

# Miss Bourke-White Will Follow Rathbone to River Falls



Miss Bourke-White

Margaret Bourke-White, photographer-reporter for *Life Magazine*, world traveler and best-selling author, will speak at 8 p.m. on May 9 in the Karges Physical Education and Recreation Center.

The appearance of the nationally known lecturer is being sponsored by the College and the River Falls branch of the American Association of University Women.

The announcement comes on the heels of last week's word that Basil Rathbone will present a lecture-recital here May 6 as part of the annual Fine Arts Festival.

One of Miss Bourke-White's photos was used on the cover of the first issue of *Life* almost a quarter-century ago. Since then, she has traveled all over the world on her assignments for the magazine.

More than just a reporter or photographer, Miss Bourke-White has been called a "documenter of history." Her works hang in a number of museums and in the Library of Congress.

Life assignments have taken Miss Bourke-White to Japan, Korea, South Africa and India. During World War II, she was the first woman photographer to be credited to the U. S. Army Air Forces. She followed the war from

"Wild Colombines", a color slide taken by Don Blegen, senior from Spring Valley, was on exhibit at the Minneapolis Institute of Arts Feb. 13-18. The slide was part of a Photography in the Fine Arts exhibition.

Photography in the Fine Arts is a collective effort sponsored by

Saturday Review, the Metropolitan Museum of Art in New York, and the Photographic Society of America.

The purpose of PFA is to have photography recognized as a fine art. The photographs are judged as works of art, rather than for their news or humorous value.

Amateurs as well as professional photographers are free to submit entries for judging by PFA, with winners receiving only recognition.

Blegen's slide of "Wild Colombines" was reproduced in 16x20 print form, and was one of approximately 35 black and white and color prints on exhibition.

Blegen is photographer for the *Student Voice*, *Student* newspaper, and for the yearbook *Melotian*. He also has contributed photographic art to the campus literary magazine, *Prologue*.

### 'Cat on Tin Roof' Shows March 4 In Little Theatre

"Cat on a Hot Tin Roof" will be shown in the Little Theatre at 7:30 p.m. on Saturday, March 4. Student admission to the film, which is being sponsored by the Social Committee, will be 25 cents.

"Cat on a Hot Tin Roof", starring such Hollywood greats as Elizabeth Taylor, Paul Newman, Burl Ives, and Judith Anderson, became one of the most popular American films of recent years.

Elizabeth Taylor was nominated for the best actress of the year for her portrayal of "Maggie" in the film, and Burl Ives was up for an Oscar for his performance as "Big Daddy."

Judith Anderson, who played "Big Mamma", has been highly lauded for her performance of "Lady MacBeth" on a network television production this winter.

Other films temporarily scheduled by the Social Committee for showing on campus this spring include "The Scapegoat", March 12; "East of Eden", March 18; "Sayonara", April 6; "Giant", April 8; and "Home from the Hills", May 14. All the films are scheduled for showing in the Little Theatre.

Admission costs to the films has been held to 25 cents in an attempt to provide inexpensive entertainment for students. The remaining cost of the film is paid from activities fees.

### Profs to Issue Cards For Sequence Courses

Registration for Spring Quarter will get in full swing tomorrow for students planning to continue in the sections of sequence courses they are not enrolled in.

Class cards for sequence courses will be handed out by the various to students enrolled in their sections on Tuesday and Wednesday, Feb. 28 and March 1, provided the students present trial study cards initiated by their advisors.

Class cards for non-sequence courses will be issued at designated locations on Thursday afternoon, March 2, at the following hours: seniors at 1 p.m.; juniors at 1:30 p.m.; sophomores at 2 p.m. and freshmen at 2:30 p.m.

All classes will be excused and all faculty members will be on hand from 1 to 5 p.m. for issuing class cards and for signing registration forms.

Fees for registration will be received in 219 North Hall at the following times: From 8:30 to 11:30 a.m. only on Monday thru Thursday, March 6, 9; and from 8:30 to 11:30 a.m. and from 1 to 3 p.m. on Friday, March 10.

A Board of Regents ruling states that "those registering late (on March 13 or after) will be subject to a \$10 fine unless excused by the administration."

The faculty has ruled that "anyone in residence registering for the Spring Quarter will be expected to attend each class or lab during the first week of classes

or will have his load reduced to not more than 14 hours. No exceptions will be made unless authorized by the Registrar."

Drop-ads will be processed in the Registrar's Office between 10 a.m. and 12 noon on March 13 through March 17. Textbooks for Spring Quarter will be issued from the basement of the Library, starting March 13. Texts in sequence courses need not be returned for reissuing. Winter Quarter texts should be turned in immediately following final exams, according to Library officials.

Applications for excess loads during Spring Quarter should be made with Dr. Virginia Akins in Room 117 North Hall before 5 p.m. on Wednesday, March 8.

An innovation in this year's program will be inclusion of the basketball game as a part of the session. Mr. Christianson said the formal meeting will be concluded in time for the River Falls-Stout basketball game at 8 p.m. Those attending the dinner will be guests of the College at the game. Afterward, those who wish will return to the private dining room for coffee and further visiting.

Principal speaker will be President E. H. Kleinpell who will discuss academic progress of the College.

### Pinochle, Vets' Club Tie for Trophy As Senate Rules on Unusual Beards

The social activities trophy race has ended in a two way tie between the Pinochle Club and the Vets' Club, due to a ruling which has eliminated the Winter Carnival most unusual beard contest from the trophy-point system. Each club now has 335 points toward the trophy.

The Veterans had held a 15-point lead over the Pinochle Club after Winter Carnival activities concluded, the same number of points which the Vets picked up by winning the much-disputed most unusual beard contest. Jerry Mertens represented the Vets in the contest with a face painted on his chest and the hair on the lower part of his stomach serving as the "beard".

The Student Senate, however, passed unanimously last Monday night a motion recognizing a Pinochle Club protest that the Vets'

"beard" was not really a beard, and proceeded to rule the most unusual beard contest not eligible for trophy points.

Each of the clubs, however, was allowed to retain the 10 points they earned by running an entrant in the contest. Had the Vets' very entrance in the contest been ruled illegal, the Pinochle Club would have won the race by 10 points.

The Pinochle Club's protest was brought before the Student Senate by Robert Cross, Bob Radatz, and Tom Cuskey, who contended that the Vets had violated entrance rules to the contest.

The Carnival Chairwomen, present at the meeting, pointed out that three stipulations were made for entrance: the man must represent a specific club, he must register clean-shaven, and he must enter one of the three cate-

gories of the heaviest, the longest, or the most unusual beard.

The Vets, represented by Mertens and Mike McEvoy, replied that (1) their entry was very definitely and unquestionably the most unusual on stage, and that (2) their candidate had been duly registered in the contest by the same rules and officials as all other entrants.

The Pinochle Club protested that Mertens' beard was not really a beard, and that even if it could be considered so, the region was not registered as clean-shaven before the contest began.

The Senate's decision came when it was pointed out that the dictionary defined a beard as "the hair that grows on a man's face", and that the confused conditions under which the judges awarded the victory left room for controversy.

These teams only met once in regular season play and then the Floorburns won by a score of 37 to 27 over the Saddlelites.

At the end of the first round of play the Dynamoes and Floorburns each received byes, Saints and Sinners edged by the No Names 43-42; Court Martials over Fighters 50-38; Squirrels over Hometowners 57-44; S.O.T.P. 44, Bums 38; Bombers topped Pumpers 71-40; Saddlelites over Vets 74-35.

Second round: Floorburns sent Saints and Sinners through the floor with a 91-32 victory; Squirrels pulled a second victory 47-43 over Court Martials; Bombers downed S.O.T.P. 36-34; Saddlelites blasted to a 65-26 topper over Dynamoes.

# Falcon Cagers Snowed by Mankato, La Crosse

## Hapless Hardwooders Lose to Indians 86-55

The River Falls Falcons were snowed the second time in three days when the La Crosse Indians scored an easy 86-55 victory Thursday night on the Indian hardcourt. Originally scheduled for February 18, the game was canceled because of bad weather.

La Crosse jumped to a quick six point lead before the Falcons were able to score on a free throw. The Indians, shooting a fine 42 per cent to the Falcons lowly 29 per cent, left the floor at the midway point leading 50-29.

The home quintet continued the fine shooting percentage the second half to increase their lead to 31 points when the final horn sounded.

Leading the scorers for the evening was La Crosse's Peterson with 19 points scoring 15 in the first half. The four others to hit double figures for the Indians were Fred Pongratz, Len Stewart and Bob Johnson with 11 points apiece while Ken Schmidt dumped in 10.

Jake Lauber led the Falcon point getters with 6 field goals and 3 of 5 from the charity stripe for a total of 15 points.

La Crosse, after losing the first three in conference play, has won eight straight for a 8-3 conference record and 12-8 overall.

Before last weekends action the Indians still had an outside chance for the title. Provided Stevens Point loses the next two games and Superior lost to Stout while La Crosse beat Eau Claire, the three teams would be tied for championship honors.

The Falcons still winless in conference play (0-11) have only the game with Stout tonight to get in the win column.

The Falcon basketball team lost a rough and wild game to Mankato State Tuesday night by the ridiculous score of 103-57.

Monday night Mankato had backed into the Northern States College Conference championship, when Winona knocked off second place St. Cloud 85-75.

The Indians took an early 10-1 lead before the Falcons scored their first field goal. The wild and wooly game was marked by continuous fouling on both sides. River Falls committed a total of 30 fouls during the game, while Mankato was charged with 15.

The game was marked by a lot of shoving and pushing. As the tension mounted and tempers flared, Jack Schultz, Mankato's leading scorer this season, and Falcon center Darrell Hart exchanged a few blows. With eight minutes left in the first half both Hart and Schultz were asked to leave the game. The first half ended with the Indians ahead 55 to 32.

In the second half Gary Scharfenberger, George Wolf and Jake Lauber left the game with five fouls apiece.

Ferrest Meyeraan grabbed the games scoring honors with 34 marks. Teammates Warren Schmidt and Dale Owens followed with 17 and 16 points respectively.

High scorer for River Falls was Tom Sempf with 14 tallies. Sempf was the only Falcon player to hit double figures.

Mankato hit 39 of 47 charity tosses, with Meyeraan making 20 free throws in as many attempts.
