# Falcons Overpower Yellowjackets 47-0 **Highest League Score** For Team in 30 Years

Saturday's homecoming crowd of over 2,000 watched Coach Phil Belfiori's Falcons rack up the highest River Falls conference highest River Falls conference point total in 30 years. The Fal-cons were in command all the way as they humbled the Superior Yellowjackets, 47-0. Every mem-ber of the 40-man River Falls squad saw action as Belfiori's team closed out the conference schedule with a 4-1 mark. Preliminary record scanning shows that the 47 points scored Saturday tops the list in league games played since 1925. Records from 1918-1925 were temporarily unavailable, so the mark may ex-tend to 1917 when the Falcons whipped Superior, 50-0. Passing Clicks

Passing Clicks The Falcons opened up a po-tent aerial attack as John Ste-fen, John Rutter, Darreld John-son, and Dick Zamjahn combined to hit 10 of 14 passes for 208 yards and four touchdowns. Sup-eriors defense geared to stor the eriors defense, geared to stop the powerful River Falls ground

powerful River Fails ground game, yielded two first quarter touchdown passes. Steffen, leading small college ground gainer in the nation last week, played less than half the contest and racked up 106 vards rushing and passing. Johnny scored twice, pitched two TD scored twice, pitched two TD passes, and booted two extra points to pace Belfiori's offense.

Falcons Score Early Falcons Score Early River Falls jumped to a 7-0 lead with just three minutes gone in the first period. Ends Bill Kraft and Bob Hubert tackled Superior punter Lyle Smith on fourth down on the Yellowjacket 14 to set up the tally. Two plays later Hubert took Rutter's pass on the eight and bulled his way into the end zone. Vern Steinmetz booted the first of his three exbooted the first of his three extra points.

Rutter climaxed a 54-vard drive with three seconds left in the first quarter when he snared Steffen's 11-yard pass from three Superior defenders for the second Falcon touchdown. Steffen com-pleted a trio of passes for 32 yards to highlight the touchdown march.

Kraft set up another River Falls score early in the second period when he blocked Smith's punt and Bob Koplin recovered on the Superior 31. Steffen car-ried to the 24. Then fullback Jerried to the 24. Then fullback Jer-ry Murphy picked up a first down on the 16. Murphy roared seven yards to the two-yard line on a fourth and three situation, and Steffen skirted left end for the score. Steinmetz booted the point to make it 20-0.

Halftime Lead 27-0 The Falcons were back in scoring territory again a minute la-ter. Murphy intercepted a Yellowter. Murphy intercepted a Yellow-jacket aerial on the River Falls 40 and raced to the Superior 40 with 7:00 to go in the first half. A clipping penalty set the Fal-con back after Jim Finstad car-ried 19 yards to the 21, but Stef-fen tossed to Tom Shield with 4:37 remaining for the tally. The scoring play covered 22 yards.

Steffen's extra point gave the Belfiori-men a 27-0 halftime lead. Midway in the third period Steffen gathered in Darreld Johnson's seven yard pass on the Superior 40 and went all the way on a brilliantly executed bit of broken field running. Steinmetz converted, and the red and white led 34-0 with 6:47 left in the third quarter. third quarter.

Quarterback Bill Werbeckes made it 40-0 two minutes later when he flagged down a Yellowjacket pass and returned it 33 yards to score. Steffen's boot made it 41-0.

Reserves Take Over River Falls substitutes com-pleted the final 20 minutes of the game and held the Superior at-tack in check. Coach Mertz Mortorelli's 11 penetrated to the Falcon seven early in the fourth quarter, but failed to capitalize as River Falls took over on downs on the 10.

Reserve tackle Dick Healy got the Falcons rolling on their final scoring when he recovered a Sup-erior bobble on the River Falls 44. Jim Sackett pulled down a Zamjahn aerial on the Superior 45 and moved it all the way to the 16. Zamjahn scored from five yards out with one minute to go to wrom it up at 47.0 to wrap it up at 47-0.

River Falls held the first down edge, 17-8.
