THE PIPER'S PAY

Thursday morning a farce "The Piper's Pay", was presented by Miss Schlosser's English X class.

The scene was laid in the home of Mrs. Jack Burton after an afternoon tea. The play opened with a conversation between Evelyn Evans, a reporter, and the maid, Mary Clarke, who is a defective. The audience learns that the owners of the cafes and hotels are declaring war against the fad of collecting silver and that anyone who is guilty shall be prosecuted. We next are introduced to Mrs. Burton, an unsettled, scatter brained woman, Mrs. Dover, and Freda Dixon who have been assiting at the tea. Peggy Burton relates her experience in trying to take a spoon from a fafe without the waiter's seeing her. Freda reminds her that ultimately the piper demands his pay. The maid overhears the later part of the conversation, which interests her, for she is also in the employ of Seville. With the entrance of Mrs. Herbert Carr, who has great social influence, the conversation turns to the detective hired by Peggy to watch Katie, the waitress. Katie is suspected of having stolen a locket and a chain from Mrs. Burton.

When all have left the room except Mary Clarke she discovers a collection of twenty-nine spoons and reports to Mr. Seville. Evelyn Evans is installed behind a screen with a prospect of getting a big "scoop".

Upon Mrs. Burton's return, the detective confronts her with the evidence. Peggy insists that she did not steal the articles, but merely "took them". Miss Clarke, maintains that she must go with her to the nearest police station. In the midst of the confusion which ensues, Mrs. Carr enters and demands the trouble. When Freda, the only cool one, informs her, she calls Mr. Seville and because of her influence, Mrs. Burton is acquitted. Mrs. Burton admits the truth of Freda's statement, but thinks she has paid the piper in full. The audience is left to wonder with Freda whether she has or not, for the reporter although unable to use names, is still in possession of the story.

From Katie, the maid to the regal Mrs. Carr, the characters were excellently portrayed all through, the polish which Miss Schlosser's productions usually have was displayed.

CROP AND POULTRY SHOW BIG SUCCESS

The Crop and Poultry Show which was held last week was a demonstration of the importance of poultry in this section. Beginning the show two years ago, there were 125 birds shown, this year 336 were on exhibition and the type was very far superior to those of any previous show. This indicates the value that these shows have in stimulating interest in better farming methods.

The program on Friday was especially good. Professor T. L. Bewick, State Club leader for this state, gave a talk on farm conditions as they are at the present time. In his talk, Mr. Bewick, presented the value of boys' and girls' club work in carrying out project work at home. Professor Lakee, who represents the marketing division of the State Department of Agriculture, judged the poultry and gave one of the best talks ever heard here, on the subject of feeding hens for winter egg production. Mr. Lakee is a man of wide experience in poultry work and his talk was very much enjoyed. There was a good attendance at both of these lectures.

The gymnasium was completely filled with exhibits of poultry and crops as well as some educational features. Mr. Seyforth, county agent for Pierce county, had a splendid exhibition showing the work that he has been doing in the county. His work was well illustrated on maps and showed that Mr. Seyforth was doing a work of much value to the farmers in the county. There is no question but what Mr. Seyforth's exhibits interested more people in his work. Another exhibition arranged by some students in the Normal School, showed the construction of a poultry house. The agricultural department had a number of pictures illustrating work they are doing.
