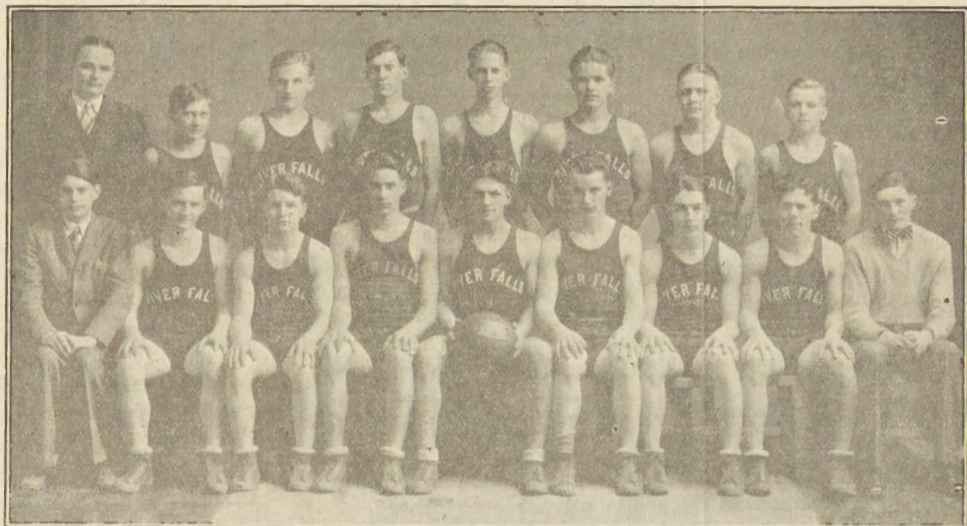
This will be an Oxford decision debate; that is, there will be a vote taken from the crowd before the debate and after, the team causing the greatest change in opinion winning the debate.

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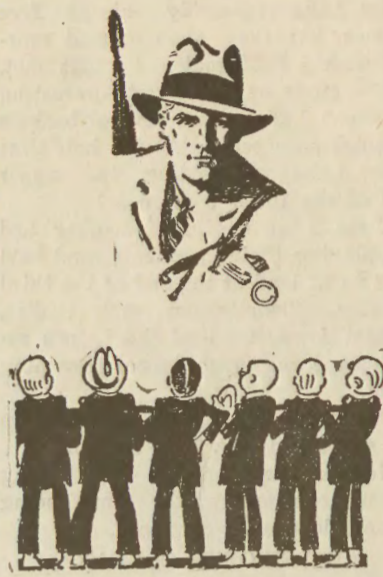
