## The Falls Overturns LaCrosse Hopes

### Home - Coming Plans Take Final Shape

#### Diligent Workers Report Great Enthusiasm Everywhere

With every member of the school putting forth their efforts for a monster Homecoming, responses indicate an unsurpassed attendance. Business men, alumni, students, faculty and friends have united in boosting the initial plans into an elaborate plan of celebration on November 18, when Oshkosh plays on Ramer Field.

Advertising has reached every alumnus possible by letter or otherwise. In a special designed letter head, the Publicity Committee, headed by Arthur Eckley, '23, has given a personal invitation to each alumnus to come back to the school on this day. Not only is each one asked to come on Saturday, but, if possible, to come in time for the mass meeting Friday evening. Along with the letters reaching the alumni and friends, hand painted posters are being placed at nearby towns and cities. Newspaper space is being used in weekly issues of several towns, and hand-bills have been placed within a radius of nearly one hundred miles. A souvenir program of the events, giving a short history of athletic scores, list of players and school yells is being prepared and will be sold at the game.

Stunts that will be original all the way through, have been arranged by Kendall Wentz, chairman of stunts and mass meeting. With the mass meeting at seven o'clock Friday evening festivities begin, and take up the whole week-end. The best talent in school has been secured for the pep speeches and several alumni are planning on being on the platform to lead the cheers and yells. Clowns and freaks will predominate at the Homecoming parade Saturday morning at ten-thirty, in a march that will excel anything ever put on by any organization here. Unusual events will take place before the game and between halves, arranged by a committee of

The Red and White moved up another notch toward the championship when they succeeded in defeating La Crosse 10-7. The La Crosse team was accompanied by a fair sized group of loyal rooters, who made up for their numbers by the quality of their cheering. They selected the south portion of the stand and answered our rooters, cheer for cheer.

At last our team has developed an offense that we are proud of. Their drive opened huge holes in the La Crosse line; and we judge from the number of first downs made on straight football, that they will be able to take care of themselves in the games to come.

#### The Story of the Game

Gurnoe kicked to La Crosse goal line, and the ball was returned thirty yards. La Crosse was penalized twice for being offside. La Crosse was forced to kick on fourth down. The ball was returned seven yards by Doug Smith, who received an injury dislocating his arm so was forced to go out of the game. Breaks seemed to be against our team from the start, but these only served to make the boys fight harder. Ziebell was substituted for Smith. In the next few plays the Falls lost ground, and a fumble gave La Crosse the ball on our thirty yard line. Here they were held and forced to punt. The ball went over the goal line and was returned to our twenty yard line.

The Falls made 5 yards through the line, but did not make first down. La Crosse punted after failing to make any gain through the line. The ball was River Falls' on their own forty yard line, with a penalty for offside, losing us five yards more. Here Killian, right end, intercepted a pass and carried the ball over for a touchdown. Gunderson kicked goal. Score 7-0.

River Falls received the ball from the kickoff on the twenty yard line and returned ten yards. La Crosse held and forced the Falls to punt; they received the ball in the center

of the field, but were twice penalized for offside. The ball was in this position at the end of quarter.

**Second Quarter**

La Crosse failed to gain and punted to Heffron, who returned the ball to the fifty yard line. The Falls made first down. La Crosse obtained the ball on the thirty yard line, but could not advance it any distance and punted. The Falls returned the ball to the forty yard line. From here, by line smashing and by a successful forward pass, the Red and White brought the ball down to the five yard line. With the goal to go, in three downs the ball was pushed across. Gurnoe kicked goal. With only twenty seconds left, the half ended with the score 7-7.

**Second Half: 3rd Quarter.**

Gurnoe's kick placed ball back on the twenty yard line. The receiver was tackled where he received the ball. La Crosse was outplayed during this quarter. The ball was in their territory the greater share of the time. River Falls made five 1st downs, and La Crosse made two. Quarter ended with ball on the thirty-yard line.

**Last Quarter**

In this quarter the attack was too strong for Pascover, and he retired to the side lines. River Falls drove the within kicking distance of the goal, but Gurnoe's try was unsuccessful. A few minutes later the ball was again in position for a drop kick and from the thirty yard line, Gurnoe put over the ball for the winning points. Score 10-7. The game ended with the ball on the La Crosse twenty yard line.

At the critical moment they held like a stone wall, later bringing the ball to within striking distance of the enemy's goal. A minute more would have meant a touchdown added to the score.
