Floats, Bands Will Start Saturday's Festivities

"Blugold Blackout" for River Falls 1959 Homecoming will reach its climax tomorrow afternoon on Ramer Field at 1:00 p.m., when Fran Polsfoot's Falcons clash with the Eau Claire Blugolds, coached by John Rice. The Falcons will be trying to retain their slim chances of repeating as WSCC Football Champions.

The annual Homecoming parade will begin the day's festivities, at 10 a.m. with 32 units scheduled to appear. Stone Ceremony 'Open House' at Student Center College to Expand Arts, General Education Programs

The date for the laying of the Student Center cornerstone has been set for October 25. The Center will then hold an open house.

President Kleinpell will begin the brief ceremony with a short speech. He will be followed by Curtiss Larson, who will also deliver a short address. The contractor's representative will then present the building to Kleinpell. Tours will be conducted throughout the afternoon. Freshmen and sophomores will act as guides. Sigma Chi Sigma will be serving refreshments in the Center from 1:30 to 5 p.m.

To be included in the cornerstone are copies of the contracts, the original budget, rules and regulations, the history of the Center and pictures of the governing organizations.

Letters are being sent out to business people and alumni inviting them to the ceremony.

This ceremony is intended mostly for the community but parents and students are also invited to attend.

Mr. Reynolds, director of the Student Center, emphasized the fact that this cornerstone laying should not be confused with the dedication which will be in the spring.

Freshmen entering the College next fall will find broadened general education and liberal arts programs being offered. A change in the two programs was voted by the River Falls faculty recently.

Although the total number of hours required in the programs has changed but slightly, an effort has been made to increase the scope of the two areas.

The changes include a requirement in the fine arts in the general education and a broader foundation for students working for the Bachelor of Arts degree.

To allow time for the fine arts requirements in the general education program, the number of hours in certain other courses will be cut. English 51, 52 and 53, now four credit courses, will be cut to three hours as will Biology 11, 12 and 13 and Physical Science 11, 12 and 13.

Added to the program will be six hours in the fine arts. Students may choose two of three three-credit courses in art, speech or music. Replacing the present "Great Issues" course, Social Science 196, 197 and 198, will be "Great Ideas in the Humanities," "Great Ideas in the Social Sciences," and "Great Ideas in Science." The student will take the two courses in this series which do not fall in to his major area. Each is a three-credit course.

In the liberal arts program the student will be required to meet the above general education requirements, take three hours of

philosophy, six additional hours of fine arts (music, art or theatre) and three hours of electives from English, journalism, philosophy, library science, speech (non-theatre) or foreign language. In the science-math group the student will be required to take eight hours in a science area other than the one which he took to meet his general education requirement and a four-credit math course in mathematics.

In Group III, the Social Sciences, he will be required to take History 21 and 2.

Students presently enrolled on the campus will have the option of meeting requirements in the present catalog or, if they can work them into the schedule, the new program which will be listed in the 1960-62 catalog.

Albert at Symposium At Argonne Laboratory

Earl G. Albert, chairman of the physics department, attended a Symposium of the the Education and Training for Health Physics October 12, sponsored by the Oak Ridge Institute of Nuclear Studies in cooperation with the Argonne National Laboratory and the Associated Midwest Universities.

The symposium was held at the Argonne National Laboratory near Chicago. Approximately 70 colleges were invited to send representatives. A tour of a special area of the Argonne Laboratory was included in the program of activities.

Republican Party Free From Factionalism-Quie

"A political party divided against itself may keep going but it does this at the price of compromising and watering down vital issues. The Republican Party is extremely blessed by being free of such fights," Congressman Albert Quie of Minnesota told the student body Wednesday. The Minnesota lawmaker, Congressman Robert Griffin of Michigan and Melvin Laird of Wisconsin spoke at the "Recruits for a Sound America" program in the Little Theatre.

Speaking on the contribution to America of Congressman Griffin, Mr. Quie said, "at 36 years old, he co-authored the Landrum-Griffin labor reform bill, the most important piece of legislation passed by the 86th Congress and undoubtedly, one of the most meaningful bills of our time."

Congressman Griffin commented that the Republicans have not presented their messages and their issues in a clear fashion to

the American people. He went on to say that "ours is the party supporting Jeffersonian principles of liberty today—this is the party that practically unanimously supported a bill of rights for the working man in the recent labor legislation—this is the party that has broken out of the reactive atmosphere of the 1940's in our foreign policy."

Speaking of foreign policy, Congressman Laird asserted "the creative Republican approach has made old world diplomacy and Yalta-type conferences an anachronism. We have assaulted the very citadel of Communist ideas itself and have forced it to respond to our offensive—not with missiles—but with reason. The shabby, poor logic behind the Marxian-Leninist-system is being exposed."

Following their speeches, the congressmen answered questions from the students. The program was sponsored by the college Young Republicans club.

Senator John F. Kennedy of Massachusetts will visit the River Falls campus November 12. The 9:30 speech opens the presidentials hopefuls' two day tour of northern Wisconsin. He will also speak in Eau Claire.

Edmund Nix, 9th district chairman and state secretary of the Kennedy for President Club of Wisconsin said the visit to River

FACULTY NOMINATES LOCAL STUDENTS FOR WILSON FELLOWSHIPS

Dr. McLaughlin, Registrar and Director of Arts and Sciences, has announced the college's participation in the Woodrow Wilson National Fellowship Foundation program. C. F. Littell, National Representative for the foundation, met with several groups of faculty members Wednesday.

The Foundation awards fellowships for first year graduate work leading to a career in college teaching. It primarily supports students interested in the humanities and social science.

Six students have been nominated by faculty members and more nominations will be made before Oct. 31. Nominated candidates will be notified and given two weeks to return their formal application. The applications will be sent to the regional screening board, which invites those they feel are qualified, to a personal interview.

The names of the candidates selected by the regional board are to be forwarded to a National Director for further screening. Nominees will be required to write a 1000 word essay explaining why they have selected the college teaching field.

RF Debate Team Will Open Season Against St. Olaf

The first debate tournament of the season will be Thursday, Oct. 29 at St. Olaf College in Northfield, Minn. The tourney is part of the regularly scheduled events of Twin City Debate League. River Falls will be represented by three teams.

Reuss Advocates Tight Monetary Policy for U.S.

Congressman Henry Reuss (D-Wis.) visited the campus Thursday as part of a tour through northern Wisconsin.

In his speech in the Little Theatre he urged the administration "for the good of the country" to cast aside its economic policy of "tight money and fiscal looseness" in favor of a policy of "adequate money and fiscal tightness".

Asserting that the tight money-loose fiscal policy has hurt the United States "by seriously retarding our rate of economic growth", Reuss contended that the best interests of the nation require a change "to a policy of monetary adequacy and fiscal tightness."

The Congressman also commented on the recent visit of Soviet Premier Khrushchev to the United States. He felt the visit was a step in the right direction in an attempt to lessen world tension and promote a unified peace.

Gridders Take On Bluegolds Tomorrow; To Meet La Crosse There Next Week

Tomorrow afternoon's gridiron struggle between the River Falls Falcons and the Eau Claire Bluegolds ranks as the feature attraction of this year's Homecoming festival. And well it should, since there is nothing like the excitement and color of a football game to keep everyone in the spirit of this fall classic.

This season's version of the Falcon-Blugold clash should resemble those of seasons past except in one respect. Traditionally this game involves the league lead or at least second place. Such is not the case this year. If River Falls wins, they still would retain an outside chance at the crown but the chances are slim.

Still the game promises to be one of the most hard-fought of the year as these two teams are noted for a bitter rivalry that stretches back as far as fans can remember.

In 1957 for instance, many of these same Blugold and Falcon players battled it out on Ramer Field in that year's Homecoming and River Falls walked off with a 23-0 victory.

The Falcon's only two losses to Eau Claire in the past 10 years cost them two conference championships. In 1955 a powerful River Falls team handed LaCrosse its first conference loss in seven seasons and seemed headed toward the WSCC title when Eau Claire's Blugolds stopped them short by a 20-13 count. The following season, with Little All-American Johnny Steffen, bullyish Bucky DiSalvo, and rugged Ron Wunrow operating at full speed, the Falcons blew into Eau Claire with visions of a conference crown again. But Jim Bollinger, Don Pierce, and company ruined everything by blasting River Falls 35-21 before one of the largest crowds ever to witness a WSCC game. Frank Sprenger, Jim Carlew, Jim Hallen, Jack Neurer, and many others of that 1956 team are still around and still haven't forgotten that night in Eau Claire. They'll be out to even the score tomorrow in what they hope will be a "Blugold Blackout".

Next Saturday the Falcons travel to LaCrosse to take on the league-leading Indians. To put it mildly, River Falls will have its hands full. LaCrosse has out-

scored its opponents 101-7 in three conference games and 171-39 in rolling up an overall mark of five wins and no defeats.

The Indians will present two of the finest backs in the state in Fred Pongrantz and Gene Conger. The former is ranked fourth in the nation's small college scorers with 55 points in four games while the latter has scored 30 points in two games. In addition LaCrosse will present a big rugged line to open up the holes on offense and plug 'em up on defense.

Fran Polsfoot remains optimistic about the game, however, contending that on any given night any team can beat another. He points to the Falcon's outstanding performances against Stevens Point and Stout with the claim that a similar job against LaCrosse could result in a Falcon victory.
