Local College Draws Students From 13 States

96 Wisconsin Towns Are Represented on the River Falls Campus

Other Facts Revealed

Ninety-six towns in Wisconsin and thirteen states are represented by the students on our campus, according to data compiled from statistics from the registrar's office recently.

The 592 students registered here are divided into classes as follows:

They are registered in the following departments:

The men are in a large majority on our campus, more than they ever have been in the history of the college. This year there are 322 men in college, while there are 270 of the women in attendance.

Fifty-one students have attended other colleges or universities before enrolling here. The names of the high schools and the states represented here with the numbers are as follows:

President Attends Education Meeting

President J. H. Ames attended a conference at the University of Minnesota, January 15-16. The meeting was attended by sixty persons representing the training schools of this section, which includes eight states.

The chief subjects of discussion at this conference included: The limitation of enrollment and selection of students for teachers colleges; the supply and demand of teachers; curricula organization in the teachers college; and the balance of general and professional education for teachers.

"The tendency is in direction of general education at the expense of professional education," was the conclusion on the last topic, according to Mr. Ames.

The Saturday afternoon session was devoted to the discussion of the survey which is being conducted among the colleges and universities of the United States.

Dr. Harold Rugg, a member of the survey, of Greeley, Colorado, presented some features of the National Survey of Teachers.

Dean Haggerty of the University of Minnesota discussed investigations being carried on in the North Central Association.

Squad Faces Hard Schedule; Forensic Club Organizes Topic Material

Preparing arguments for a number of debates within a few days is the task of the college debate team at the present time. The first week in February they will begin a schedule of preliminary debates to be held with colleges in Wisconsin, Iowa, and Minnesota. While on this tour, they will debate nearly every day and on some days they debate twice.

The debates held with St. Thomas earlier in the season have been an aid in developing cases that will be tested on the trip. Mr. Williams, the forensic coach, feels that each preliminary debate to be held will not only test arguments but will mean rapid development for each individual participating.

While the first team is working on a plan for stabilization of industry, the second team is studying the merits of unemployment insurance. The tenor is the best local man that I have heard in the Twin Cities. It has been my privilege to hear most of the world's great singers, and I can say, in all sincerity, that I get a real thrill from hearing this young man sing. He sings some of the old songs exceedingly well."

"The violinist has studied with Auer of New York, who is regarded one of the world's great violin teachers. She is expecting to give a New York recital in the near future."

Educational Film Shows Cancer Cells

A film giving the movements and characteristics of the cancer organism was shown on the screen in the biology laboratory on the third floor of North Hall Tuesday and Thursday of this week.

The film was a series of photographs taken through a microscope focused on the cancer culture. It was speeded up in projection upon the screen to show that the amoeboid cells moved about and divided by mitosis similar to the division of ordinary cells.

One of the startling things revealed by the film was that the cancer cells were "wild" cells very similar to the ones from which the connective tissue of the skeleton are composed.

The cancer cells are continuously being fought back by white corpuscles of the blood, but according to this film, no headway is gained by the opposing bodies. One of the startling things shown in this picture was that the cancer cells can move thru tissues to almost any part of the body infected.

The biology department is obtaining these films for use in the classes to bring out some of the outstanding facts connected with the courses of study. The new 16 mm. projector is being used to show these moving pictures.

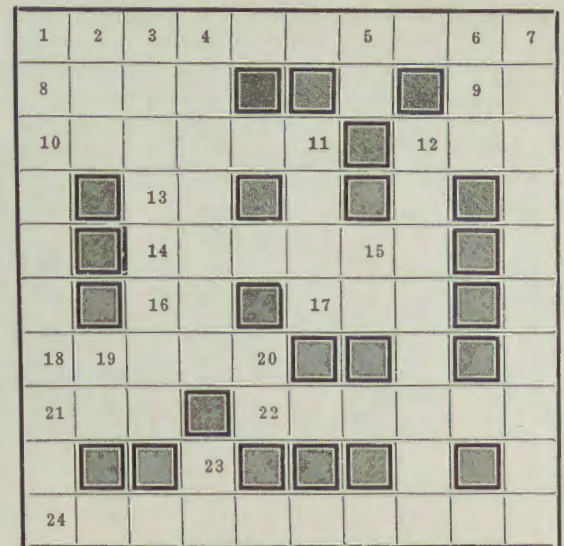
