in two years took first place. They will compete with the fifteen winners of the other meets for the state championship. Their hardest battle is ahead. This section will back them to the finish and hope they carry through to the final victory.

On Wednesday afternoon Clayton met St. Croix Falls; Cumberland clashed with old rivals, Shell Lake. The Clayton High School team presented a queer appearance with a center over six feet tall and a pair of diminutive forwards to back him up. For a few minutes it was a nip and tuck game, but slowly St. Croix Falls pulled away from them, leading at the close of the first half by a score of 9-22. St. Croix sent in three sub-

stitutes in the last half and walked off with a score of 35 to 18.

Cumberland--Shell Lake

The second game of the afternoon was hard fought. Neither Cumberland nor Shell Lake had the edge at any time. Erdall, center for Cumberland, went out on personals giving "Clanton's Boys" the odds. The score remained tied at 9 points until the last two minutes when Hagerty and Cameron each shot a basket putting Shell Lake ahead 13 to 9.

Elmwood--River Falls

River Falls met their old rival, the Elmwood team in the first game of the evening. The Falls had very hard work to locate the basket, though they broke through Elmwood's defense frequently. Richardson made but one free-throw out of eight chances during the first half.

W. Bucholtz, left forward, contributed three baskets to Elmwood's cause. The half ended with Elmwood leading 5 to 12. The second half was remarkably clean not a personal foul being called on either team. The local high scored 8 points to Elmwood's 2, outplaying their opponents but still missing goals. It was a hard game to lose by a score of 13 to 14. River Falls' chances for championship were lost by dropping free throws.

Hudson--New Richmond

New Richmond was greatly outweighed by the team from Hudson, but made up for it by their clever passing and uncanny shooting. P. Lynch received the ball on the tipoff and pivoting in his position right: off center, shot the first basket. The crowd were awed but came to life with a vigorous cheer. The half ended 5-9. Hudson made but three free throws and one field basket. The Lynch brothers made all of the points for the Irish. The second half gave New Richmond a chance to demonstrate their ability to break up plays and steal the ball on the dribble. O'Rourke of Hudson made five free throws out of five, but his team mates could not keep up their end in: face of the shooting of the Emerald Islanders. The final score showed New Richmond on top, 14-22.

Cumberland--River Falls

The Thursday afternoon games between the losers of Wednesday's games were on a par with the games of the day before. Clayton proved too weak for the heavy Hudson team and went under by a score of 25-13.

River Falls' lineup showed a changewith Jensen and Savage working in place of Gibson and McKinnon. Iensen's work at free throwing and guarding showed that he was a most valuable man in pinches. Cumberland could not hold this group after the first half and lost by a score of 33-14.

St. Croix Falls--New Richmond

The St. Croix Falls and New Richmond contest provided the thrill of the tournament. St. Croix's passing took New Richmond off their feet, while the guarding of McCourt and Mack kept the Lynch brothers to one basket. The Irish did not play up to their work of the evening before, but tried long shot after long shot from beyond the center of the floor. The rooters stood amazed as Benson's proteges led by a 6-1 score. McCourt of St. Croix missed most of his free throws losing chances to sew up the game. The half ended with the Irish




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behind on a 11-4 score.

They came back in the second half with plenty, of fight but still failed to carry the ball through St. Croix's five man defense. Trying a total of thirty-eight long shots they succeeded in making three. By luck alone they were tying the score, only once did they get a short shot for a basket. The long shots of New Richmond were counting and the score stood 13 to 13. As the final whisle blew McCourt lost a chance to win the game when his free throw after striking the basket rolled out.

A minute rest was given and again the battle was on, two long shots, one by Johnson and one by P. Lynch gave New Richmond a lead for the first time in the game. For three minutes St. Croix's men took the ball through New Richmond's defense to the basket and six times the ball struck within the net only to roll out. Luck was against them. A personal on J. Lynch gave Thompson a chance to add two points. The Irish were a tickled and happy crowd when the final whistle blew with the slight lead in their favor, 17-15. St. Croix Falls Rost only by a narrow margin, and though out-playing their opponents, could not cope with the long shots of New Richmond.

Shell Lake--Elmwood

The Shell Lake and Elmwood mixup was a tame affair after the excitement of the game previous to it.
Shell Lake took the lead but could
not hold it very long against the
smashing drive of Elmwood. The
half ended 7 to 10. In the second half
the Bucholtz brothers scored at will
for a total of six baskets. The final
score was 11 to 22.

With Clayton and Cumberland eliminated but six teams remained. Two of the remaining teams had the misfortune to play double headers. The River Falls and Hudson game was hard fought with neither team thaving the advantage. The half ended 5 to 3 with the local school in the Head. Hudson tied the score with a field basket and two free throws. Driscoll added one basket after sixteen tries in the last half. With four minutes to go the score stood 7 to 7. Jensen added two free throws. Dawson replaced Gibson and in plays with Richardson gave "Speed" the chance to annex two baskets in the short time left. Final score 13 to 7.

St. Croix Falls-Shell Lake

Shell Lake took the lead against St. Croix by four points, but could not keep it when their opponents offense got under way. Every St. Croix man added a basket apiece in the half and Shell Lake was passed 10 to 6.

St. Croix snowed the effects of the battle with the Irish and wisely stalled for time. Their passing an I team work confused Shell Lake. Opening up for a few minutes three raskets were added while their apponents made but one. The end came with the score 17 to 10 in favor of St. Croix Falls.

Last Game Draws Record Crowd

Great interest was displayed in the outcome of the final games. Long before the opening of doors the corridors were filled with loyal rooters. Some had remained in the building ever since the last afternoon game for fear they might not be able to secure a seat. Before the first game of the evening the gymnasium was jammed to overflowing.

R. F. N. S. Entertains

The Normal team and a picked team of the school played in the opener. Chinnock shone with his basket shooting, while Hyatt and Donovan contributed to the success of the seconds. Tubby Hanson's guarding was a feature. Before the game the State Champions gave an exhibition of fine basket shooting. The curtain fell for the last time on the team that has so well represented the school.

St. Croix Falls--River Falls

Two teams, St. Croix and River Falls, the winners of afternoon games, met to decide the third and fourth places. St. Croix Falls showed the effects of the last two strenuous games and fell behind at the start, but rallied enough to tie the score 9 to 9 at the end of the first half. Both teams were evenly matched and in matter of tries during the entire game, 47 were chalked up for each one.

During the second half a combination of luck shots and the endurance of the local high school team put them well in the lead. Benson's contenders missed baskets by narrow margins time after time. McCourt was taken out with an injury weakening the team and giving Hawley's quint a chance to get Driscoll through for a couple of shots. The game ended with a 25 to 15 score.

Elmwood--New Richmond For Champ Honors

Elmwood, the lucky winner in the contest with River Falls the first day, played New Richmond in the final game. Elmwood started out with a terrific drive, breaking thru New Richmond's defense and running up a total of six points before the Irish got started. Consistent play-

ing and good team work brought the score up until at the close of the period New Richmond led by one point, 8 to 7.

During the final period Elmwood was outplayed and their shooting did not compare with that of their opponents. W. Bucholtz stood out as the best point getter for Elmwood, while P. Lynch led for New Richmond. The passing in this game or the playing did not compare with the St. Croix Falls, and New Richmond game of the previous evening.

Tournament Awards Presented

At the close of the game Pres. Ames presented the winners with the awards. St. Croix Falls, winner of fourth place, was presented with the tournament basket ball. River Falls High School were presented with bronze medals for winning third place. Elmwood received silver medals for second award. New Richmond, winners of first place received gold medals and became custodians of the silver basket ball trophy.

Gredit must be given the "Fighting Irish" for the games they played, and we feel that though a light team they will give a good account of themselves at Madison.


