RF GIVES 342 PINTS

Three hundred and forty-two pints of blood was the contribution made by the city of River Falls, Monday and Tuesday, November 6 and 7, to the St. Paul Mobile Unit. Of the four hundred and eighteen persons who registered their intentions to give blood, forty-eight—about one-fourth of the campus enrollment—were college students. Rejects and those who failed to keep appointments numbered seventy-six.

This number, three hundred and forty-two pints, for two days of the Unit's time, doesn't compare too favorably with the figure, two hundred and twenty, for one day last spring.

The unit will return again in the spring. Then we may all make this small sacrifice—the sacrifice which may mean everything to a soldier, sailor, or marine.
