TEAMS TIE FOR CHAMPIONSHIP THE NEW COURSE IN

Game Ends in Scoreless Tie

With the northern championship at stake, the game last Friday against Stevens Point proved to be a thorough deadlock For sixty exciting minutes the football strength of the northern section fought desperately to put one across, but with no success. On several occasions both teams looked gcod for a counter but each time the opposition stiffened and halted the rush.

The game, though containing little intentional dirty playing, was one of numerous penalties which slackened, to a certain extent, the dash of the teams. During the first half. River Falls received five penalties for a set back or forty yards. With such an amount of territory to recover and with the breaks going the wrong way, the team hit some hard going against the "Point." We cannot class it all as misfortune as we were up against a team that plays the game in a winnin manner throughout Without doubt Stevens Point has one of the bert teams in the state and with that fighting aggregation taking advantage of every break, they were able to hold their own and force the Red and White to a tie for northern championship.

From Inside The Wire

Captain Bliss won the toss and chose to defend the south goal. Stevens Point kicked off to Fahland who returned the ball twenty yards to the forty yard line. Olson started carrying by skirting right end for five yards, but the ball was returned and River Falls was penalized fifteen yards On the next play we fumbled and lost the ball. On their first two plays Stevens Point made first downs. but after being penalized five yards they failed to gain. With the ball on our ten yard line, Holman tried a drop-kick but fumbled. Thus ended the first and greatest danger for River Falls. The Falls punted out and Morgan fell on the fumbled punt. From then until near the end of the quarter the ball was evenly exchanged by punts and failures to gain. With only a few minutes left in the initial period, the Red and White opened an advance that took them to the enemy's fifteen yard line, where it was lost on an attempted pass on the fourth down. The Point punted out and the quarter closed with the ball on our thirty-five yard line.

Our backs failed to make first down so a punt resulted. One the next

AGRICULTURAL MECHANICS

School administrators have felt the need of preparing men who are especially qualified to successfully operate the modern power machinery of the farm. Urgent calls have been sent put for men who are especially prepared to teach this work; men who have been raised on the farm and are fomiliar with farm problems and conditions. Several calls were sent in to the River Falls Normal school last year for such men, but they could not be furnished.

The administrators of the River Falls Normal school considered it their duty to supply this demand because of the fact that it is a school designated for the training of teachers of agriculture, and since the necessary equipment and teaching force was at hand. All that remained was to interview the Normal Board of Regents and ask to have a course in agricultural mechanics at the River Falls State Normal school established and that persons taking this course be licensed to teach in the state of Wisconsin. This course has been sanctioned by the Normal Board of Regents and the River Falls State Normal school is now allowed to license teachers of acricultural mechanics, or in other words Manual Training teachers who are emecially prepared to teach a type of manual training which emphasizes the operation of farm machinery and gas trac-

The new course has just been announced but already a large number of students have signified their intention of enrolling.

It is sure to have a large enrollment, for the River Falls Normal school is the only one in the state offering this line of work.

Things looked big for us when Chinnock laid a thirty yard pass in Gurnoe's arms. The ball was re turned and River Falls was penalized five yards for being off side.
