### Education Goes Beyond Individual, Dr. Harrington Tells Class of '64

"We think of education as a help not only to the individual, but also to the area from which you come and the republic of which you are citizen"," Dr Fred H. Harrington told the 324 graduates in his commencement speech this af-

Dr. Harrington, president of the University of Wisconsin for two years, spoke on "The Future of Higher Education in Wiscon-Sin. 2)

The College at River Fulls, Dr. Harrington said, "has a long and Impressive history; but this history does not begin to compare with the future of this institution. The successes of the past serve as the preparation for the enormous job we have

The Wisconsin president pointed out that higher education is no longer a luxury; it is a necessity. "It is indispensable because our new scientific and technological ago calls for knowledge and judgment, imagination and the broad viewpoint which we associate with the liberal and professional higher education of today. It is easentful because the political and social problems of our complicated generation require the most careful consideration."

The men and women graduated today have been educated for their own benefit. Dr. Harrington said but society also has a great interest in the college graduate "Higher education therefore, must be viewed as the great public service of our time"

Dr. Harrington was a member of the University of Wisconsin faculty for more than 25 years at the time of his appointment as president to succeed the late Dr. Conrad A. Elvehjem. Behere being named president, Dr. Harrington taught, served as chairman of the history department and an assistant to the president vice president of nondemic affairs and vice president of the University

He holds an A B degree in history from Cornell University. and A.M. and Ph.D. degrees from New York University. The latter school awarded him an honorary doctorate in 1963.

Miss Lansing, a freshman from Spring Valley, received the Leonard J. Prucha Award for oratory which was established by alumni to honor the former registrar and forensies director.

Dr. Harrington, a specialist in American diplomatic history and Lincoln and the Civil War. has published a number of books and served in academic and governmental positions.

The class of 324 graduates that participated in this afternoon's commencement is the largest in the Col ege's history--30 per cent larger than the 1963 class of 252 members.

Commencement and the reception following the ceremony in the Student Center climax a week of graduation activities. The week began with an Honors Day program for scholarship and anademic award winners Monday

afternoon in Karges Center.

Yesterday's alumni day activitles included luncheons and campus tours for the Classes of 1914, 1924 and 1939 and the annual Senior - Alumni - Faculty Banquet last night at May Hall.

Sakrison, a 1912 graduate of the College, retired Aug. 31, 1961, as finance vice-president and sucretary after serving 36 years with the Bayport, Minn.

Born in Deer Park, Wis. Sakrison taught school for several years after his graduation from what was then the normal school. He also was cashier of the State Bank of Deer Park before entering the Army in World War I. Lt. Sakrison was wounded in the Mouse-Argonne offensive and was awarded the Distinguished Service Cross and the Purple Heart.

After the war, Sakrison was managing officer of the First State Bank in Bayport for three years before joining the accounting department of the Anderson

He is a member of the board of directors of the River Falls State College Foundation and continues as director of the Andersen Corp. He also is vice-president and director of the First State Bank of Bayport and recently completed 25 years as a member of the board of managers of Lakeview Memorial Hospital

Two years ago, Sakrison and his wife. Esther, established an annual \$250 scholarship to River Falls for graduates of New Richmond High School, from which Mr. and Mrs. Sakrison both gradnated. The scholarship is financed through the income from \$5,000 worth of preferred stock in the Andersen Corp. which Mr. Sakrison has given the Founda-

"We have raised many varying and controversial issues on campus, such as big-name activities, campus apathy, insurance, housing, the food service dilemna, and registration," said Senate Pres. Larry Feltes when asked to evaluate the Senate's work over the past year.

Feltes cited improved use of parliamentary procedures as one of the big reasons more business was placed on the floor and handled in a shorter period of time than by past Senates.

Feltes also pointed out that although the Senate had worked with the administration, it had made the administration aware and concerned with some of the problems on campus, especially in the areas of housing, registration and the food service.

The president also commended

"I would commend the entire Senate on a job well done," said Feltes who concluded three years of activity in student government with his graduation today. "The experience and enthusshould provide the incoming Senate with a firm basis to serve the student body," said the president elect, Gene Smith. Smith stated that he felt this enthusiasm would not lead to blind unity, but rather to "an informative exchange of ideas."

"We are deeply indebted to this year's Seniors," Smith said in reference to his graduating colleagues.

# College is Remaker Of Society, Pres. Says

Education is not only an investment in man but in our society, Dr. E. H. Kleinpell, president of River Falls State College, told students and faculty at the Honors Day assembly last Monday afternoon in the Student Center.

Dr. Kleinpell posed many questions as to what life would be like in the year 2000 and said that "the colleges and universities will play a decisive role in providing answers to the questions raised."

The President stated that "Knowledge has assumed such a prominent place in our civilization that it is sometimes re-

ferred to as 'the knowledge industry' ''.

If this be the case Dr. Kleinpell said that the colleges and universities will continue in their role of remaking our society and our environment.

Dr. Kleinpell cautioned, however, that the accumulation of Knowledge is not all that is necessary. What many students "ignore is the meaning of self" he stated.

In closing Pres. Kleinpell reminded his audience that what is important to us now is not who leads us, but what leads us and what convictions we follow.

### New Course Offered In Social Field Work

The sociology department at River Falls has broadened its curriculum by offering a new course this spring in the practical aspects of social work. According to Dr. Robert Bailey of the sociology department, the new course follows the introductory course given in Winter quarter and is designed to help the student get to know the prac-

tical field of social work from the start.

Because of the increasing number of students at River Falls planning on a career in social work, the curriculum had to take in some practical study. More so than in some other disciplines it is difficult for a student to understand the field

of social work from classroom lectures and reading alone explained Dr. Bailey.

He said "It is in observing the field work procedure in an actual setting that the feel for social work is acquired."

This Spring seven students participated in the field work at four different agencies.

### Change In Name Only, Pres. Kleinpell Says

The action by the Board of Regents changing the State College system into a State University system is more of a name change than anything else and should bring no administration changes, according to E. H. Kleinpell, President of the College.

"What this (the Regents' action) does is change the word college to university," he said. "We'll be known as Wisconsin State University--River Falls,"

The change goes into effect on July 1.

The President said he hopes the name change will bring added support to the College.

Dr. Kleinpell said the College will have to go through a slight re-tooling to adjust to the change, but this consists mainly of changing stationary, cards and signs.

The university status will not affect the academic program, according to Dr. Kleinpell.

There has been some speculation that the College would now plunge headlong into an accelerated graduate program, but Dr. Kleinpell said the College already has a summer graduate program which has been expanded and will be offered on a year-round basis starting this fall.

"We won't accelerate the graduate program just for the sake of the program," he said.

The President said the graduate program will grow according to the needs of the area it serves. He said there are no plans to establish another school—a graduate school—at present. "But I wouldn't say there isn't a possibility it won't happen in the future," he added.

Dr. Kleinpell said the College will still continue to stress a high quality undergraduate program. "I'm of the opinion that somewhere in this country we must have some good undergraduate colleges, and this has been and will continue to be my major effort as long as I am here," he said.

He admitted that at one time he was opposed to the change to a State University because he felt it would detract from the quality of the undergraduate program. "Twe changed my thinking, though," he said. "I now think it will help our undergrad-

uate program and I'm all for it."
He said the help would probably

come in the form of more help from alumni and federal grants and aids.

Dr. Kleinpell said the change to a university was not something the Regents pulled out of a bag. "It has been under discussion since 1961," he said.

"The council of State College presidents met here on May 11 and formally recommended for the first time to the Board of Regents that a change be made." he said.

The President said that as far as changes go, River Falls was the first State College to reorganize its administrative system into schools within the college. "The other colleges went to it about four years later," he added.

In looking back over the last five years, the President said the College has made the most progress in any one area in the fine arts field.

"A few years ago we had only two persons on the music staff. No look, we have eight today." he said, by way of example. "No one knows where they will go in the next five years," he said.

# Stone Announces Language Workshop
