
There was, however, no intentional roughness, and the game was free (Continued on page four)

Roy Jones was called to his home at Wild Rose, Wis., last Wednesday on account of the death of his father.


The Federal Veterinarian, Dr. Downey of Madison, was here last week and made a tuberculin test of the Normal herds. None of the animals were found with tuberculosis.

Elda Nelson was absent last week on account of the "Flu." Her "twin" looked awfully lonesome, but Monday united them again.


A joint meeting of the Y. W. and Y. M. will be held next Tuesday evening. A topic of vital interest to every member will be discussed.
