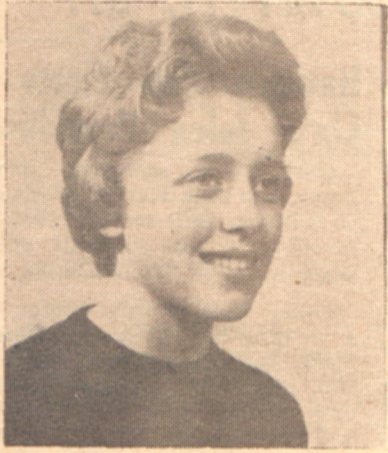

Elementary Educators Will Assemble Friday

Approximately 500 elementary teachers from Western Wisconsin and Eastern Minnesota are expected to attend Wisconsin's largest Elementary Education Conference at River Falls College this Friday, March 25.

Theme of the Third Annual Conference will be "Trail Blazing in the Social Studies."

The Elementary Conference began as a service of the College to the area from which River Falls draws students, and is designed to meet the needs of elementary teachers, with special emphasis for administration leaders.

Registration

Registration and a coffee hour will begin in North Hall Gym at 8 a.m. At 9 o'clock, all guests will assemble in the Auditorium for a general session with Dr. Rowland Klink, Director of the Campus School, presiding. President Kleinpell will give the welcome address.

The keynote address will be by Dr. Hanne Hicks, professor of Education at Indiana University. His topic will be "For Today and Tomorrow."

Professor Hicks has had experience in his field that ranges from teaching in elementary schools in Missouri and serving as state supervisor of curriculum

development to helping establish a new teachers college in Thailand.

Special Features

The program will include two demonstration periods and two periods of sectional meetings. From 10:30 to 11:30 a.m. the conference will break into demonstration and discussion groups to cover such topics as "Counseling With Young Children Concerning Life Situations" and "Developing Group Leadership with Children."

From 11:30 to 12:30 there will be a book exhibit in North Hall Gym. A 12:30 luncheon will be held in the Student Center Cafeteria.

Beginning at 1:50 p.m. will be more demonstration and discussion periods. Some of the topics will be "Pupil-Teacher Planning", "Creativity in the Social Studies", and "Characteristics of Effective Social Studies Units".

FALCON FILM SERIES FEATURES 'POTEMKIN'

"Potemkin", considered to be one of the most important films of the history of silent cinema, will be shown in the Little Theater on March 22 at 8:30 p.m.

Sergei Eisenstein, director of the film, was seeking to mould the film medium into a new, dynamic art form. His approach to cinema was that of a scientist, and each of his motion pictures must be considered as an experiment in the presentation of ideas.

Eisenstein himself coined the phrase "intellectual cinema" to characterize his early work, and it was his belief that any concept, no matter how abstract, could be portrayed visually on the screen.

"Potemkin", (1925) the film which brought Eisenstein international fame, introduced several new ideas to the screen in subject as well as in form. It is a realistic re-creation of one episode in the Russian Revolution of 1905—the mutiny of the sailors of the battleship Potemkin and the massacre of the people of Odessa who sympathized with the mutineers. In the film he has used the people of Odessa as players instead of professional actors.

Admission to the film, which is sponsored by the Falcon Film Series Enrichment Committee, will be 50 cents. Coffee will be served after the film by Sigma Chi Sigma.

College Schedules Forensics Contest

Approximately 150 area high school students are expected to be on campus this Saturday, March 26, for the District Forensics Contest. The participants will be those students who have received an "A" rating in the recent league contests at various locations.

Contestants who receive an "A" rating here at the District Contest will represent their school at the State Speech Meet to be held at a later date.

The students may participate in any one of seven divisions; extemporaneous speaking, humorous declamation, serious declamation, play reading, oral interpretation, original oratory, or learned oratory.

Judges for the contest will be college professors from River Falls, Eau Claire, and Stout.

Judy Bille, sophomore from Luck, is taking the 2-year rural course. Linda Berg, who is as yet undecided on a major, is a freshman from Barron.

Carol Wenner, an English major, is a sophomore from Rice Lake.

All students on campus may vote in the Student Center this Wednesday, March 23, to select the winning entrant from River Falls.

Each co-educational college in the Upper Midwest is invited to submit a photograph of its candidate in the contest.

The Tribune stresses that this is a beauty contest for college girls. Popularity, personality, scholarship, and other qualifications usually involved in the selection of college queens should not be the primary consideration here.

Pictures of all candidates the Tribune receives will be published April 24. They will then print a ballot, and their readers will participate in the selection of the winners. A color photo of the winner will be published on the cover of the Picture Magazine June 5.

JUNE ORNE TO REIGN OVER ACE 'FUN DAY' ACTIVITIES SATURDAY

June Orne, senior from Stockholm, will reign as queen at the A.C.E. "Fun Day" on Saturday, March 26. The program, beginning at 1 p.m., will be held for all children in River Falls and surrounding communities. Miss Orne was one of five A.C.E. members who took part in a storytelling contest at the last meeting of the group. She was chosen by A.C.E. members and faculty advisors as the best storyteller and was named queen.

Theme of the program, which will be held in North Hall, is "Mother Goose Land." The day's activities will begin with a skit portraying Mother Goose characters.

A midway will be set up in the North Hall Gym and will include such features as cartoon drawing, a sidewalk cafe, silhouette drawing, books, and records. A large shoe portraying the Mother Goose rhyme "The Old Woman in the Shoe" will be constructed. Miss Orne will sit beside it and tell stories to the children.

The Editor Speaks . . .

Perhaps due to the Student Center and an active Social Committee the "suit-case student" and weekend problem doesn't seem to be as acute this year as in the past. And as much as our active organizations should be complimented for the work they are doing, I feel there is still room for more weekend activity.

There has been some talk lately among some of the campus actives of forming a "Weekend Club". I would like to toss this topic into the open air for discussion.

The suggested "Weekend Club" would be a strictly social organization. Some its functions might be sponsoring dances, parties, camp-outs, or hikes. It might serve as a co-ordinating committee for seeing that any interested students would have a ride to an out-of-town basketball or football game, or even organize something as simple as an occasional trip to the twin cities for a movie. With some active participation, it seems the sky would be the limit for the fun a "Weekend Club" could bring about.

The only suggested stipulation for membership to the club would be that all members must remain on campus at least three weekends of a month, or perhaps nine weekends of the quarter. While this might sound a little stringent, it would be essential to the efficiency and the effectiveness of the club. Members could probably be excused from an occasional meeting by paying a set fine to the club treasury for any absences.

At any rate the idea of a "Weekend Club" seems to me like a good one, and I feel confident that the administration would agree. Perhaps this could be a partial answer to our "suitcase student" problem.

Student Senate Minutes

Chuck Norelius and Karl Schmid will meet with the City Council this Monday evening. They will ask that a sign in recognition of the college be erected at the outskirts of town.

It was then moved the meeting be adjourned; motion carried.

Kennedy Has Spark Dems Need- F.D. Roosevelt, Jr.

Franklin D. Roosevelt, Jr. told the students at River Falls State College that the "greatest power of the world is the President of the United States. I feel that Jack Kennedy has shown he can give this kind of leadership. He has been able to make the tough decisions."

While speaking in North Hall Auditorium Tuesday, Roosevelt said "Senator Kennedy has shown the spark of leadership needed ever since I started working with him in 1954."

"The Republican party and Eisenhower have met crises as they have cropped up, each time digging deeper into the national treasury. This has been a crises policy under the Republican Party," said Roosevelt.

"We must all take an interest in politics in this year of 1960", he said. "We are faced with many important decisions and problems. Russia has been gaining on us in the space program, and has increased its aid to less fortunate countries," he added.

"Senator Kennedy and his colleagues have been critical of the present defense policy. We need a strong adequate defense program to become a power of the world," said the former Virginia law student.

"I think it is important just as the Congress has a Democratic majority, that the Democrats win the executive. I'm confident that Kennedy can win", said Roosevelt.

"We need today his vote getting ability. He's the only candidate willing to get into every primary. I think Jack Kennedy has the edge in record and policy to win," he said.

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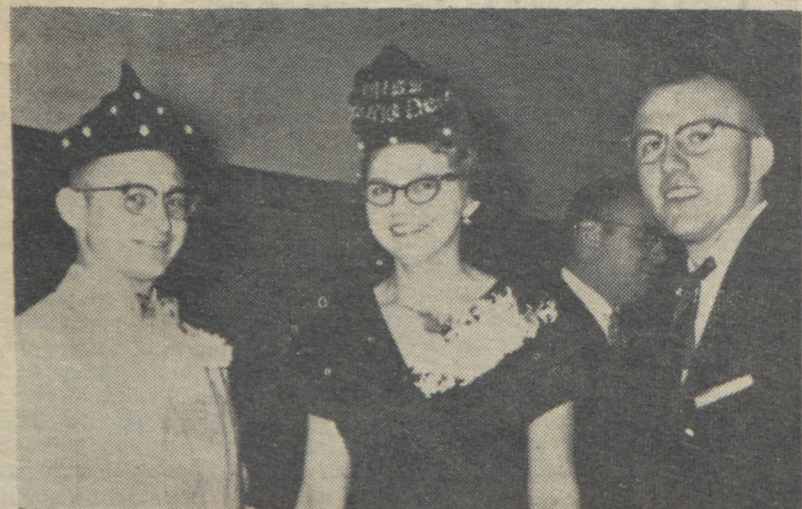
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R F Y-Dems Dominate State Meeting
